GREAT MEETING
OF METHODISTS

POURING INTO BALTIMORE
 FROM ALL DIRECTIONS

Clergymen and Laymen from Every State and from Every Land—Methodist Eyes From Every Quarter of the Globe Are Fastened Upon Maryland's Chief City—Quadrennial General Conference—Holds Key to All Important Church Offices.

Baltimore, May 5.—From all parts of America and from foreign lands, clergymen and laymen of the Methodist Episcopal church are thronging into Baltimore today, and during the remainder of the month Methodist eyes in all sections of the world will be turned toward this city. The quadrennial general conference, which will be opened tomorrow, is one of the most important religious institutions in existence. It holds the keys to all the important offices of the church, including the bishoprics, and editorships and the secretarieships, and is the supreme and only law-making body of the denomination.

One of the most important subjects to come before the conference will be that of restoring a time limit to pastorates. Several of the largest conferences, including New York and Baltimore, have declared in favor of the restoration of a time limit, and there is strong sentiment in other parts of the country in favor of such action. The present plan has not insured to the permanence of the pastoral relation, or to the stability of the ministry; indeed in some cases congregations have been more restive than they were under the three-year or the five-year limit. Then, if there were dissatisfaction with the minister, they had only to wait a definite time before a change would come automatically. Now they have to give expression to their desire for a change at the quarterly conference, when the question of continuing the various pastoral relations comes up. Moreover, the very agitation of the possibility of a change as a part of the routine program of the quarterly conferences sometimes helps to breed dissatisfaction and so the local minister in some cases comes to dread the meeting at which he knows the question is to be raised.

The practical outcome often is that men stay less than five years and often less than three years, and so the general restlessness of the churches and the uncertainty of the ministry are not to any extent allayed by the absence of all time limitations. Of course where relations between pastor and people are mutually satisfying—and there are many such instances in Methodist as well as in other churches—any time limitation whatever imposed by the general conference is resented and heretofore the strong city churches, thus situated, usually found a way of retaining their ministers from period to period.

May Remove Amusement Ban.
 Another important question is the proposed repeal of the discipline statute which forbids dancing, card-playing and theater-going, on penalty of excommunication. Such action has been demanded by the New York conference.

Doubtless the sentiment in the east generally would favor such action; while in the west and even in rural districts of New England, it would be viewed with considerable alarm, as being a concession to worldliness quite foreign to the spirit of the Methodist church. In the large cities the rule is already practically disregarded and the New York conference delegates simply want to make the rules tally with accepted usage, thinking that in this day of ethical awakening, the church ought to square its professions to its actual behavior by its profession.

It is a cheering showing which the official statistics for the last four years make. The increase in members is 374,335, or an average of nearly ninety thousand a year, while 432 new churches have been added to the list this year. This quite sustains the reputation of the church acquired through the famous remark of the late Chaplain McCabe to the effect that the Methodist church built a new edifice every day in the year.

Car Runs Away.

Tacoma, Wash., May 5.—Car No. 17 inbound, on the Jefferson avenue line of the Tacoma Railway & Power company, got beyond control of Motorman A. W. Williams on a steep hill at South Twenty-seventh street and Jefferson avenue at 12:35 this morning, and plunged over a 200-foot embankment, carrying with it Conductor H. J. Bond and E. G. Gordon, the only passenger aboard. Motorman Williams, as the car failed to take the curve near the foot of the hill, was pitched out of the door at the left side of the car and thrown violently against a wooden blacksmith shop, but escaped serious injury.

The conductor and passenger remained inside the car as it took its plunge down the embankment and rested within a few feet of the Northern Pacific tracks. Bond received an ugly scalp wound, a deep cut near the outside corner of his right eye and a terrible shaking up. Gordon escaped miraculously with only a slight glass cut upon the hand. Both Bond and Gordon were sent to a hospital. The car turned over once in its descent.

ANNIVERSARY OF HAYMARKET RIOTS

Chicago, May 4.—Chicago anarchists will attempt to hold an open air mass meeting tonight to commemorate the anniversary of the Haymarket Square riot in Chicago, May 4, 1886. It is likely that the police will attempt to break up the meeting, and a repetition of the Union Square riot in New York is feared. Seven policemen were killed and about 60 persons injured in the famous Haymarket affair. A monument marks the spot where the policemen fell and the anarchist sympathizers have also erected a monument. It is in the vicinity of that memorial to their dead "heroes" that the anarchists hope to hold tonight's demonstration.

The Chicago riot of May 4, 1886, which culminated in the throwing of a bomb and the firing of revolvers at the police by the so-called anarchists was the result of socialist leaders. Serious rioting had occurred the day before in consequence of the strike of the railway freight handlers and the efforts of other men to replace them.

An open air meeting was called by the leaders in the old Hay Market on Randolph street. August Spies, A. R. Parsons and others addressed the crowd in inflammatory language. While the latter was speaking four patrol wagons, filled with policemen, were seen approaching.

Three bombs were suddenly thrown among the police. They exploded instantly and five policemen fell and many policemen and socialists were wounded. The police opened fire with their revolvers upon the crowd and the rioters returned their fire, also with revolvers. A desperate fight followed, but the police at length cleared the ground.

Two policemen were found to be dead, five mortally wounded and 24 dangerously wounded.

Of the socialist leaders, two brothers, named Spies, Samuel Field-

en, Michael Schwab, Adolph Fischer, George Engel, Albert R. Parsons, Oscar Weeber and Louis Ling were arrested. The original bomb thrower, supposed to be one Schnaubelt, was never caught. Ling committed suicide in prison by blowing the top of his head off with a small bomb. August Spies, Fischer, Engel and Parsons were hanged as Schnaubelt's accomplices November 11, 1887. Fielden and Schwab were sentenced for life and Neebe for 15 years.

For many years a fierce controversy has been waged over the justice of the execution of Spies, Fischer, Engel and Parsons. In a book on the subject the late Governor Altgeld of Illinois, declared that the hanging of the reds was nothing short of legal murder. Many other prominent legal authorities have expressed the same opinion, while others equally eminent have defended the justice and legality of the sentence.
