SELLS-FIOTO CIRCUS COMING MAY 30

Doc Waddell, advance man for the enlarged and beautiful Sells-Fioto circus, is at the Hotel St. George today, making arrangements for the coming performance on Saturday, May 30, when one of the most attractive shows now on the road will entertain the people of this city and surrounding country.

Every year adds to the popularity of this excellent circus and Sells-Fioto have made one of the most successful tours ever placed to the record of a circus on the Pacific coast. They have just performed two weeks in Los Angeles under the auspices of the Shriners, the two weeks' performance yielding the sum of \$10,000 to the Shriners' hospital fund. One week's performance for the same order in San Francisco yielded the sum of \$5000 for similar purpose and later in the season the circus will perform two weeks for the Chicago lodge of Shriners, the largest lodge of that order in the world.

Brother to Rube.

Waddell is a brother of the famous Rube Waddell, the baseball pitcher, and is the story writer for the enormous Sells-Fioto Circus that will give a street parade and two performances here Saturday, May 30, Decoration day. He refuses to ride on trains, in autos, hacks or to go on foot. The country is being toured by him on the back of his pet elephant, and in this way he advertises the great Sells show.

Arrangements were made today with the Grand Army of the Republic so that the circus will not interfere with the Decoration day exercises. The street parade of the circus will be given so that people can attend the G. A. R. services at the cemetery and also witness the razzing one mile long circus pageant.

Remembers the Dead.

H. H. Tammen, the fearless owner of the Denver Post, and general manager of the Sells-Fioto circus, left an order with Colonel Peter West for money to help in purchasing flowers for the soldiers' graves. With the Sells-Fioto circus are a number of old soldiers. The secretary and auditor, Colonel Perry, who will cash Colonel West's order, wears the Grand Army button. One of the elephants of the double herd of performing elephants is named "General Grant" after the late president and commander-in-chief of the U. S. army. This elephant last Decoration day walked with the G. A. R. boys in the town showed and placed flowers on the graves of departed comrades with the care and patriotism of a human being. An effort will be made to have this elephant perform the same office here.

FREEWATER WOMAN IS RELATIVE OF MUSICIAN

Mrs. D. C. Sanderson Is Aunt of Miss Kathleen Parlow.

Miss Kathleen Parlow, the seventeen-year-old girl whom Professor Groess of Berlin declares is the greatest violinist of the last 25 years, is a niece of Mrs. D. C. Sanderson of Freewater, being the daughter of her brother, the late C. H. Parlow, of Iroquois, Ont. Mrs. Sanderson has several pictures of her, the first being taken when she was about a year old, and the last when she was fifteen.

The Bulletin dispatches of last week told of Miss Parlow's appearance in Christiania, Norway, before King Haakon and Queen Maud, the latter presenting her with a diamond pendant. She appears this week before King Edward in London, and every ticket for the big concert, though sold at double prices, was sold two weeks before the event. It is to be one of the big society events of England. Miss Parlow has an offer of \$1250 per night for 150 concerts in the United States. The Parlows are a musical family and for many years in eastern Ontario were in great demand for musical numbers, so that Miss Parlow comes honestly by her inheritance as a musician, the mother of Miss Parlow being a teacher of vocal and instrumental music.

TRAMPS KILL BRAKIE.

Hurled to Death from Flying N. P. Train.

While attempting to eject five tramps from a blind baggage car on Northern Pacific train No. 15 early this morning, John Pryor, brakeman, was thrown from the car by the hobos between Connell and Hatton and, striking on his head, was killed instantly. The hobos boarded the blind baggage at Hatton and Pryor climbed over from the front end of the smoker to eject them.

Pryor was missed when the train reached Connell and the hobos were arrested and sent to Pasco, where they are now in jail. They tell varying stories of the affair, but declare that Pryor fell by accident. This, however, is contradicted by other testimony.

The train ran back along the line from Connell and Pryor's body was picked up. The doctor who examined the body said that death must have been instantaneous. Pryor has relatives and many friends in Pasco.

Suit Over Ditch.

Suit to force Michel Estoup to recognize a right of way for an irrigation ditch through his land has been started in the circuit court by John I. Creswell, the complaint being filed by Messrs. Lowell & Winter. According to the complaint the plaintiff is the owner of 40 acres of land in section 21, township 6 north of range 35 and by the terms of his deed is entitled to a right of way for an irrigation ditch which takes water from Mud creek. The defendant is charged with obstructing said ditch and the court is asked for an order restraining him from so doing in the future and also for \$50 damages.

SMOOT DECLARES: TIMBER IS BEING WASTED

Utah Senator Defends Policy of Forestry Department.

The speech in opposition to the forestry service was made by Senator Heyburn of Idaho in the senate while the agricultural bill was under consideration.

Warner of Missouri, continued his speech on the Brownsville affair, but it was not concluded.

Heyburn suggested an amendment excepting Idaho from the states in which the secretary of agriculture may give permits for the exportation of timber from the forest reserves. He ridiculed the chart of the forestry division, which was swung on the wall of the senate chamber, marked with statements as to the number of years the forests of various parts of the country would last. The forestry division he says, was launched into a realm of prophecy in a way that would require greater wisdom than that possessed by the sages of old, when it was declared that a certain section would be short of its forest in 20, 30 or 40 years, they forgot that, he says, lumber grows, and he declared that the timber supply is as great today as ever in the world's history. There is, he says, no danger of a timber famine.

Senator Smoot took exception to the statement that the world's timber was as great as ever. Heyburn retorted that the senator from Utah might consult the map on the senate wall as a guide, he possessing the "spirit of prophecy" which he (Heyburn) did not possess. Smoot said he could prove, not by prophecy, but by figures, that the timber of this country is being rapidly destroyed and that there is not anything like the amount of timber in this country that there was 20 or 30 years ago.
