

## THE VERY LATEST FAD IN PARASOLS

New York, April 30.—In "the good old summer time" which is now rapidly approaching, millady of fashion will need a new stock of parasols to protect her delicate complexion from the torrid rays of Old Sol. The New York shop keeper has had this idea in mind for some time, and the result is one of the most elaborate displays of sunshades that have ever been shown in this city. As in the past, the woman who desires to be "in style" will have a parasol to match every dress.

The distinctively new feature in parasols is the use of pongee, and very handsome they are as well as practical. In the natural colored material they can be used with a great number of costumes and it is in the natural color that they are most often seen. Border effects, too, are singularly satisfactory in combination and there are both lined and unlined sorts offered, so that there is ample opportunity for choice and a great many things are provided for in the one material.

There are a great many contrasting border effects and many of them are exceedingly beautiful, but there are also tucked borders, and the plain coaching parasol is always in order for general use. For the carriage the simple sunshade of lace over white silk with the hinged handle will be exceedingly used and no doubt its very general revival is in art due to the needs of the motor car, for it shades the eyes without becoming the toy for the wind and it really provides all the protection that is needed while its form is such that it is easily adjusted. But no one style of parasol can be said to prevail for the carriage any more than for street. For lingerie costumes and those to which lingerie styles are suited, there is a whole host of exquisite things in linen that are embroidered and lace trimmed and that are just as dainty and fascinating as well can be.

White silk parasols will be seen both in the plain varieties and those that are painted or printed in lovely floral designs. There are those that have Dresden designs upon them, and lace insets that perfectly fit the sections as though they were made for them. Many of the new parasols are of light colored silks with tucked and bordered edges, which will be used at the seaside and summer resorts.

Among this host of sunshades were a number of dark greens, some of brown and even navy blue with printed borders, and some that looked as though they were cut from very wide ribbon with fancy borders. A favorite style seems to be a group of three tuks with a border above on the darker colored parasols.

Painting is always a favorite mode of decoration, but to be satisfactory it must be done very well. Great trailing branches of roses, wistaria, a loose bunch of violets or a number of lilacs, as though strewn across the sections, are much liked as designs.

Embroidery is another feature of decoration that is as much liked for parasols and sunshades as it is for gowns and dress accessories. There are beautifully embroidered Japanese styles and all sorts of embroideries are used as well as the introduction of laces and woven insets.

Of course, there is the lace and chiffon parasols, which are used for very dressy functions and for carriage use. In contrast with these are those of cretonne and it is said in Paris that they are quite the fad, while a few have been shown on this side of the

water, but a whole parasol of cretonne is not to many minds an artistic effect.

Handles are of many kinds. For the plain coaching parasol, handsome wood is preferred to everything else, but there are to be noticed some extreme effects in the carvings, such as birds' heads, swans' necks and the heads of animals; but after all the simple, plain finished knob handle is liked best by women of good taste. For the more elaborate parasols of lace, embroidered borders, painted or printed effects, long handles of delicately tinted wood that resembles enamel, topped with a gold or gold set with a jewel at the end, are much favored. Some handles are shown of bone with fine carvings upon them, especially those of ivory.

### WHAT CAREY ACT DOES.

#### Senator Clark Sums Up Advantages of Reclamation Plan.

Senator Clark of Wyoming, in submitting a report from the senate committee on public lands in favor of senate resolution No. 65 introduced by Senator Warren, to add 1,000,000 acres of land to Wyoming's quota under the Carey desert land act, furnished the following information in reference to the operations of this act in Wyoming:

"Under the provisions of this act the state of Washington has already applied for nearly 800,000 acres, and surveys are now being made and applications prepared for additional amounts, which will far exceed the amount originally mentioned in said law. The committee is of the opinion that the operations of the act should not be hindered or impeded and that the additional acreage should be made available.

"The operations of the Carey act in dealing with the arid lands have been most beneficial. Its workings have resulted in immeasurable benefit to the states concerned, and have under the dual guardianship of the nation and state, eliminating almost entirely speculative holdings so far as land acquired under this act is concerned. Under this law and its operations no land is segregated to the state until both the state and general government are satisfied that the lands desired are to be, can be, and will be at once available for irrigation and homes. No persons can acquire under this law more than 160 acres and the whole transaction is so guarded as to insure in the highest degree honest operation as well as the actual settlement and improvement of the land. This law operates to reclaim tracts of land where the labor and expense is beyond the means of the individual settler and tracts usually not of sufficient area to attract the attention of the reclamation service."

### IDAHO IS MISREPRESENTED.

#### Nebraska Firm Hears That Range Horses Are Being Killed.

The county clerk's office is in receipt of a letter from a horsebuyer's firm in Liberty, Neb., who states that they read in a paper that there is a large number of horses in this state being killed off on account of the fact that they are eating up all of the grazing land, says the Boise Capital News.

The firm desires to buy such horses at \$2 a head if arrangements can be

made so that the horses will be placed in a pen along the railroad track so that they can be shipped east. The writer of the missive must have been laboring under some kind of an hallucination when he read the paper or else there has been a grievous error in the wording of the item.

The letter, which is signed by the firm's name, Winney & Whitmore, reads as follows: "County Clerk Boise City, Idaho.—Sir: As I seen a notice advertised in the paper that there is a good many horses in your part of the country that are eating up all the grazing country and that they are beginning to kill those horses. Now I will buy 8 to 10 carloads of those horses if we could get the horses put in the shipping pens anywhere along the railroad at a reasonable price. Please let me hear from you at once in regard to this. Perhaps there is some fellows that would rather get 6 or 8 hundred out of 3 or 4 hundred head of those horses than to kill them."

The county clerk's force is at loss to understand how such a report has got out and cannot explain the matter.

### Earthquake Predicted.

Harry McCue, an aged seer and prophet of Lake Whatcom, Wn., predicts that there will be an earthquake in Utah within eight to 11 days that will submerge the state. He also says the reason the weather is continuing so cold in this vicinity is because of the wickedness of the people. There is little chance of warmer weather until June, he says. He also predicts an unusually dry summer.

A dispatch from Astoria says the outlook for lumber is gradually growing brighter than it has been for several months. Many orders are now being received for shipment to points east of the Missouri river.

## CLOSER VIEW OF CROOK COUNTY FEUD

The Prineville Review gives the following detailed account of the recent burning of property belonging to J. N. Williamson in Crook county. The news dispatches of the East Oregonian told of the affair at the time, but this is a more detailed account. The Review says:

This city was treated to a big surprise Saturday afternoon in the shape of the arrest of C. Sam Smith, former sheriff of Crook county, on a charge of arson. J. N. Williamson is the complainant and the property destroyed was the steam shearing plant, ranch house and barn belonging to Mr. Williamson 18 miles east of this city.

Two weeks ago Sheriff Frank Elkins, investigating the fire, found a piece of bridge belonging to Elliott, which was identified by Elliott's little boy as the property of his father. Elliott was taken into custody a week ago Monday and "sweated," and in a few days had confessed, implicating the ex-sheriff and his 14-year-old son, Stanley Smith, in the burning of the shearing plant and cutting the wire fence on the B. F. Allen place, close by, which was leased by Williamson and used as range for some of his sheep.

Sheriff Elkins wired District Attorney Menefee at The Dalles to come and take charge of the case, feeling that he needed legal advice before proceeding with the matter. Mr. Menefee appeared Sunday night and went to work on the evidence. After sitting all week as a grand jury he ordered the arrest of Mr. Smith and his son, who in response to the sheriff's phone came in and gave themselves up. The boy, being young, was not given a cell, but turned over to the custody of Dick Vandeventer until court meets, the first Monday in next month.

No information can be gleaned from the sheriff's office, which is sealed up

tight as a drum. To all inquiries the same reply is given: "Wait till court meets; everything will come out then." Evidently Judge Bradshaw is to have a busy time.

### Defends Smith.

People should listen with toleration to rumors about the Smith case which are going the rounds. Street talk is everywhere to be heard, but no one should condemn a man until he is in a position to be heard in his own defense.

While the district attorney seems to have found enough against Sam Smith to order his arrest, yet up to this time, so far as the public is able to learn from official sources, Lark Elliott is the only one on whom the penitentiary has a firm grip. It is the jury that will ultimately decide the fate of the two defendants, and street talk amounts to absolutely nothing.

If Mr. Smith shall be found to have had a hand in the wilful destruction of his neighbor's property, no matter how great the provocation, then it would be only a fool who might say he should not be punished; for that is anarchy.

So far, however, he has not been adjudged guilty, and until he has and his family should receive only sympathy, not condemnation, from the people of the city and county. Let the jury decide the case for or against him.
