FIRE DESTROYS OLD BUILDING

BUILDING USED FOR YEARS AS WAREHOUSE

W. C. Minnis Is Principal Loser. Having Had Large Quantity of Coal Stored There—Origin of Blaze a Mystery—Discovered Soon After 10 O'clock Last Night—Lack of Wind Prevents Serious Conflagration.

By a fire that broke out shortly after 10 o'clock last night the old Lemp brewery building at the corner of Alta and Vincent streets was destroyed with a large quantity of coal stored therein. The building was the property of W. S. Byers, while the coal belonged to W. C. Minnis. The loss will be covered by insurance.

How the fire in the old brewery started is a mystery and it may have been the work of an incendiary though the general supposition is that it was lighted by the careless dropping of a lighted match by some one passing or by a hobo.

Within a few moments after the fire was discovered the building was a mass of flames and the sky illuminated for many blocks around. The alarm was first given by Ben Burroughs and Royal Sawtelle and east end and central companies were called out the east enders arriving first. They responded quickly and by turning several streams on the burning warehouse quenched the blaze before it could spread to any of the adjoining property. However, the old building was so badly damaged that it is rendered worthless.

Owing to the location of the fire it was feared for a time that a serious conflagration might ensue. The Oregon lumber yard is located just across the street to the west, while the Byers warehouses and mill were right adjoining the fire. Had a strong

wind been blowing at the time the flames would have been difficult to control.

In early days the structure was used as a brewery store room but for many years has been utilized as a warehouse. For a time it was rented by the Oregon lumber yard, but that concern has not used it for two years. At the time of the fire it contained coal belonging to W. C. Minnis and the only loss sustained by Mr. Byers was that of the building itself.

MURRAY ADMITS HE HELPED ROB SALOON.

Mystery of Athena Burglary Is Quickly Solved—Halfbreed Implicates White Man.

Albert Murray, a half-breed, Herman Hadky, a traveling musician, and Andrew Picard, are all under arrest at Athena charged with robbing the Corner saloon, owned by Thomas Bros., Tuesday night, and Murray has turned state's evidence.

Tuesday night the Thomas Bros. saloon was entered by robbers who removed a basement window, and going through the basement entered the saloon through a trap door. From the saloon till they took a sack containing \$10 in money.

After the robbery suspicion fell upon Murray, who had gone to Adams. One of the Thomas brothers found him at Adams and induced him to go back to Athena, where he was arrested by Marshal Ghoulson. He made a confession involving Picard and Hadky, laying the greater blame for the crime upon the musician. Hadky was arrested at Weston where he had gone after the robbery.

District Attorney Phelps went to Athena this afternoon to take up the three cases in the justice court.

Valuable Horse Dies.

Youton Boy, the big gray stallion belonging to Charles Koontz, died yesterday afternoon from the effects of inflammation of the lungs, after having been sick three days. The animal was valued at \$2000 and was insured for \$1000, the policy being with B. Jensen of the National Livestock Insurance company. The horse was 10 years old and weighed 2100 pounds.

Messenger Murdered.

\$1.15 FOR TRIP TO HERMISTON AND RETURN.

F. J. Quinlan Receives Official Notice From General Passenger Agent—Event Promises to Be One of Best of the Season—Railroad and Hermiston Preparing for Large Crowds.

A one-fare rate of \$1.15 for the round trip from Pendleton to Hermiston will be charged by the O. R. & N. for the excursion to be run from this city on May 27, for the opening of the government irrigation project at Hermiston.

Agent F. J. Quinlan today received the rate from General Passenger Agent William McMurray and from now until the date of the excursion the event will be thoroughly advertised.

Sufficient cars to accommodate any sized crowd which may go from this city will be furnished by the company and the people of Hermiston will arrange to take care of as many as possible so the excursion promises to be one of the most pleasant and successful events of the season.

It had been hoped by the people of Hermiston to have Governor Chamberlain address the excursionists on that day, but owing to his political campaign the governor has informed them that it will be doubtful if he can make a date for Hermiston on May 27. He has arranged his itinerary for the state and it will be difficult to change a date. However, he will be present if possible.

It is also impossible for any of the congressional delegation to be present.

SHAW WILL NOT RUN.

Independent Legislative Candidate Changes Mind on Subject.

W. T. Shaw has changed his mind regarding his candidacy for representative from this county and last evening announced that he will not make the race against L. L. Mann, the republican nominee, who subscribed to statement No. 2. A petition for Mr. Shaw's nomination as an independent was being circulated, but the proposition will not be dropped.

According to Will M. Peterson another candidate will be brought forward for the legislative position but the matter was not ready for announcement today.

SOWS TROUT IN EIGHT MILE.

10,000 of the Finny Tribe Planted—Farmers Requested to Screen Irrigation Ditches.

Ten thousand trout are today being placed at points along Eight Mile creek by Victor Marden. Mr. Marden received this immense consignment from the United States fish commissioner at Oregon City.

In past years thousands of small fish have perished in the numerous irrigation ditches along the creek. It is hoped that this will be avoided in the future, and to this end Mr. Marden requests all farmers who take water from Eight Mile to place screens at the intake of their ditches.—The Dalles Chronicle.

Body of Unknown Man Seen Floating Down River—Not Recovered.

Yesterday afternoon Jas. O'Leary, an engineer on the switch engine, was at the O. R. & N. pump house when he saw the body of a man floating in the river, says The Dalles Chronicle. It was that of a man having black whiskers, black hair and wearing a dark shirt and trousers, and a wide white belt. The body will no doubt be picked up at some down river point.

INDIANS TO WAR ON "FIREWATER"

JOIN TEMPERANCE SOCIETY AND WILL CAST VOTES

Reservation Revival May Aid Anti-Saloon Workers in Fight for "Dry" County—More Reds Will Use Their Voting Privilege Than Ever Before—Meetings Continue.

Recognizing that "firewater" is the worst foe of the redmen, the subject of temperance has been taken up very strongly at the camp meetings now being held upon the reservation and incidentally the Indians are being lined up to vote for prohibition at the coming election.

Since the camp meeting commenced numerous meetings of the Indian temperance society have been held and many new members enrolled. Last night a session was held lasting until 1 o'clock in the morning.

Not only are the Indians urged to abstain from the use of intoxicants, but those in charge are working to help out the movement for making the city and county dry.

Under the laws of the United States an allottee of the government is a citizen and is entitled to vote. In the past the right of franchise has been used to some extent by the Indians and indications point to a much stronger redman vote than usual this year.

The reservation campmeetings will be continued all this week, evangelistic services being held every evening.

FOLK FOR PRESIDENT.

Chicago, May 7.—It is reported here that following a meeting of democratic leaders last night, Folk has been selected to be presented by the democrats as a substitute for Bryan. Chairman Taggart of the national committee, Roger Sullivan, Illinois, Urey Woodson, of Kentucky, Norman E. Mack, of New York, were present. Bryan will be allowed a fair opportunity to nominate himself, but if he cannot show two-thirds of delegates and if Johnson cannot develop over one-third, Folk will be offered.

WIDOW EXPECTS STORK.

Duchess de Chaulnes Will Not Return to America at Once.

Paris, May 7.—The widowed Duchess de Chaulnes, who was Miss Theodore Shonts of New York, will not return to America with her father, Theodore P. Shonts, who came to Paris upon learning of the death of his son-in-law, April 23. A posthumous child is expected and it is not considered safe for the duchess to make the long journey to New York.

She will remain in France with her sister-in-law, the Duchess d'Uzes, until after her accouchement.
