CROWDED HOUSE GREETSTHE OPENING PRODUCTION

"The Girl I Left Behind Me" Proves to Be Omnipotent. Plays Put on by Popular Stock Company—Several Additions Strengthen Cast—United States Regulars Add Realism to Production—Two Army Officers in Love.

Irrigation Talk No. 12.

FRUIT

What the Furnish Irrigation project will do as to fruit is not altogether experimental, although the principal portion of the enterprise was the wildest kind of sage brush a few weeks ago.

However, when the canals were being built a small private canal or two were absorbed by us and we had upon some of the tracts thus watered, already some fruit trees growing.

The fruit from the farm for the last year was as fine as was raised in any other section of Oregon or Washington. The apple orchard here showed as beautiful and perfect fruit as Hood River can grow, and it was two weeks earlier in maturing the same than at Hood River. Although this orchard has not been pruned or sprayed before for some years, the owner having turned his attention principally to stock raising the fruit was free from specks, rust or worms, and the colorings magnificent.

We will pay \$100 for a better showing under like circumstances in any other orchard in Oregon or Washington.

This land does not belong to us, but we furnished the water in the regular course of irrigation through our own ditches.
