PETS LOSE FOR THE FIRST TIME

DROP CONSOLATION TO LA GRANDE TEAM

Baseball Boys Return from Sugar Beet Town With One Victory and One Defeat—Close Game Ends in Score of 4 to 1—Taliaferro Makes Good Showing in the Box—Errors Contribute Largely to the Defeat.

By a score of 4 to 1 La Grande won from Pendleton yesterday on the La Grande grounds.

The game was close and exciting from start to finish and was the best exhibition of the National pastime put up by either team this season.

Manager O'Brien tagged Fuechell, a recent acquisition from the Seattle league team, to do the twirling for La Grande and while he pitched nice ball he is far from being of league caliber.

Manager Lorimer introduced Taliaferro, last year with The Dalles, to bend them over for the Pets, and with a little more practice will hold his own with any pitcher in the country, as he has speed and a nice assortment of curves, but is a little shy on control.

Following is how it happened. First inning for Pendleton, Van Houten singled, Conrad in trying to sacrifice, popped up a fly which Van Horst caught, doubling Van Houten at first, Gray singled, Parkes struck out. Nothing more was doing for the Pets until the eighth canto. Van Houten doubled to left center, Conrad followed suit, scoring Van Houten, Gray out at first, Conrad out at third, Parkes out at first.

First inning, Van Horst for La Grande, reached first on Lee's error, stole second, went to third on O'Brien's out from Van Houten to Collins scored on Baker's error.

BOISE TEAM NEEDS FUNDS.

Idaho Capital Will Raise \$1000 Per Month for Baseball.

The Boise Capital News says of the efforts to strengthen the baseball team in that city by raising more funds:

A soliciting committee of boosters for the Boise baseball team, the "Senators," and composed of C. H. Groat, W. E. Pierce, J. A. Blomquist, James Luck, D. A. Utter and Manager Hubbard, was appointed at a meeting of baseball enthusiasts held last evening in the parlors of the Idanha hotel to solicit funds for the local team.

At the meeting it was decided that \$1000 a month was needed to bring the team through the season successfully and an effort will be made by the committee to raise the money.

In order that the management of the team may be on a sound basis by which all funds will be accounted for and other details arranged, it was voted at the meeting last evening to guarantee a salary of \$75 a month to Secretary High, who will have charge of the business concerning the team, gate receipts, etc., in the future.

Those present at last evening's meeting stated that they believed the "Senators" could be the pennant winners this year if the players are carefully selected to make up the baseball squad.

The general sentiment prevailed that the locals need strengthening both in men and team work and this will be done immediately. Because the "Senators" lost the second game so disastrously to Payette Sunday, it is claimed, is no reason that the locals should not be supported through the rest of the season. This defeat demonstrated that the team needs practice and a change in lineup and as a number of new men will arrive in the city this week this will be done.

All present at the meeting were enthusiastic about the baseball season and pledged themselves to do everything in their power to work up local support as it is believed that a winning team cannot be placed on the diamond without such support.

POLICE JUDGE SHOWS METTLE

REPEATER AND INSISTENT PRISONER MADE TO SUFFER

Senator Mitchell Appears Three Days in Succession and Is Fined Accordingly—Shepherd Is Fined Five Dollars and Then Five Dollars Twice in Succession for Contempt of Court.

There was ire in the eye of Pendleton's police judge this morning and two of those who were taken before him at 9 o'clock afterwards wished they had not transgressed the laws of the city.

To face a bunch of bleary-eyed drunks each morning is not a pleasant job at best, for those who come before Judge Fitz Gerald are for the most part human wrecks, cast up by the city's tide, and they look the part. But it seems especially disagreeable to the judge to see the same faces repeatedly.

This morning Senator Mitchell, Indian allottee and champion firewater destroyer of the reservation, was brought before the court for the third time in three successive days.

"You were here yesterday, also," said Judge Fitz Gerald, when the senator had pleaded guilty to being drunk. To this Senator Mitchell granted an assent and he also acknowledged without shame that he had likewise been in attendance the day before yesterday.

"You are fined \$8 or four days in jail," was the answer.

The next man up was a shepherd for J. E. Smith and he endeavored to convince the judge that it would be only reasonable to let him depart for he wished to work and really could not afford to pay a fine. But it was an old story and made no impression, so the usual fine of \$5 was imposed.

Before leaving the fellow again undertook to argue his case and because he would not stop was fined \$5 for contempt of court.

"There is no reason in that," he said, angrily, "and you can make it \$5 more if you want to."

"Alright," answered Judge Fitz Gerald, "you are fined \$15 or seven and a half days in jail."

Attorney Brings Suit Against Mrs. Helen Stoessel.

Suit was filed in the circuit court today by Douglas W. Bailey against Mrs. Helen Stoessel, widow of the late Emilie Stoessel, the insurance man who died following a runaway accident on Birch creek.
