MODERN JEAN VALJEAN FREED

MICHIGAN FURNISHES
STORY IN REAL LIFE

Bank Robber Who Had Escaped, Married and Led An Upright Life Was Arrested—Wife and Baby Meet Him at Prison Gate When Time Is Served Out.

John H. Allison, Michigan's Jean Valjean, walked out of Jackson prison, in Michigan, the other day, a free man. At the prison gate his wife and baby met him, and he gathered them both into his arms, murmuring tenderest words of endearment and gratitude—gratitude for the faithfulness of the little woman who has stood by him so pluckily and whose constant appeals in his behalf at last bought him his conditional pardon.

The first ecstatic moments passed, Allison's wife led him to the home, just a block away from the prison walls, where she established herself soon after he was returned to prison and where she has remained all these weary months of his incarceration.

When an interviewer came in shortly after Allison was sitting in the cozy little room, his face radiating happiness. On his lap sat his daughter Laura, two years old, her chubby arms around his neck, pressing kisses on his face every moment. Near them sat Mrs. Allison, the happiest woman in Michigan.

"Haven't I got the grandest little wife in the world?" he said. "If it had not been for her John Allison would still be doing time. I owe her more than I can ever repay."

He declared he intended to go to work at once and show himself the man he has been represented to be. He said that before his release his fellow prisoners made up a purse of \$30 for him from money they had earned, a few cents a day, working in prison.

Allison was arrested seven years ago for bank robbery. He escaped three years ago. When he was re-arrested eight months ago in Moline, Ill., he was married, had a baby and was living an upright, honorable life. He was put back in prison. His wife moved to Jackson that she might be near her husband and work for his release.

Caldwell May Be "Dry."

The report came in last evening that up to that time about 700 people had signed the petition which is being circulated in this city by the temperance people, says a report from Caldwell. It is estimated that there are about 1100 voters in the city and it looks as though the temperance people were going to secure a big majority. The fight seems to be on in this city and it seems every effort will be put forth by the prohibition people to eliminate the liquor traffic from the city of Caldwell.

No one seems to know the feeling of the council relative to the matter, but in an interview with one of the foremost temperance workers it was found out that the prohibition people are depending on the council to be influenced by the majority of the people.

But it was learned from the anti-prohibition people that they are depending on the council standing with the majority of business men of the city. Both factions, so far as is learned, claim the majority of the business men, so it only remains to be seen which side they will line up on.

Big Chicken Ranch Sells.

One of the most valuable chicken ranches in southern Idaho will change hands Thursday of this week, at which time County Assessor Charles Shepherd and J. E. Hienckel of the Grebe poultry farm, located to the north of the city in one of the gulches, says the Boise Capital News. The farm consists of 160 acres and sold for \$6500. The chicken ranch proper, including the houses used by the fowls and the chickens themselves, were listed at \$4500 in the sale.

It is understood that Mr. Shepherd will take charge of the Grebe poultry farm in the future and raise fancy fowls on a wholesale. There are 300 fancy birds on the place, with between 800 and 1000 small chickens hatched this year. The chicken ranch proper covers 40 acres and was established several years ago by Mr. Grebe, who is noted as a chicken fancier.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS END THEIR WORK

Pendleton Is After Convention for Next Year—Attempt to Pass a Resolution Favoring State University Appropriation, Failed—Over \$3000 to Carry on State Work for Next Year.

A correspondent at Forest Grove writes as follows of the close of the state Sunday school convention and of the officers of the association for the ensuing year.

An attempt on the part of a Lane county delegate to have the convention go on record as favoring the state university appropriation bill met with failure. Rev. J. Whitcomb Brounger was given an ovation when he arose to speak on the "Horizon of the Sunday School." He said that giving should receive more attention and that tithing should be practiced, even if a Jewish custom.

The things demanded are that it be understood in its true light, that the institution demand results in church membership and that it have the missionary spirit. It is understood that Pendleton is after the convention for next year.

In 30 minutes of the keenest enthusiasm yet displayed at the convention, the sum of \$3000 was pledged for the carrying on of the state work at the close of the morning session. Friendly rivalry was rife among the delegates of the various counties. Marion Lawrence, the Sunday school leader, assisted in raising the contribution for the state work.

A year ago at the state convention the sum of \$2125 was raised and the amount contributed this year is the largest amount ever given for Sunday school work in this state.
