

LIEVALLEN HAS DECLINED TO RUN

DEMOCRATIC NOMINEE

RECOMMENDS SHAW.

Adams Pioneer Who Was Nominated for the Legislature Gives Way to Hudson Bay Candidate—Commends Statement No. 1 and Tells of Its Widespread Indorsement by the People.

Adams, Ore., April 30, 1908. (Editor East Oregonian.)—I wish to thank the people who voted for me in the recent primary election and in nominating me for representative on the democratic ticket. I did not seek the nomination, and did not know that any voter would consider my name in connection with the nomination. For many reasons which it is not necessary for me to mention, I respectfully decline the nomination and refuse to allow my name to be considered as a candidate.

I am heartily in favor of statement No. 1, and hope to see candidates who are pledged to this principle, regardless of party affiliations, elected. I shall support and work for every candidate for the legislature who is pledged to this principle. It is the nearest thing the people can favor toward electing United States senators by direct vote of the people and in doing away with "hold ups" in the legislature. It is a measure in behalf of all of the people and party politics has nothing to do with it.

I am told that W. T. Shaw, of Free-water, is highly spoken of as an independent candidate for the legislature. I have personally known him for 30 years. He is an old pioneer who is well acquainted with the needs of Umatilla county, and he is a firm believer in the people's rights and statement No. 1. In other words, he has the "seven year itch" of this popular measure principle and, along with him, regardless of party, are thousands of other good men who have the best interests of Oregon at heart and are willing to catch this very contagious disease and suffer its "pangs" for the welfare of good clean political methods in Oregon politics.

The common people are beginning to realize that they are capable of self government without the dictations of the "boss" and statement No. 1 is one of the cherished principles of the common people and they are determined to see it triumph.

These are rival towns, and as the ships of the fleet will be divided between them, each will seek to outdo the other in the lavishness of its celebration. of Monterey sent up such a cry and clamor that the navy department succumbed and ordered a division of the fleet. This did not please the citizens of Santa Cruz, who desired to have the whole show to themselves, but Monterey is jubilant and its business men are intent upon showing the rival city just how a battleship fleet should be entertained.

To a misinterpretation of some orders sent out from the navy department to Rear Admiral Evans seems to be due the controversy between Santa Cruz and Monterey. On account of this misunderstanding it was originally decided that Santa Cruz should have the whole fleet, leaving Monterey in the cold. Thereupon Monterey citizens got busy. They set forth that their town was entitled to as much consideration as Santa Cruz; that it was the first capital of the state and had many historical attractions for the men of the fleet; that with its own population and that immediately adjacent more residents would find it convenient to go to Monterey than to Santa Cruz, and that in any event Santa Cruz had not the necessary facilities to entertain all the fleet, either in its harbor or in its hotels.

Messages flew back and forth between Washington and the rival towns. Monterey put up a strong fight and gained its point. Hence each town will receive half the ships for the full period of the scheduled stay.

SONS OF REVOLUTIONS.

Descendants of Men Who Bled and Died for America.

Buffalo, N. Y., April 30.—Men whose ancestors fought and bled and died during the "times that tried men's souls" gathered in Buffalo today by the hundreds for the nineteenth annual congress of the Sons of the American Revolution. Among the delegates are many men of great prominence, who have attained to even greater fame than did their forefathers in the stirring days of 1776. From every state and territory, from Hawaii and even from Europe the Sons of the Revolution have come and every hour of their three days' stay in Buffalo will be taken up with important business meetings, banquets, receptions and addresses.

A meeting of the trustees of the national society was held this morning in the Iroquois Hotel, followed by a reception to the visitors by the members of the local chapter. Addresses of welcome were made by Mayor J. N. Adam, on behalf of the city of Buffalo, and by officers of the Buffalo chapter. A business session, devoted principally to reports from the national officers, followed the reception. An automobile excursion was the feature of this afternoon's program. The election of national officers will be held tomorrow. A banquet will be held tomorrow evening and an excursion to Niagara Falls on Saturday.

The National association now numbers about 20,000 members. Every state has its society and in addition to the chapters in Paris and Hawaii, another is being formed in Manila. The present officers of the National association are Nelson A. McCleary, of Chicago, president general; Truman G. Avery, first vice president general; A. Howard Clark of the Smithsonian Institute of Washington secretary general, and Willard Secor of Forest City, Iowa, treasurer general.

SPIRITUALISM FRAUD.

Two Women Arrested for Swindling Blind Woman Out of \$20,000.

Denver, April 30.—Leonora Pierce, aged 19, and Miss Greyeta Fulmer, aged 22, were arrested in this city today, charged with having obtained nearly \$20,000 from Mrs. Harriet A. Crowe, 67 years old and blind, by false pretenses. Mrs. Crowe, who is the widow of a former prominent business man of Dillon, Mont., was introduced to Mrs. Pierce about a year ago by a spiritualist. Mrs. Pierce, it is said, claimed she could restore Mrs. Crowe's sight by spiritual treatment and on three different occasions it is charged, obtained from her \$5,000 in fees for her services. Miss Fulmer introduced Mrs. Pierce and they would talk to Mrs. Crowe for hours at a time, inducing her to believe she was receiving sight. Recently Mrs. Crowe's suspicion became aroused and her attorney caused the arrest.

Died Hard.

An unknown stranger, well dressed, committed suicide Saturday afternoon in a room of the Leland lodging house at Missoula, Mont., firing two bullets into his brain, either one of which it is believed was sufficient to have caused instant death, and actually pulled the trigger of his gun a third time, but the cartridge missed fire. While attempting to blow up a mouse's nest with powder, Frank Spallinger, aged 15, of Dayton, Wash., was terribly injured, one eye being practically ruined.

Last Suspect Caught.

A Montenegrin, believed to be the fourth member of the gang responsible for the death of Marshal Miller at Kent, Wash., recently, was arrested at Cle Elum Sunday. He will be taken to Kent today for identification. The man gave his name as Anton Corcorious, but his description is said to answer that of Bosovich, one of the gang. He was found in a box car and was armed.

Shot Neighbor's Stock.

J. N. Jacobson, a rancher living near Coquille, was arrested and bound over to the circuit court with a \$200 bond for shooting a neighbor's stock which was bothering his fields, but which was in the road at the time he shot. Several men saw the act. He killed one horse and wounded another, besides several cattle.

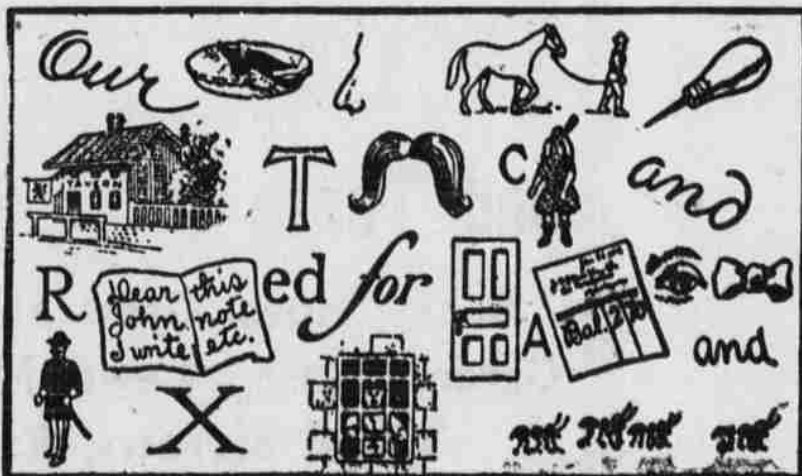
