FAKE BANK NOTES.

Men Who Circulate Them Go Free Because of No Law.

As a result of the ruling of Judge Wolverton in the federal court in dismissing the cases against Frank Caviness, J. N. Saylor, M. J. Dorsey and James Sheehan, jointly charged with having made fraudulent use of the mails in securing spurious bank notes from a Chicago curio firm and then passing them on the residents of this community, the United States District attorney's office and the secret service department realize that they have a grave problem to face, says a Portland paper.

Attorney McCourt this morning announced that there were no other charges on which the men could be arraigned, and admitted that they would be at liberty to traffic in the spurious notes with as much freedom as before. The United States attorney declared that every section of the statute relating in any way to the crime of the four men had been thoroughly studied and gone into, but to no avail.

Attorney McCourt also announced that another attempt to have the United States district attorney's office in Chicago investigate the dealings of the curio store of Stevens & Co., in supplying the spurious notes will be made.

The secret service department warns everybody to carefully examine all notes offered them and not to accept any on the Merchants & Planters Bank of Georgia, which is a defunct institution.

R. H. Wells, who was arrested with the rest of the offenders, and who pleaded guilty, was allowed to withdraw his plea in acknowledgement of the aid he has lent the government, and the indictment against him was dismissed.

DIFFERENCES SETTLED.

Harriman Lines Have Understanding With Employes.

That the differences between the Harriman lines and its employes have been satisfactorily adjusted as a result of the Chicago conference, is the statement of Conductor William Buckley of The Dalles, who represented the conductors of the entire O. R. & N. system in the conference, and E. M. Cross of the Pilot Rock branch, who represented the brakemen of the system, both of whom have just returned from Chicago.

A general conference of all the western railroads and their employes has just been held in Chicago and a number of grievances were settled satisfactorily and there will be no further difficulty it is believed. The trouble arising under the working of the 16-hour federal law it is believed, has been settled and hereafter men will not be tied up away from home, where it is possible to get them to their terminal within the limit of the 16-hour day.

The employes are delighted with the result of the conference and with the consideration shown them by the railroad officials in all their discussions and conferences.

To Attend Graduation.

ENGINEMEN SHOW GREAT EFFICIENCY

A summary of the results of "surprise tests" on the lines of the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific railroads for the month of March shows an efficiency percentage of 98.8 for the engine-men. During the month 1258 tests were made.

These tests are part of the general scheme for insuring safe travel on the Harriman lines. The installation of automatic block signals has progressed to such an extent that there are more miles of track equipped with "automatics" on the Union Pacific-Southern Pacific system now than on any other railroad system in the world.

Recently a training school car was fitted out, to move from one point to another for the instruction of employes. Officials of long experience explain the various kinds of signals and safety devices to the men, who are taught how to operate them in the proper manner.

The "surprise tests" consist of flashing all kinds of signals upon unsuspecting engine-men. At dozens of

MURDER TRIALS AT HEPNER

FIRST JURY TERM IN A YEAR A BIG ONE.

Grand Jury Will Be Called and Several Criminal Cases to Be Disposed of—Bank Holidays Last Fall Interfered With Morrow County's Court Business—Fee Will Help Defend Doherty.

There will be two murder cases, many minor criminal matters, and a grand jury to occupy the attention of the circuit court at the May term to be held at Heppner. It will be the first regular jury term held there for a year and the cases represent the accumulated business of 12 months.

Judge Bean and District Attorney Phelps returned yesterday afternoon from Heppner, where they had been for the purpose of setting cases for trial. The jury term will commence Monday, May 11.

The murder cases up for trial are those of Webb McCaslin, charged with killing Kaspell, the butcher, and Dan Doherty, who killed Oscar Allen in a Lexington saloon not long ago.

Apparently the Doherty case is to be hard fought. Judge James A. Fee has been retained to assist Redfield & Van Vactor in the defense and District Attorney Phelps will have to battle against three legal heavyweights.

Redfield & Van Vactor of Heppner, will also defend McCaslin.

That he will ask for a grand jury was stated this morning by Mr. Phelps. According to the prosecutor, there are a number of gambling, liquor to minor and other complaints which he wishes to have passed upon by a grand jury. Also the two murder cases will first be passed upon by the grand jury before the trials occur.

No term of court was held at Heppner last fall because of the holidays and the governor's omission of two days made it impossible for a session to be held after the holiday period was over. A special term was held during the winter, but no jury business was taken up.

WALLA WALLA CELEBRATES.

Walla Walla is already preparing for a grand Fourth of July celebration and this morning the Pendleton band received a communication asking upon what terms the organization will play at the Garden City on that occasion. The letter was received by A. H. Johnson, of the local band, and stated that aside from employing several bands for the occasion the committee intends conducting a band contest and to award suitable prizes to the bands making the best showing.

Thus far Mr. Johnson has not answered the letter as the band first wishes to learn if a celebration is to be held in this city this year.
