OREGON ACTIVITIES

THREE CONVENTIONS TO BE INVITED TO PORTLAND.

Walla Walla Asks for Cheaper Rates From Eastern Oregon and Washington to the Seaside Resorts—Portland Commercial Club to Move Into New Building Soon—Portland Horse Sales Were Good.

Portland, May 4.—A special delegation leaves Portland today for Boston, where the National Retail Grocers' association will convene next Monday, to invite that association to hold its 1909 session in Portland.

Dr. J. Whitcomb Brouger, pastor of the White Temple, goes to Oklahoma City to attend the Northern Baptist convention the middle of this month. Rev. William Hiram Foulkes will go to Kansas City to participate in the general assembly of the Presbyterian church—Portland will endorse in the heartiest manner the invitation to be extended by Seattle for the 1909 convention of this body.

Cheaper Rates to Coast.
The Commercial club of Walla Walla, has passed resolutions urging the railroad companies to grant a one-fare rate for the round trip, by continuous passage, between points in interior Washington and Oregon and the seaside resorts of these two states. It is understood that the club also favors a higher rate when stopover privileges are allowed.

The Walla Walla club has requested the commercial bodies of eastern Oregon, Washington and Idaho, as well as the Commercial club of Portland, to pass similar resolutions. It is hoped that favorable action may be taken by all, as the people of the interior should be given the opportunity of visiting the coast, especially during the summer months, at the least possible cost.

Baker a Lumber Center.
The Sumpter Valley railroad, comprising a length of 67 miles between Baker City and Austin, Ore., runs through the Sumpter mining belt and is soon to double its mileage. Today 93 per cent of the freight of this road comes from timber, though it is not generally known that Baker City is a lumber center.

New Club Soon to Be Ready.
It will be the 15th of May before the new, eight-story steel building of the Portland Commercial club will be ready for occupancy. The club will formally open its new quarters on June 12, the anniversary of the laying of its cornerstone. The cost of the building and its furnishing has been \$443,000.

Good Horse Sale.
Last week witnessed the most successful sale of horses ever held in Portland. Breeders and buyers from Washington, Oregon, Montana, Idaho, California and British Columbia were there, with a liberal sprinkling of eastern owners. The average was \$240 each for every horse sold during one day of the sale.

BEST TROUT LAKE.

Sumpter Correspondent Praises Olive Lake in Blue Mountains.

A correspondent at Sumpter says that without doubt "Olive Lake, a beautiful sheet of water near this place has earned the distinction of being the greatest trout habitation in Oregon, says a Baker City item. Thousands of fish are caught there each season by fishermen from all parts of the state, yet each season shows a larger increase of the finny tribe.

So numerous are the trout that the ordinary angler will be kept busy drawing them from the water with the only intermission the time that he spends taking the fish from the hook and rebating it.

Already some of Sumpter's hardy inhabitants are preparing to break the deep snow that lies on the highlands surrounding the lake so that they may be the first to make the phenomenal catch that rewards the early angler. Over ten thousand trout were caught in this lake last year by Sumpter residents alone and still there is not the slightest sign of any diminution in the number of fish there.

Downey lake, a smaller body of water than Olive lake is to be stocked this spring with trout from the hatchery at Ontario. Baldy lake, situated near the summit of Bald mountain, has also a large number of trout, but anglers are not so successful there as at Olive lake, as the fish will only bite under certain climatic conditions.

This is considered strange, as nowhere else in the Blue mountains do the fish show this peculiarity. Some fishermen claim that it is owing to the great depth of the lake, and others that the right kind of flies are not used.

INDIANS WON RELAY RACE.

Chemawa Outstrips Salem and Portland Runners.

Chemawa Indians again defeated their white brothers in a 50-mile relay race from Salem to Portland, when Amos Smoker, a full blood from Chemawa, bore the message from Governor Chamberlain through a cheering throng along Fourth street and handed it to Mayor Harry Lane, in front of the Y. M. C. A. building at 16½ minutes after 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon, says a Portland paper. The runners left the state capital at 9 a. m., and covered the distance in five hours, 19½ minutes, clipping 9½ minutes off their record of last year. Mayor Lane read the message to the assembled throng as follows:

"Mayor Harry Lane—Dear Sir, Relay teams, consisting of young men from the Portland Y. M. C. A., the Salem Y. M. C. A. and the Indian training school at Chemawa, leave the capitol building at Salem at 9 a. m. I place this message in the hands of the representatives of the Indian training school at Chemawa, extending

to Portland most cordial greetings, and bespeaking for the bearers your most courteous consideration. I have the honor to remain, yours very respectfully,

"GEORGE E. CHAMBERLAIN, Governor."
E. L. Chalcraft, superintendent of the training school, was on hand to welcome his runners, and secured the original message from Mayor Lane as a trophy for his school.

BLIND MAN'S BUFF.

This Common Game Is of Great Antiquity and French Origin.

Blind man's buff is of French origin and of very great antiquity, having been introduced into England in the train of the Norman conquerors. Its French name, "Colin Maillard," was that of a brave warrior, the memory of whose exploits still lives in the chronicles of the middle ages.

In the year 890 Liege reckoned among its valiant chiefs one Jean Colin. He acquired the name Maillard from his chosen weapon being a mallet, wherewith in battle he used literally to crush his opponents.

In one of the feuds which were of perpetual recurrence in those times he encountered the Count de Touraine in a pitched battle, and, so runs the story, in the first onset Colin Maillard lost both his eyes.

He ordered his esquire to take him in the thickest of the fight, and, furiously brandishing his mallet, did such fearful execution that victory soon declared itself for him.

When Robert of France heard of these feats of arms he lavished favor and honors upon Colin, and so great was the fame of the exploit that it was commemorated in the pantomimic representation that formed part of the rude dramatic performance of the age. By degrees the children learned to act it for themselves, and it took the form of a familiar sport.

The blindfolded pursuer, as, with bandaged eyes and extended hands, he gropes for a victim to pounce upon, in some degree repeats the action of Colin Maillard, the tradition of which is also traceable in the name "blind man's buff."—London M. A. P.

NORRIS & ROWE COMING.

Famous Family of Acrobats Seen Here for the First Time.

With the Greater Norris and Rowe circus, museum, menagerie, hippodrome and congress of nations, which will exhibit in this city Thursday, May 14, afternoon and night, is a family of acrobats that go by the name of the Astral St. Leons.

This family was engaged and came direct from Melbourne, Australia, to the Norris and Rowe circus. There are seven members to the troupe, and among them are performers that turn double full twisters, and double somersaults from the bare ground, a feat that has been accomplished by but three performers in the world, and then on rare occasions only. In their contract with Norris and Rowe they agree to perform this almost incredible act at every representation of the show.

During the run of the circus in San Francisco this spring of 60 performances, 279,873 persons paid admissions to the big show, and the St. Leons made one of the big distinct hits of the program, which includes performers from every country in the world. Their act cannot be described—"it beggars description." The new big street parade will take place at 10 o'clock.
