TEXAS IS AFTER BAILEY'S SCALP

MOMENTOUS POLITICAL
STRUGGLE IS NOW ON.

Question Is to Be Settled in Primaries Tomorrow—Senator's Standard Oil Dealings Are Being Urged Against Him—A Life and Death Fight for Him Politically.

Houston, Texas, May 1.—Whether United States Senator J. W. Bailey shall be sent to Denver as one of the delegates at large from Texas is the question to be determined at primaries tomorrow. The fight between the Baileytes and the anti-Baileytes has been the most momentous political struggle since the republic of Texas entered the Union, and has been contested with unprecedented bitterness by both sides. Senator Bailey has been speaking almost constantly for weeks and has made an almost superhuman effort to maintain his threatened political supremacy in Texas.

The fight against Bailey began with the airing of the charges that he had been in the employ and had received large sums of money from the Waters-Pierce Oil company, a branch of the Standard Oil company, which the state officials were attempting to oust from Texas on the ground that it had violated the anti-trust laws.

Result Means Much.

Tomorrow's primaries will be a life and death fight for Bailey, politically speaking. While he is elected to the senate for another six-year term only a year ago, it is admitted by his closest friends that his defeat in the present contest would be equivalent to a demand for his resignation. In his public addresses at the time his reelection to the senate was pending, he said that if a majority of the democrats of the state should declare themselves as opposed to him in primary, he would resign his seat. The men who are leading the present fight against him say he will have an opportunity to fulfill that pledge.

Both sides are already claiming victory. The campaign managers for Mr. Bailey say that he will be chosen a delegate-at-large to the national convention by a majority of 50,000. The anti-Bailey managers claim that Cone Johnson, who heads the ticket as Mr. Bailey's opponent will be named by a majority of 60,000 to 70,000. There is no way of arriving at a reliable estimate of how the vote will stand.

Bailey and anti-Bailey clubs have been organized in almost every town and village in the state. In some localities the campaign has been at white heat. In the larger cities, such as Dallas, Waco, Houston, Galveston, and Austin, the statement of the democrats is overwhelmingly anti-Bailey. It is said that in San Antonio and Fort Worth the Bailey supporters are probably in a small majority. The more thickly populated counties in the agricultural belt of the state are said to be strongly opposed to Bailey, while in the ranch territory of western and southwestern Texas, where the voting population is principally stockmen, Bailey is the favorite.

It is claimed by the managers of the anti-Bailey campaign that an enormous amount of money is being expended on behalf of Bailey, and that the trust interests, which they say Mr. Bailey has represented for several years, are putting up the funds. At the recent rally of Bailey supporters at Fort Worth \$25,000 was subscribed by those present for the expenses of the campaign. The anti-Bailey people have raised about \$5000 for the same purpose.

Some of the leading democrats of Texas are on the side that is fighting Bailey. Among these men are ex-Attorney General C. K. Bell, Justice

WHO OWNS THE NORTH BANK?

OWNERSHIP OF NORTH
BANK ROAD IN DOUBT

One-Third Interest Deeded to Northern Pacific—Another Third Will Go to the Great Northern—Owner of Remaining Third Is Unknown, But May Be Jim Hill.

The Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway company has sold a one-third interest in its entire properties and lines to the Northern Pacific railroad company. A deed conveying these interests was placed on file at Vancouver today. It is said another third interest will within the next few days be conveyed in the same manner to the Great Northern Railway company. The ownership of the remaining 33 1-3 per cent is not divulged.

The transferring of a one-third interest in the north bank road to each of the Northern and Great Northern railway companies is a matter occasioning considerable surprise. It has always been supposed that the road was jointly owned, share and share alike, by the two big railroad systems comprising the Hill interests in the extreme northwest.

These big companies have given it out that they were furnishing the money equally to build the road that is to be the key to the Columbia river basin and the Willamette valley from all points on the northern lines. The question that now looks most interesting is: Who owns the unnamed 33 1-3 per cent, or the controlling influence, in the north bank road. Echo answers "Jim Hill."

Despite the apparent harmony between the systems controlled by the Hill crowd, there is usually to be found within the inner workings of these corporations one dominant controlling power that is linked directly to a single corporation. In this instance it is evidently the Great Northern. Mr. Hill is taking no chances.

Not since the Great Northern Securities case has been from under the shadow of federal control. The possibility that some day the government will step in and decree to him a divorce from the triple alliance between Great Northern, Northern Pacific and Burlington, makes him cautious in placing control of new properties constructed under his administration.

The consideration named in the transfer of a one-third interest in the north bank road to the Northern Pacific is \$1,500,000. This nominal sum does not, of course, represent 33 1-3 per cent of the cost of the road. The price to be named for the Great Northern's third interest will probably be the same sum. The real ownership will remain with the men unnamed who hold the other one-third interest, and in all probability these men are officers of the Great Northern Railway company.

CHRISTIAN PARTY.

Will Nominate Man for President of the United States.

Rock Island, Ill., May 1.—Delegates from several states gathered at Black Hawk Watch Tower today for the national convention of the United Christian party, which will nominate or recommend for president and vice-president of the United States. Several candidates have been suggested, but the choice of the convention is yet uncertain.

According to National Chairman William R. Benkert, "the Decalogue and the Golden Rule form the only just foundations for a righteous government, and the time has come when we as a nation must lift up this standard to the world, obey God's commandments and apply His rules to all our laws and governments, or fall." The party leaders demand a recognition of God and Jesus Christ in the constitution and the passage of constitutional amendments making this officially a Christian nation.

THE VOTE IS COUNTED.

Official Returns from Primary Election are Now In.

A Salem dispatch says of the final official returns of the primary election:

The official canvass of returns of the recent primary election was made today. The official count shows that John A. Jeffrey defeated A. J. Derby for democratic nomination for congress in the second district, by three votes. R. Robertson, who was a candidate for railroad commissioner in the first district on the republican ticket, has been nominated by the democrats, his name having been written into the Democratic ballot. He has not yet accepted the nomination. Judge Bean was nominated by both parties and accepted both nominations. The totals for state and district officers are as follows:

Richards for congressman, were offered for filing in the secretary's office, but were not filed because of the time for presenting such certificate expired March 16. Talbert and Richards are also circulating petitions for nomination which can be filed up to May 1.
