Imported Performers Coming With Norris & Rowe.

The McDonald family of bicyclists with the Greater Norris & Rowe circus which will exhibit in this city Thursday afternoon and night, May 14, were imported from Edinburgh, Scotland, for this tour of the big circus.

During the run of 60 consecutive performances in San Francisco this spring 279,873 persons paid admission to see the big show, a record that has never been equaled by a circus in the history of the west.

The McDonald family created a most favorable impression, notwithstanding that artists of world-wide reputation were on the program ahead of them. That they are masters of their art cannot be disputed. There are eight people in the troupe. COMPANY L TO TO GO INTO CAMP

LOCAL GUARDSMEN TO
HAVE REAL EXPERIENCE.

Militia Will Spend Saturday Night and Sunday in Camp on Oliver Farm West of Town—Will Get Needed Instruction—Plans Being Made for Memorial Day Observance—Lieutenant Smythe in Command.

Some time during the month of May company L will go into camp at the Oliver place below the city and will repeat the experience it had a year ago at the same place. The company will go into camp on a Saturday evening and will return home Sunday evening.

The "Bean" creek camping ground on the Oliver place furnishes an ideal place for the company to bivouac and the shelter tents will be used.

During the night the members of the company will be instructed in guard duty and Sunday will be devoted to extended order drill, outpost work and other things in which the company will need instruction before it goes to American lake.

The afternoon will probably be devoted to a bloodless campaign between the two platoons of the company.

Members of the company are anxious for the outing and last night they voted to have the same at some time during the month, the date to be announced later by the commanding officer. There are now a number of new men in the company and the encampment will furnish good training for them especially.

For Memorial Day.

Plans for the observance of Memorial day were also discussed to some extent last night and the officers of the company were instructed to lend the members of the G. A. R. any assistance possible in the arrangements for that day. The company itself will participate in the services and the members are anxious to assist in having the day more generally observed than in the past.
