LEAGUE TEAM FOR PENDLETON

MANGER LORIMER SAYS PLAN IS FEASIBLE

Baker City, La Grande, Pendleton and Walla Walla Would Be Represented and Season Would Close July 4—Many Advantages Would Accrue While Additional Expense Would Be Small—Big Game Promised for Sunday.

A league ball team, to be conducted upon a conservative basis and with a season that will close July 4, is now proposed for Pendleton, and if sufficient money can be raised to finance the same it will be started next week.

E. K. Lorimer, manager of the Pendleton team, now favors the transformation of the present team into a league organization and he says that after thoroughly considering the subject the change will be a beneficial one.

"I have figured it out," declared Lorimer today, "and it will cost us but little more to run a league team than it will to support the present independent nine and there will be many advantages in the change."

"It will require about \$1000 subscription to finance the league team and I believe this money can be secured. If so we will then be in shape to go ahead with the league."

"La Grande, Baker City and Walla Walla are now favorable to a league and if we can form one we can play week day games, whereas we have but little in sight now outside of Sunday games."

According to Lorimer he is undertaking the league proposition largely at the instance of his players, for it will be beneficial to them. At this time he has a splendid bunch of players together and they have won four games out of the five they have

LOCAL CHINK TRIES HIGH FINANCE GAME

Partners Say Que Sing Manages to His Own Profit.

Claiming that Que Sing, the manager of the Horseshoe restaurant, is trying to apply high finance methods on his partners in the chop house business, a suit has been brought against him by his fellow countrymen.

Se Hoy, Le Moy and Hang Yet are the plaintiffs in the equity suit that has been started and they claim that Que Sing has failed to give them their share of the profits of the Horseshoe. While not knowing exactly how much the dividend should be, they estimate it at \$1200.

Also the Chinamen allege that Que has sought to freeze them out of the business by renewing the lease for the location in his own name instead of that of the company. They now ask that the court compel him to make an accounting of the profits of the business and also that he be restrained from transferring the lease to any other parties than themselves.

WILL INSTALL INDIAN PASTOR

REV. E. J. CONNOR TO BE IN CHARGE OF TUTUILLA.

Formal Ceremonies Will Be Feature of Camp Meeting Revival on Reservation Tomorrow Afternoon—Pastor of Pendleton Church and Academy Will Participate—Pie Social a Success—Sixty Visiting Reds Now Present.

Rev. E. J. Connor, the Indian evangelist, has been chosen as the resident minister for the Tutuilla Presbyterian mission and tomorrow afternoon he will be formally installed as the pastor of the redmen's church.

So strong has been the Tutuilla church under the leadership of Rev. J. M. Cornelison, missionary for the reservation, that it has been decided to provide a pastor for the church in addition to the missionary.

At the meeting of the district presidency just held at Moro, Rev. Connor was designated as the pastor and he will take charge at once. Upon him will fall the detail work of the Indian church while Mr. Cornelison will still fill the position of missionary for the reservation.

At 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon Rev. Connor will be installed as pastor of his new church and the ceremony is being looked forward to with interest. Rev. W. L. Van Nuys will preside and he will be assisted in the ceremony by Rev. Cornelison and Rev. W. H. Bleakney. The charge to the people of the congregation will be given by Mr. Cornelison, while the charge to the pastor will be by Mr. Bleakney.

At the camp meeting service last night Rev. Moses Monteith presided and the sermon was delivered by Rev. William Wheeler of Stites, Idaho. The big camp meeting tent was crowded for the service, more than 200 being present.

There are now 60 visiting Indians present for the camp meetings and this afternoon some more will arrive from Idaho and from the Warm Springs reservation. All the committees are now actively at work on the different parts assigned them and Rev. Cornelison has converted his study into a reading room for those who are attending the meetings.

The singing service is good, songs being rendered in both the Indian tongue and in English. A good choir also helps out this feature of the revival.

Walla Walla "Shy" on Water.

Beginning tomorrow the city authorities will strictly enforce the ordinance which requires that the use of city water for domestic, sprinkling and irrigation purposes shall cease during the progress of a fire, says the Walla Walla Statesman. The ordinance provides that upon a fire alarm being sounded all irrigation and sprinkling shall stop and shall not be resumed until the recall has been sounded at fire headquarters which is four taps by the fire bell.

COMPLETE LIST OF CANDIDATES

TIME FOR FILING ACCEPTANCE EXPIRES.

Colonel Newport Will Not Try for Sheriff—Slater Will Probably Be Independent Candidate for District Attorney—Several Nominees for Justice of the Peace and Constable Decline With Thanks—Socials Have Nearly Full Ticket.

Last evening the time for the filing of nomination acceptances expired and it is now known definitely what names will appear upon the republican, democratic and socialist tickets in the June election.

Of the republican nominees Colonel H. G. Newport, who received a complimentary nomination for sheriff, failed to accept the same. Consequently T. D. Taylor will have no one to run against unless an independent candidate should be brought out by petition.

R. J. Slater was not entered as the democratic candidate for district attorney, but today Mr. Slater intimated that his name will go upon the ticket as an independent opponent for Mr. Phelps. But according to Mr. Slater, he has never sought the race and is in the role of a passive candidate. If he runs for the office those who wish him to do so will have to attend to the nomination.

For all the important offices from that of sheriff, the republican nominees filed acceptances. However, several justices of the peace and constable nominees failed to do so.

The following is the list of republican aspirants for justice of the peace: J. F. Wallan, Adams; B. R. Richards, Athena; J. L. Miller, South Milton; H. B. Gillette, Echo; J. H. Parkes, Pendleton; W. L. Guerrant, Holdman; and Abe Miller, Pilot Rock.

For constable the following are the republican candidates accepting nominations: W. W. McQueen, South Milton; Joe Lawson, North Milton; J. T. Thorn, Holdman; J. M. Heathman, Pendleton; and W. E. Pierson, Ukiah.

The democratic candidates for justices are as follows: Louis Scholl, Jr., Echo; A. S. Pearson, North Milton; H. C. Mack, Ukiah. Those running for constable on the minority ticket are: Lester O'Hara, Athena; J. M. Bentley, Pendleton; J. W. Terwilliger, South Milton; H. H. McReynolds, Pilot Rock, and Charles Hilyard, Weston.

KOPITKE'S CLOSE CALL.

Wood and Coal Dealer Nearly Run Over by Train.

Henry Kopitke, the wood, coal and ice dealer, had a narrow escape from death or serious injury shortly after noon yesterday. That he was not run over by the outgoing Spokane passenger train is due to the swift aid that was given him by a brakeman of the train.

As the Spokane train was pulling out at 12:30 yesterday Mr. Kopitke was standing on the platform and he started to alight while the train was in motion. Stepping off carelessly he was hurled from his feet and fell sprawling on the platform within but a few inches of the moving train which by that time had gotten well under way.

While the wood dealer was in the above precarious position and with one leg dangling off the platform, the brakeman grabbed him by the limb and pulled him to a place of safety.

When rescued Mr. Kopitke was bleeding from the head from his fall and was partly dazed. However, he was not injured seriously and has been at work as usual today.

PINGREE'S IDEA REVIVED.

The Pingree idea, which, several years ago, formed the basis of many newspaper editorials of the joshing kind, is taken up this year with a large measure of sincerity. Newspapers all over the country see in the vacant lot garden proposition many things that are right.

It is argued in several large cities where there are more idle men than jobs that every vacant lot should be made to blossom profusely. The idea advanced by Governor Pingree, who for a long time was referred to as "Potato Patch Pingree," seems to be a pretty good one now.

Philadelphia, in particular, is in the midst of a campaign which has for its object the planting of garden seeds in vacant lots. It is figured out that there are such lots in large numbers there, and that every one of them can be made to yield vegetables, all of which could be put to the best possible use next fall and winter.

In all the mass of correspondence that is printed in the eastern dailies which discuss the vacant lot proposition, not one contributor raises his voice against the idea; it is unanimously agreed that the beauty of the lot would be enhanced by cultivation.
