INDIANS SPEAK IN MANY TONGUES

NEZ PERCE COMMON
LANGUAGE OF ALL.

Northwest Tribes Have Individual Languages But All Speak the Common Mother Tongue of the Northwest—Interesting Illustrations Seen at Revival Meeting at Tutulla.

Students of the northwest Indian tongues find a rich field for study among the Nez Perce, Cayuse, Umatilla and Yakima tribes. While all of these tribes have individual languages which are used extensively on their respective reservations, yet all of the tribes mentioned use the Nez Perce as the common tongue.

At the revival now in progress at the Tutulla mission, this linguistic peculiarity is noticeable and many interesting developments are marked. For instance, Rev. William Wheeler, a full blood Nez Perce, who is one of the principal speakers, has three small children, each of whom was born on a different reservation and each of whom learned a different tribal language.

The first little daughter was born on the Umatilla reservation and learned to speak the Umatilla language in babyhood. The second child, a son, was born on the Spokane reservation and learned the Spokane language. The third child, a daughter, was born on the Crow reservation in Montana, and speaks the Crow language.

However, as the parents are Nez Perce, and as the Nez Perce reservation is the home of the family, all the various members now speak this common language of the northwest tribes. Thus in the family of five are spoken four distinct and separate Indian languages.

The Nez Perce is the mother tongue of all the northwest tribes. No matter how far apart the tribes live, or what peculiarities they may have,

MANY SEEK TO BECOME LAWYERS

NINE TAKE EXAMINATION
FOR ADMISSION TO BAR

Charles J. Ferguson, E. A. Johnson and Maurice Fitzmaurice of This City Among the Number—Two Umatilla County Cases Are Transferred to Salem—Horseman's Attorney Not Ready to Argue Appeal Now.

There are nine applicants for admission to the bar at this session of the supreme court and today the embryo lawyers have been as numerous about the court room as are the attorneys having cases in court. This forenoon the applicants were examined by J. C. Moreland, clerk of the supreme court, who is here this time and the papers submitted will be passed upon by the supreme court after the return to Salem.

The following is the list of those taking the bar examination: Lester W. Humphreys, Luther D. Mahone, Frederick Steiner, Everett A. Johnson, A. A. Anderson, Maurice Fitzmaurice, Charles J. Ferguson, Chester A. Shepard and William C. Reimer.

Pendleton Cases Transferred.
Two well-known Pendleton cases that were set for hearing at this session of the supreme court have been transferred to Salem and will be argued before the court in that city at a later date. These are the Laing divorce case and the Horseman manslaughter case.

At the instance of Judge Fee, one of the attorneys for Horseman, that case was transferred to Salem because the defense was not ready to argue at this time. The Laing case was transferred this morning.

An Unusual Case.
The first case taken up this morning was that of the state versus Fuller, a criminal action wherein the defendant is charged with abortion and which was appealed from Baker county. Attorney General A. M. Crawford and Leroy Lomax, district attorney for Baker county argued for the state, while V. M. Tomlinson and C. E. Cochran represented the defendant.

The case now being is that of Elizabeth Carroll versus the Grand Ronde Electric company, appealed from Union. Lomax & Anderson represent the appellant, while F. S. Ivanhoe represents the respondent.

HORSE THIEF FRIGHTENED.

Had Animal Bridled and Blanketed and Then Skips.

What looks much like an attempt at horsetealing was spotted this morning by the early rising habits of the people on the W. T. Porter place near Olney cemetery.

Upon going to the barn this morning, W. T. McCarthy, son-in-law of Mr. Porter, discovered that the family pony had been bridled and blanketed while the saddle and a pair of chaps were lying near by as though some one had been in the act of saddling the animal.

As none of the family had been about the barn since last evening it is believed that a thief had started to steal the horse and saddle but while engaged in the act had become frightened away.

From time to time this week, local attorneys will be drifting to Pendleton, where several Union county cases are before the supreme court, which sat at Pendleton this morning for the May term, says the La Grande Observer. District Attorney Ivanhoe is already there and Attorney Cochran & Cochran will go later in the week. Much attention is given the Grand Ronde Electric company's case, which comes up for argument this week. This will likely be the final presentation of arguments and evidence in this case, which has already been in the supreme court before.

Their friends in Walla Walla were not aware that the ceremony was to take place and were surprised on the young people's return home with the happy news. First Sheep Shipment.

The first large sheep shipment of the spring season will be sent out over the Northern Pacific tomorrow afternoon to Seattle. The shipment will consist of 19 carloads and others will follow in a few days and the spring movement will continue from now on.

ORA JAY HOLDS 27
MEDALS AND TROPHIES

Greatest Number of Individual Trophies Held by Any High School Athlete in the Northwest—Two Fine Silver Cups for Individual Scores in Track Meet.

Decorating a window in Ed Jay's repair shop in the East Oregonian building are 27 medals, trophies and cups, won by Ora Jay, the star athlete of Pendleton high school's track team.

This is the largest number of individual trophies held by any high school athlete of the northwest and is a record of which Pendleton's school may well be proud.

Aside from these are two elegant silver cups for the individual championship of the interscholastic meet for the years 1907 and 1908, Jay having received the highest number of individual points in both meets.

Ora Jay is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Jay, the well known pioneers of this city, and he was born at Elwood, Nebraska, 21 years ago, although he has been reared from babyhood in this city.
