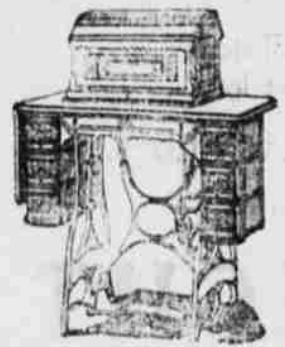

GREATEST MODERN ATHLETIC CARNIVAL

London, April 27.—With the beginning today of the competition in racquets, the London Olympic games which promises to be the greatest athletic carnival of modern times, the racquets competition at Queen's club is a minor event, it has attracted wide attention, as the opening feature of a long program of athletics that will bring to England the greatest gladiators of all lands. The next event on the program will be the covered court lawn tennis competition, beginning May 6. Entries for this event close next Thursday.

July 13 will see the commencement of the athletic program in the stadium, and there are 25 running and kindred events.

Cycling, wrestling and swimming contests also commence on July 13, and as regards the last they will be decided in an exceptionally fine bath. Gymnastics are due on July 14, fencing on the 16th, and archery contests on the 17th.

The golf at Sandwich and Deal will be on June 1, 2 and 3 and polo Hurlingham on June 15. Lawn tennis commences at Wimbledon on July 6, shooting at Bisley on July 8

(claybird shooting at the Uxendon school), rowing at Henley on the 28th, yacht racing at Ryde on the 27th, while there will be motor boat racing in Southampton Water on July 11.

The winter pastimes commence about October 19, Rugby and Association football hockey, and lacrosse being included in the Shepherd's Bush program, while the figure skating will take place on the Prince's Rink.

Altogether the great amateur efforts seems likely to be carried out, and Lord Desborough, the president, and the members of the British Olympic association are being congratulated on the successful accomplishment of the enormous amount of preliminary work necessary to put forward a program in which the interests are so varied.

Even English amateur association footballers have an opportunity to patch up their differences before the Olympic games commence, as their matches are not due until October. The Amateur Football association is not officially represented on the British Olympic council.

NEW SCENIC LINE FOR S.P.

Majave Branch to Tap Beautiful Section This Season.

The Southern Pacific will commence building her first 23 miles of the line from Mojave to a connection with the Nevada and California railway in the Owens river valley next week. The entire length is about 123 miles and is to be completed in 60 days, says the Mt. Whitney, Cal. Sentinel. The road will be broad gauge and in order to make a through line from Mojave to Hazen the road from Keeler to Tonopah junction will have to be standardized a distance of 151 miles. The primary purpose of this line is to make possible the construction of the Los Angeles aqueduct.

In the end, however, with the broad gauging of the Nevada and California below Tonopah junction it will form another through route from southern California to the east via the Southern Pacific. From Tonopah junction to Hazen the line is already broad gauge. This new line will also be the short line to Tonopah and Goldfield and also to Reno and Nevada main line points from the southern part of the state. The new line passes within 18 miles of Johannesburg, through Darwin and a number of promising mining camps. The scenery between Owens lake and Bishop, near the Nevada state line, is said to be unrivaled for grandeur. The Owens valley is 3000 feet above sea level, and the Mount Whitney range with at least 20 peaks in view, approximating 14,000 feet in height rises abruptly to the west.

The increase in altitude in a horizontal distance of five miles is nearly 11,000 feet. This is the most sheer and highest mountain wall in the country, and is surmounted by the highest peak in the United States proper.

NO POOR HOUSE FOR MARY.

Aged Indian Woman Refuses to Leave Her Cabin.

Indian Mary, the last member of the famous tribe of Rogue River Indians, which was once supreme in the southern Oregon country, who has been a city and county charge for several years, is making much trouble for the city officers and council, says an item from Grants Pass. Indian Mary lives in a little house on Pine street that was built by the county, but now that Josephine has a large county home the court has ordered that she leave her cabin and move to the big house on the hill, taking her five-year-old papoose with her.

But Indian Mary, true to her Rogue River blood, refuses to go. She is satisfied with her cabin, and no amount of persuasion on the part of the county court or city council can drive her out. She says she "no will go to chuck-chuck house."

Because of the filthy condition of her cabin, and of the frequent disturbances at her place, the neighbors are complaining, and have presented a remonstrance to the city and to the county court asking her removal, either to the poor farm or to the reservation. Indian Mary has a grown daughter, who is a Chemawa student. The county court has shut off its supply of food and raiment for the old lady, but she gets ample assistance from the Salvation Army and other charitable institutions.

As Indian Mary refuses to go and can be removed from her cabin in no other way, the mayor has ordered the police to take her off by force. As Indian Mary comes of a race that delights in warfare, it is quite evident that there will be considerable excitement around her cabin when the officers appear to enforce the mayor's order.
