PEEK-A-BOOS NOR "MERRY WIDOWS"

BAN PLACED ON FANTASTIC ROOF GARDENS AND FRILLS

Girls in Horace Mann School Compelled to Forego the Pleasures of Ultra-Fashionable Dress — Even Sparklers Are Forbidden — False Hair and Elaborate Coiffures Are in the Restricted Class.

New York, May 5.—The girls of Horace Mann school at Broadway and 120th street have been forbidden to wear ultra-fashionable or extravagant headgear, false hair, elaborate adornment of jewelry, high heel shoes and peek-a-boo waists. Ever since the new dress reform has been the chief topic of discussion among the girls, who aver that the boys in the school are allowed wide latitude in their selection of wearing apparel.

Virgil Prettiman, principal of the school, discusses the talk caused by the new rule and says that questions of good taste in dress frequently arise in the school.

For months the question of proper dress has agitated the pupils and interested the teachers. A certain clique of girls has been in the habit of going to their class in raiment that verged upon the extremely fashionable type. Finally a girl showed herself in a hat that bewildered her colleagues. It was a Gainsborough affair with untold decorations. She was told by one of the teachers that she must not wear such a hat to school. Another girl revealed a coiffure gay with little artificial puffs and was promptly commanded to leave the surplus attachments at home.

Another young maid demonstrated geometrical problems on the blackboard with her fingers decorated with brilliant. These instances aroused a keen rivalry among the girls in the matter of dress, until the decision was reached to tell the girls that there must be moderation in dress. The following prohibitive edicts of dress were issued: "Merry Widow" hats, or hats of extremely large proportions, or trimmed in a conspicuous manner. Hair ribbons of too large size or conspicuous in color. False hair of any description. "Lotta Faust" colors, "Dutch necks," and "Moline bows." Peek-a-boo waists or waists with short sleeves. All bracelets and jewelry except pins necessary for the clasping of collars. Gowns of conspicuous colors and materials of extravagant price. Light shoes, fancy cloth topped, such as shoes with high heels or fancy buttons. Thus it will be seen, about all a girl's little affectations of dress were forbidden, and the girls in their teens are up in arms.

CURRY HILLS GIVE UP THEIR DEAD

Body of Man Who Disappeared Last February Is Found by Partner at Last.

The body of W. J. Archibald, who disappeared last February, has been found about a mile and a half from where he was last seen alive, says a special to a Portland paper from Gold Beach. A continuous search has been kept up all this time by his partner, Judd Green. Yesterday, Justice of the Peace, R. M. Krueger, acting as coroner, started with four other men to examine and bury the remains.

On February 29, Mr. Archibald, accompanied by Judd Green and Colonel I. N. Muncy, republican candidate for state representative, left McKinley mine and started to W. V. Wren's place, about three miles distant. There had been a heavy fall of snow during the night and a little way from camp the men saw fresh deer tracks leading off at right angles to the trail. Archibald, with Mr. Muncy's gun, left his companions and started after the deer. The two went on expecting him soon to overtake them, but he did not, nor did he come

to camp that night. Search was begun the following day.

It is not known just what caused his death. The position of the body would indicate that he had fallen while climbing the mountain. His gun was at a little distance from the body, as if thrown. The body was buried in the mountains. Very little is known of the life of the deceased. He had been here for some years. He was about 60 years of age.
