JUNK SHOP OR NO JUNK SHOP

QUESTION IS AGAIN UP TO THE COUNCIL

Jack Brown Wants to Reopen Hide House on West Webb Street—Asks For Amendment to City Ordinance—Levee Repairs Discussed—Perkins Avenue to Be Further Improved—Court Street to Be Extended to Dump Grounds.

Once more the junk shop question is before the council and if the present city ordinance regarding such establishments is amended as suggested last night the Webb street people will again smell the sweet odors to which they so strenuously objected some months ago.

The proposition of changing the junk ordinance was taken up at the instance of Jack Brown, who wishes to reopen his place on West Webb. At present the ordinance bars a junk shop from being located within 200 feet of any residence property. In order that he may resume business Brown asks that the distance be reduced to 50 feet and last night City Attorney Raley was directed to draft an ordinance making the present one less radical.

Levee Repairs Discussed. Resolutions were passed providing for the improvement by contract of Perkins avenue and other streets on the north side. The work is to be done by contract and many of the property owners submitted bids for their own work.

Extend Court Street. The report of the city engineer regarding the extension of Court street, so as to provide a roadway to the dumping grounds, was read and accepted. Mr. Kimbrell was also given the title of city engineer.

PENDLETON PETS TAKE ANOTHER

GAS BLOWERS LOSE OUT IN CLOSE GAME

Fourth Straight Victory For Lorimer's Ball Tossers—O'Brien's Imported Players Could Not Fathom Parkes' Slants—Little Twirler Causes Twelve Men in Sugar Beet Uniforms to Fan the Air.

La Grande, April 29.—The Pendleton Pets won from the La Grande Gas Blowers today by a score of 8 to 6.

In the first inning the Pets crossed the plate on a base on balls to Van Houten, Conrad's sacrifice and outs by Gray, Parkes and Lee.

They scored three more in the fifth when O'Brien fumbled Collins' slow grounder and hits by Van Houten, Conrad and a two-bagger by Gray.

Nothing more doing for the Pets until the ninth canto, when Collins flew out to O'Brien, Van Houten hit for two bases, Conrad singled, Gray jammed out a two bagger, Parkes out from Lodell to Pindy, Lee and Baker both hit for one base, Shockey struck out. Four earned runs. Total, Pendleton, 8.

For La Grande nothing doing in the first inning. In the second Emerich struck out, Parkes planted one in Isaacs ribs and the Jew stole second and third. Purdy drew a walk, but Isaacs scored on passed ball by Conrad.

In the fourth the Gas Blowers registered one on Lodell's single, a stolen base, Isaacs out and Purdy's sacrifice. Again in the sixth Lodell scored on being hit by Parkes, stole second and scored on Emerich's hit.

Three were rung up for the La Grande team in the ninth, on a two-bagger by Kroozier, singles by Higgins and O'Brien. Total, La Grande, 6.
