AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE

\$1,000,000 Fruit Crop.

But few people realize the immense
fruit crop the orchards of Asotin
county will produce this season, says
the Lewiston Tribune. In making a
careful estimate of the different varie-
ties, computing from the actual num-
ber of acres of orchard in actual bear-
ing, it is found with the present out-
look for a crop, there should be over
\$1,000,000 worth of fruit this season.
In Clarkston and in tributary terri-
tory there are 1365 acres of peaches
which, at conservative estimation, will
produce 763,000 boxes or 763 carloads;
560 acres of cherries which should
yield 792,000 boxes or 396 carloads;
41 acres of pears, which should yield
24,000 boxes or 48 carloads; 111 acres
of plums and prunes which should
yield 71,000 boxes, or 71 carloads; 135
acres of grapes which should yield
20,000 crates or 20 carloads; 30 acres
of berries of all varieties, which
should yield 5000 crates or 5 carloads;
660 acres of apples, which are mostly
in the Alpowal and Cloverland dis-
tricts, which should yield 39,500 boxes
or 66 carloads, making a total of 3092
acres which produces 1369 carloads,
of which the three canneries and the
local market will probably consume
about one-half, leaving something like
680 cars to be shipped, besides mel-
ons and early potatoes, which are
rather early to estimate but which
will probably run from 50 to 75 car-
loads.

Free Delivery Assured.

H. C. Ball and Charles Wilson re-
ceived official notification from the
postoffice department yesterday that
they have been accepted as eligible
for the positions of carriers for the
free mail delivery for the city of La
Grande, says the Observer. Of the
five who were examined by the civil
service officers on the 21st of last
month, these two were successful and
they secured a very creditable per-
centage in the examination.
This notification is accepted as a
certain indication that the postoffice
department will establish free mail
delivery for La Grande as has been
heretofore announced, and that the

service will go into effect on the 15th
of this month.

Book of "Scenery."

A man and family in a covered wag-
on came up on the boat last night
from near Seattle, he said, and before
arriving at Seattle, he called Wisconsin
his home, says The Dallas Chronicle.
They were headed for Burns, and
said if they could not find 160
acres of land there that he could get
at least four acres from that he could
farm, he would come back here. The
man said he had heard all about this
country and "had a whole book of
scenery about it" and spoke rather
derisively about the outlook from
here. He was directed to go to the
Business Men's association rooms and
see for himself what had been grown
here, but he was bound for Harney
county.

Normal "Dorm" Burns.

A fire at 10 o'clock last night de-
stroyed the Morris Hall dormitory
building at the Lewiston state normal
school, says the Lewiston Tribune.
The origin of the fire is unknown.
It was the dormitory occupied by the
girl students of the normal until the
new dormitory was finished, and
which has since been unoccupied. The
building and equipment cost the state
\$5000 and was partially insured. It
being impossible last night to learn
the definite amount of the insurance.
The building was a two-story frame
structure and comprised 22 rooms. It
was erected in 1899 and occupied a
position a short distance from the
main normal building.

WHEAT HARD HIT OVER 2,000 FARMS

YAKIMA COUNTRY
SUFFERS CONSIDERABLY.

High Winds and Lack of Snow and
Rain Cause Wheat Sections to Dry
Up Early—Rattlesnake and Horse
Heaven Country Is Badly Damaged.

The Yakima Republic says of the
widespread damage to wheat in that
section of the northwest:

Reports which carry with them lit-
tle of hope have been brought into
North Yakima from the wheat sec-
tions of the lower valley. The winds
of this spring, taken together with the
lack of snow of the winter and scarci-
ty of rain since the cold weather passed,
are declared to have worked havoc
with the grain fields.

The Rattlesnake and Horse Heaven
districts are reported to be in a worse
condition than they have ever been at
this time of the year since they have
been wheat producing areas. Across
the Columbia in the Umatilla and
Walla Walla districts the conditions
are declared to be better than they
are in Yakima or Benton counties.

Mr. Williams Is Surprised.
Wallis Williams of the Yakima
Milling company, who was on a trip of
the lower valley the first of this week,
found conditions much worse than he
had expected. Mr. Williams, how-
ever, is of an optimistic turn of mind
and hesitated to declare himself as
of the belief that it is "all off" with
the wheat producing areas.

He, however, mentions several iso-
lated cases where disaster has come
upon the cultivator. One was the
case of a man near Kiona, who had
160 acres in wheat. What wasn't
blown out was buried under and the
result is that of the whole acreage the
owner declared that it would be im-
possible to find enough wheat to cover
a little plot of land as big as that on
which his house stands.

Growers Are Very Uneasy.

Reports have looked out from time
to time that the eastern Washington
wheat fields have suffered greatly this
spring, these reports coming from the
various sections. No general state-
ment of the situation, however, has
been made. Railroad representatives
who have been through the country
have reported in North Yakima con-
ditions much more severe than any to
which Mr. Williams will at this time
commit himself.

Ranchers visiting at North Yakima
have confirmed these stories. It is
admitted that the wheat east of the
Columbia is better off than that this
side, but the growers and others there,
who are interested, have begun to
worry.

RECLAMATION PROJECTS
OPENED THIS MONTH

Farms Ranging from 10 to 80 Acres
In Size and Costing From \$600 to
1200—Projects Opened in Nevada
and South Dakota—Residence on
and Cultivation of Land Will Be
Required.

A government bulletin issued May 1
says of the opening of various recla-
mation projects in the west:

Nearly 2000 farms were put on the
bargain today by Uncle Sam and will
be disposed of to the first persons who
comply with the government pro-
visions for their disposal.

All of the land is contained in ir-
rigation projects constructed by the
government in the semi-arid districts
of the west. The area of the farms
ranges from 10 to 160 acres each.
Purchasers will be allowed 10 years
in which to pay for them.

In Nevada, in connection with the
Truckee-Carson project, 1000 farms
of 80 acres each can be taken up
with an entry fee of \$3 and \$3 an
acre annually for 10 years.

In South Dakota 175 farms will be
available in tracts of 80 acres, and in
Wyoming 200 on the North Platte
project and 200 on the Shoshone pro-
ject, costing from \$600 to \$1200.

Residence on and cultivation of the
farms will be required of the pur-
chasers, and every means will be taken
to guard against speculators pur-
chasing them.

RUN FROM PORTLAND TO SALEM

Relay Race Arranged Between Chem-
awa and Portland Teams.

The annual relay race from Salem
to Portland will be pulled off Satur-
day and the event is creating a great
deal of interest, says the Salem
Statesman. The start will be made
from the steps of the state house at
9 o'clock in the morning when the
runners will carry a message from
Governor Chamberlain to Mayor Lane
at Portland.

H. L. Keats, who will follow the
runners in his auto, will arrive today
from Portland bringing with him
three of the Portland racers, Carto-
zian (a Turk), Wetterberg and Keyes,
who will cover the first three laps at
this end of the route. The road will
be mapped out in five-mile stretches
by Griley, physical director of the
Portland Y. M. C. A.

team, which comprises seven of the
last year's team, and the Indian boys
expect to win.

The Lake Carriers' association, rep-
resenting the owners of vessels plying

the open shop rule, declaring against

offering to employ union men individ-
