Miss Batchelor Delights Classical Audience—Recital Fund Grows.

Pendleton's musical event of the season was the recital last evening at the home of J. Ross Dickson by Miss Frances Batchelor, the talented concert pianist of Portland, and Mrs. Anna Selick-Norton, the contralto of this city.

Mrs. Norton's ability is well known not only in Pendleton but throughout the northwest, but Miss Batchelor appeared before a local audience for the first time and delighted and charmed the lovers of classical music with her marvelous technique, touch, interpretation and expression. Only 17 years of age, those who are capable of judging declare that her playing last night was truly wonderful and that she is destined to be one of the country's greatest performers on the piano.

Mrs. J. Ross Dickson served as accompanist for Mrs. Norton and was at her best.

The recital was for the benefit of the rectory fund of the Church of the Redeemer. The house was filled to overflowing and a neat sum was added to the \$2000 and more that have already been raised for the new rectory.

TRACEY'S CAPTOR NEAR TO DEATH

E. A. FARNHAM SAID TO BE DYING AT DENVER.

Pioneer Officer of Colorado Who Has Broken Up Many Outlaw Gangs, Is Near the End—One of the Bravest of Colorado's Pioneers—Wife Hastens to His Bedside.

The following dispatch to the Portland Journal from Denver will be of interest to many who remember Tracey, the outlaw, who escaped from the state penitentiary at Salem:

One of the bravest of the old-time officers of the west, E. A. Farnham, of Steamboat Springs, is dying at St. Luke's hospital. His condition is so serious that a telegram has been sent to his wife asking her to make all haste to Denver.

It was Mr. Farnham more than any one else who succeeded in finally riding Brown's Park of its gang of outlaws. He captured single handed the outlaw Harry Tracey after Tracey had murdered Valentine Hoy. Tracey afterwards escaped from prison, and in his efforts to avoid arrest killed seven or eight men of the possees who followed him in a perilous hunt through Oregon and Washington. Finally Tracey was surrounded in a wheatfield a few miles from Spokane and killed himself in the night by sending a bullet through his brain.

Farnham has lived in Routt county for a quarter of a century, and his name has been a terror to "bad men." Brown's Park, which is the extreme northwestern corner of Colorado and adjoins the "hole in the wall" country, where "Butch" Cassidy and his gang so long made their headquarters, was the scene of many of Farnham's exploits. He had no fear, and Cassidy never attempted to cross the line into this state as long as Farnham was the peace officer of Routt county.

Many stories could be told of Farnham's bravery. He was a man of few words and slow to anger, but of great determination. The Hoyes, who were among the oldest settlers in the county and of great respectability, were among his closest friends. Valentine Hoy was killed by Harry Tracey at a watering hole because Tracey, who was then an outlaw with a price upon his head, feared that Hoy would cause his arrest. Farnham took up the chase at once and did not stop until Tracey's capture. J. C. Hoy, the brother, still lives on the Routt county ranch.

WANT STATE TO HELP.

Federal Men Resent State's Apathy in Fight on Mange.

Because no efforts are now being made by the state to eradicate mange among the horses of this section, there is some resentment in federal circles and unless some steps are taken by the state veterinarian the government men may take little interest in the subject hereafter.

Mange has prevailed for years among the Indian ponies of the reservation and within a short time all the horses will be dipped under the supervision of a federal inspector.

But it has also been disclosed that mange exists among the horses off the reservation also and complaints have been sent to the state veterinarian. However, no attention has been paid them thus far and if the state is going to do anything it has thus far given no sign.

TO DREDGE WILLAMETTE.

Shoals Have Formed Early in the Channel of the River.

Shoals which have formed in the channel of the Upper Willamette river will be dug out by the government much earlier this season than usual in order that the boats may be kept in continuous service throughout the low-water season in July and August without experiencing the trouble they have been obliged to contend with heretofore, says the Salem Statesman.

Captain J. Newt Graham of the United States snagboat Mathoma, came up the river on the steamer Pomona yesterday for the purpose of ascertaining the location of the worst shoals. When he secures the desired information the Mathoma and dipper dredge No. 2 will be brought up there from the Government moorings, where they have been lying idle for the past three weeks.

Until Graham makes his inspection the amount of work which will be required and how long it will take to finish the proposed dredging will not be known.

PEACHES

We know of a man who took off \$2000 an acre from peaches last year. Some are said to have done even better than that. Mr. Page, the greatest commission merchant of the Pacific Northwest, and who is buying all kinds of fruit and produce from every growing section of the country, is authority for the statement that the Furnish-Coe lands will produce peaches two weeks earlier than any other region in the Northwest. We can lay them down in Portland at a little over half the cost for transportation from the Southern Oregon peach orchards. Early crop—cheap transportation—that is a great pair of twins for the peach business. We expect our lands to be of greater value than any other peach region in the Northwest.

Prof. Thornber, of the State Agricultural College, Pullman, recommends us to plant Elberta, Foster, Hill's Chili, Salway, Early and Late Crawfords, Wheatland and Hale varieties. Page urges Elbertas. Each of these varieties have been put in this spring.

Peaches will begin bearing in three years. We are planting potatoes between the trees.

Sessions & Frazier are contracting to care for the young trees for three years for one-third of the crop they can get from between the trees.
