PENDLETON'S POSITION.

That the other towns of Umatilla county and other parts of Umatilla county may not misunderstand Pendleton's action in refusing to raise a publicity fund at the Tom Richardson meeting Monday night, a word of explanation may be necessary.

It is not that Pendleton and Pendleton property owners do not wish to boost every part of the county; it is not that Pendleton does not want to contribute cash funds for the upbuilding of Milton, Freewater, Adams, Weston, Echo, Hermiston and Umatilla. These are not the reasons.

Pendleton has always been willing to boost every section of the county indiscriminately, constantly and without stint. She has always put forward the inducements of every section and has advertised every section of the county freely and cheerfully and will continue to do so.

But the time is not ripe in this city to get the actual property owners in-

terested. Heretofore the renters have been doing the boosting and paying the bills. The tenants have taxed themselves to build up the county and to increase the value of their landlords' property. This program must stop and the landlord must do something for himself.

The time is coming when Pendleton will raise a bigger publicity fund than any other city in eastern Oregon, or perhaps than any other city in Oregon outside of Portland.

Pendleton has much to advertise. Umatilla county has much to advertise. Homes are needed by thousands in the east and within a short time Pendleton will get into the movement with a whoop and will make this city and county the most advertised section of the northwest.

The East Oregonian asks the outside towns to be patient. Pendleton has always been with you, she is with you now and she will be with you in future. Something is going to be done here. The situation is shaping satisfactorily.

SENATORIAL POLITICS.

The Oregon Daily Journal says that the politics of a United States senator does not amount to much; that a democrat can represent a republican state as well as a republican.

Let us see. United States senators are called upon to vote on the financial question, on the tariff, on foreign policies, on the vital internal questions on which there is a sharp difference between republicans and democrats.

Political principles enter into the activity of a United States senator every day. National policies over which there is a pronounced contest between the parties are considered many times during a session of congress and so the politics of a senator, while not paramount to personal cleanliness and honesty, stands next to these virtues and where it is possible to select a clean, honest republican, republicans have no reason for voting for a democrat and vice versa.

What do the sheepmen of Oregon think of the politics of a United States senator? Will not they support H. M. Cake, a lifelong republican and a clean, honest, fearless man whose principles on the tariff are absolutely known, rather than for a democrat of whose tariff views they know nothing?

Will not the financial interests support a republican whose financial policy would be in accord with republican principles and continued prosperity, rather than for a democrat whose financial policy is either unknown or not definite?

Oregon will elect a republican United States senator without a moment's hesitation because she is a republican state and party principles enter directly into the issue.

In state politics conditions may be switched around to make the election of a democratic governor possible. But there is absolutely no reason for republicans to vote for a democratic senator when they have a clean, capable, strong candidate of their own.

UMATILLA COUNTY'S PRIDE.

The well-bred herds of Rambouillet and Delane sheep which are being sheared in Umatilla county this month are yielding on an average about 12 pounds per head of the finest wool ever produced in Oregon.

Many of the fleeces from the three-year-old ewes are going as high as 29 pounds, while yearlings are shearing as high as nine pounds, making the highest average ever sheared in the county.

These herds are the pride of Umatilla county. Buyers come here from 26 states to buy Umatilla county sheep. They are known throughout the sheep states as the top notch herds of the west. The shearing record of this spring only serves to make more secure their reputation and to insure a wider market for her sheep and wool.

It costs no more to raise and market a good grade of sheep than it does a poor grade. A "scrub" will eat as much as a thoroughbred every day and will not turn out half the profits. So Umatilla county sheepmen are devoting all their efforts to the upbuilding of their herds and to improving the grade of their wool.

That it pays well to do this is shown by the fact that a much higher price per head is paid for Umatilla county sheep than for any others in eastern Oregon. They are bigger, better sheep and command higher prices while the wool clip of this county leads the northwest in high prices.

Yes, the wind blows slightly in eastern Oregon at times, but the windstorms here are but mild, whispering zephyrs, compared to the fierce tornadoes of the Mississippi valley, which leave death, destruction and ruin in their wake.
