HAVE 135-ACRE POTATO FIELD

KYLE AND PAGE ARE
UMATILLA POTATO KINGS.

Acres Last Year Under the Furnish Ditch Has Been More Than Doubled—No Irrigation Needed for Crop So Far This Year—Enormous Yield Is Expected.

To own the largest potato field in eastern Oregon has fallen to the lot of Kyle and Page, who have 135 acres this year under the Furnish-Coe irrigation lands west of Echo. Last year this enterprising firm raised about 80 acres on new, raw land under the Furnish ditch and so successful was the venture that the acreage was more than doubled this year and the crop promises to be enormous.

Some of the crop is now up and doing nicely, while other portions have just been planted and other portions remain to be planted yet. So far the potatoes have not been irrigated, the ground being sufficiently moist to keep them growing from the winter irrigation which the land under the Furnish ditch enjoyed, during the high water season.

Mr. Kyle, who is in the city today, says that there is every prospect that but little irrigation will be needed on the Furnish land, so thoroughly is the ground saturated from the winter irrigation.

LONG RELAY RACE.

Portland Y. M. C. A. and Chemawa in
Racing Contest.

It is but rarely that men of the Portland Y. M. C. A. have the opportunity of acting as special dispatch bearers to Governor Chamberlain, but they will be given that opportunity next Saturday, May 2, the occasion of the annual relay race between the Portland association and the Chemawa Indians, says the Oregon Daily Journal.

Starting from Salem at 8:30 a. m., Governor Chamberlain will hand a copy of the dispatch to the starting men for the different contingents. The winner will be received by Mayor Lane in front of the Portland association building, when having handed his important message to the mayor his duties will be over.

The race last year was won by the Chemawa men, and in order to add to the interest this year the Salem Y. M. C. A. is sending in a team. The course is divided into five-mile stretches and each man will be required to hand the dispatch he carries to his relief. The Portland association men propose to send the Salem starters to the course Friday to avoid any danger of railway delay Saturday, while the balance will be carried out to their position by automobile.

A. Cortez will make the start from Salem for the Portland men, and John Hessemer will be the recipient of the spotlight at the finish. The balance of the team are: V. Wetterborg, Keyes, W. Backus, C. Vosper, A. Plo, W. Low and A. Kunkle, while there are some weak and unpracticed runners among the men, many of them are old hands and can be estimated to bring the Portland colors to the winning line.

Miss Barker in the Contest.

Miss Buelah E. Barker of Echo who is a candidate for the eastern trip to be given away by Philip S. Bates of the Pacific Northwest of Portland, is in the city today in the interest of her contest. Miss Barker hopes to succeed in winning the trip, which promises to be an interesting event. The Pacific Northwest will send a large number of young women to the east for the purpose of distributing literature and advertising the northwest states. Miss Barker is the only candidate from Umatilla county.

Carload of Automobiles.

Temple and Wilcox have just received a full carload of automobiles for their growing trade in this city. They were unloaded from the O. R. & N. depot yesterday and the shipment includes a number of white Buicks, which are beautiful and excellent little machines. They have been tested on the different hills in the city and will carry their load of passengers easily over any grade to be found in this vicinity.

LOCAL PLANT IS DOING BUSINESS

PENDLETON PLANING MILL
FILLING LARGE ORDERS.

Irrigated sections of Central and Eastern Washington Secure High Grade Doors, Sashes, Etc., From the Forster Establishment—At least One Manufacturing Industry in Operation.

There is one establishment in this city that is steadily turning out manufactured products in spite of the criticism that is made of Pendleton as a poor factory town. This is the Pendleton planing mill, owned by R. Forster, where sashes, doors, show-cases, counters and other similar fixtures are being made in large number to fill orders received.

At the above mill a large consignment of high grade doors, sashes, etc., is now being turned out to fill orders from Kennewick and other places in the irrigated district of central and eastern Washington. Numerous orders of similar nature have been received by Mr. Forster in the past and he says that at present his outside business exceeds the local orders.

As a maker of showcases, counters, etc., Mr. Forster has also earned an enviable reputation. He recently made a complete set of up-to-date display cases for the Pendleton Drug Store, and his men are now engaged in making a modern meat market display case for the Tweedy meat market.

Matlock to Run Perkins Bar.

The lease for the Perkins hotel bar in the Perkins hotel building, at Fifth and Washington streets, was sold this morning to L. L. Matlock of Heppner for \$10,000. The lease includes the good will of the former owner, Geo. Schultz, and runs for five years, says the Oregon Daily Journal. It is the intention of Matlock to spend \$10,000 between now and the opening on May 4 putting the cafe into shape. It will be finished in Circassian walnut—the only bar in the west finished in that handsome wood. Mr. Schultz, although leasing his Perkins cafe, will not retire, but will continue in the Northern bar in the Swetland building.

E. B. Waffle Will Graduate.

The East Oregonian has just received an invitation to attend the graduating exercises of the medical department of the University of Oregon which will be held in Portland on May 4, and in which a class of 22, including Eldred B. Waffle of this city, will graduate. Mr. Waffle is the son of the pioneers of this city. Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Waffle, and has made excellent progress in passing through the medical department of the university. He will come home for a visit shortly after the graduation exercises, after which he will take the position as house physician in St. Vincent's hospital during the coming summer.
