STATE VETERINARIAN HERE.

Dr. Kornick Says Office Is Handicapped for Funds.

Dr. C. J. Kornick, state veterinarian, is here today from Salem. He came upon official business and largely for the purpose of consulting with Dr. S. W. McClure regarding the subject of mange among the horses of this section. However, Dr. Kornick is at Walla Walla today and will not return until tomorrow evening.

According to Dr. Kornick, his office is greatly handicapped in its work through the fact that all money for the office is tied up at present and as a result but little work can be done. He is not able even to draw his own salary as state veterinarian and has no means of making a fight on mange at present.

However, he is hopeful of legislation next winter that will give the state veterinarian funds and power to act.

GOVERNOR GOES THROUGH.

Chamberlain Is on His Campaigning Tour.

Governor George E. Chamberlain passed through here last evening en route for points farther east in this state and will return to Umatilla county to deliver speeches on Friday and Saturday of this week.

The governor is now upon a campaigning tour in the interest of his candidacy for United States senator and is apparently making a very thorough canvass. In this county he is booked to speak at the following places outside of Pendleton: Milton, Freewater, Weston, Athena, Echo and Hermiston.

Just when the governor will speak here is not yet known, according to Will M. Peterson, democratic county chairman, but he will be here either Friday or Saturday evening.

STRAIN'S CONDITION CRITICAL.

County Assessor's Chances for Life Not Bright.

Assessor C. P. Strain is now lying at the hospital in a very critical condition as a result of an operation which was performed upon him Saturday by Drs. Cole and Henderson, and the pus sack resulting from appendicitis removed.

He survived the operation and is now said to be resting well. However, it will be several days before he is out of danger and there is a possibility he may not live, though Dr. Henderson is hopeful concerning his patient.

In the police court this morning, B. F. Anthony and Cliff Jordan, two boys, were fined \$1 each for riding bicycles on the sidewalks. They had been arrested Saturday by Sam Grove, street commissioner, who said the lads tried to run over him.

There were nine in the "drunk draft" this morning, the number being about half Indian and half whites. All were given the usual sentences.

PENDLETON MEN IN THE FAR NORTH

PARTY OF FOUR NOW AT PRINCE RUPERT.

J. A. Horseman, W. H. Gulliford, L. A. Vogel and J. B. McDill Looking Over the Site of the New Town at Terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific—People Are Warned to Stay Away at the Present Time.

The East Oregonian has just received a letter from Albert Horseman, who with J. B. McDill, W. H. Gulliford and L. A. Vogel, left here two weeks ago for Prince Rupert, British Columbia.

The letter was written from Prince Rupert, the Pacific coast terminal of the Grand Trunk Pacific railroad, which is now being built across Canada, and gives some interesting information concerning that country. Prince Rupert is about 600 miles north of Vancouver, B. C., and will be made the seaport for the Grand Trunk Pacific. Among other things concerning their trip to the north, Mr. Horseman says:

"Our party reached its destination all O. K. and is now busy looking over the country. We have come through the roughest country I ever saw. It looks like it was all rock with just enough soil to keep the scrubby timber alive. The high mountains are covered with snow, from three to 15 feet deep and the timber is not large.

"We came by boat from Seattle to Victoria, then to Vancouver, to Port Eslington and then to Prince Rupert, and from there to Port Simpson. We had a fine trip up, except for seasickness. The other boys were all sick."

While many people expect to get rich from town lots and timber at Prince Rupert it seems that there is nothing doing yet and that it is folly to go there except to secure a foothold of any kind.

Mr. Horseman sends the East Oregonian a clipping from the Prince Rupert Empire, warning people to stay away from there, as follows:

"During the week ending today more than two dozen people who came to Prince Rupert in the hopes of securing a location on which to do business, left disappointed. More will come every week, and will go away disappointed. Until lots in the townsite are surveyed it is not possible for the Grand Trunk Pacific to give anyone locations for either business or other buildings.

The owners of the Grand Trunk Fraction and Cariboo mineral claims are not dealing in real estate, and have allowed people who needed shelter to erect tent cabins for temporary use.

They have also allowed a few individuals to erect temporary boarding houses and bunk houses, in which people who come here expecting to find hotel accommodations are fed and sheltered. No one need come to Prince Rupert expecting to get a business location on a mineral claim as a right. The owners of these claims are under no obligations to anyone, and what they have done so far has been merely in the interest of common humanity.

Were it to be done over again, they would not go so far as they have gone, for the meanness and petty greed of some of those who have been helped does not tend to make them "love their neighbors." The Empire can only repeat its weekly warning: "STAY AWAY FROM PRINCE RUPERT until lots in the townsite can be purchased, which will not be earlier than September."

SCHOOL LAND SELLS WELL.

Forty Acres Near Walla Walla Bring Sum of \$10,800.

Appraised at \$3845, one piece of 40 acres of school land sold this morning from the county court house steps, for \$10,800, J. G. Frankland bidding in the property for the firm of Frankland and Brown, says the Walla Walla Statesman. The land is located just east of the Green Park school and is a very desirable property.

Nearly all the land went above the value set by the appraisers and a lively scene took place when some of the land was placed under the hammer. With bids of \$25, \$50, \$100, even \$500 the land went skyward by jumps.

Some of the most exciting scenes ever accompanying a sale of public land ensued and excitement was at a high mark for half an hour. Most of the bidders had come down loaded for big game and the price of the game and the price of the land seemed no consideration.

GALA DAY PLANS FOR HOOD RIVER VALLEY

Portland Brass Band and Orators Come on River Excursion.

There will be an excursion of the real estate men and their ladies from Portland, on the Steamer Spencer, to Hood River on May 9 next, says the Hood River News-Letter. The steamer is due to arrive here at about 1 o'clock p. m. The excursionists will be 150 in number, more or less. It is the purpose of the people of Hood River, town and valley, to meet these excursionists with conveyances and take them through the valley, going out on the west side, stopping for a 30 minutes' rest of the teams at the Pine Grove Grange, where a few five minute speeches will be delivered, returning to meet the boat at 6 p. m. It is also intended to run an excursion train on the Mt. Hood railroad to attend the exercises at Pine Grove and enable the citizens of Hood River to be present there. Another object in running the train out is in case the day should be disagreeable, the Portland ladies could be taken on the train, instead of in the conveyances, should they so desire.

The committee of arrangements and reception, appointed by the Commercial club of Hood River, consists of J. L. Henderson, chairman, W. J. Baker, J. H. Hellbronner, F. W. Angus, J. M. Culbertson, and A. W. Onthank. This committee has met and appointed a sub-committee consisting of J. M. Culbertson, F. W. Angus and J. H. Hellbronner, to take

up the matter of conveyances with the out of town people. Of course, the resources of the town are limited, and the livery stables will be taxed to their utmost, with all the volunteer conveyances, and cannot provide for half of the excursionists, so, in order to make the matter a success, the farmers will have to come to the rescue. Several have already volunteered, one man offering to furnish three outfits.

WITHIN SIX INCHES OF CERTAIN DEATH.

Salem Motorman Stops Car in Nick of Time.

A fatal street car accident was narrowly avoided at Salem, when Motorman George Fawcett stopped his car within six inches of the three-year old daughter of Mrs. I. M. Ackley, who had caught her foot between a rail and guard rail.

The girl's shoe caught between the rails. Mrs. Ackley tried to extricate the child's foot, but the motorman supposed she was tying a shoe lace and gave no heed. When within 30 feet, and going at considerable speed he realized what the trouble was, reversed his power and avoided taking the life of the child. It was necessary to remove the child's foot from the shoe in order to free her.
