OPEN YAKIMA LAND

INDIAN RESERVATION

TO BE SETTLED UPON

The Portion of Yakima Land to Be

Thrown Open Comprises 1,145,000

Acres of Every Character—Wapato

Project to Be Extended—Portion to

Be Settled Upon Can Be Irrigated.

The Yakima Republic says of the opening of a portion of the Yakima reservation to settlement:

The most important part of the work preliminary to the opening of the Yakima reservation has been completed, earlier than was expected here, by the selection by the department of the interior of the lands to be withdrawn from entry for the Wapato project.

The officers of the local United States land office have received notice from the department of the lands withdrawn and this shows that the government contemplates the extension of the Wapato project over an additional area aggregating over 50,000 acres and including all of the most desirable land from the north and eastern boundaries of the reservation as far south as Fort Simcoe and embracing the area which could be irrigated from the Simcoe and Tappanish streams.

Fast Increase in Irrigation.

Not only does this decision of the department mean the vast increase of the irrigated area of Yakima valley land but it also indicates that the date of the opening of the reservation may not be so far distant as was generally supposed, and that the government may be able to throw the reservation open, as originally intended, late this fall, or, at the latest, early in the spring of next year.

The principal work which had to be accomplished prior to the opening of the reservation was the surveying and classification of the lands and in this department the fixing of the boundaries of the land to be irrigated under the Wapato project was the most important part.

There are 1,145,000 acres of land to be opened to settlement and this area embraces lands of almost every class—homestead, desert and stone and timber lands. A part of the territory has not been completely surveyed yet but this work is in progress and should be finished during the summer.

This is My 56th Birthday—Charles W. Fairbanks.

Charles Warren Fairbanks, vice-president of the United States, was born May 11, 1852, in Union county, Ohio, and received his education at Ohio Wesleyan university. In his early career he was engaged in newspaper work, which he abandoned to study law and in 1874 he was admitted to the bar. He removed to Indianapolis the same year and began the practice of his profession, in which he was eminently successful. Though he took a more or less active interest in politics for many years he never held public office prior to his election to the United States senate in 1897. Mr. Fairbanks was re-elected to the senate in 1902. In 1908 he was appointed a member of the joint high commission which met in Quebec for the adjustment of questions between the United States and Canada. He was one of Indiana's delegates at large to several of the republican national conventions and was temporary chairman of the convention at St. Louis in 1896. In 1904 he was unanimously nominated for vice president of the United States, and was elected on the ticket with Theodore Roosevelt.

Sale of Rare Old Coins.

Berlin, May 11.—Agents for several American coin collectors were present at Frankfurt today at the opening of the widely-discussed sale of the coins and medals of North, Central, and South America, belonging to George F. Ulex of Hamburg, one of the greatest of European coin collectors. Among the pieces to be sold at auction is what is supposed to have been the first coin issued in America, which is ascribed to Sir Walter Raleigh's unsuccessful attempt in 1584 to establish a colony on the coast of North Carolina.

The collection to be sold embraces more than 4,000 lots of coins and medals, many of which have not been

offered for sale in recent years, and it is particularly complete in the early Spanish coins which from time to time supplied the need for a circulation medium throughout the greater part of the New World.

Knights of Columbus Meet.

Fresno, Cal., May 11.—Knights of Columbus are arriving here for the first event of the long program to be carried out at the state convention of the order, which lasts until Thursday. The preparation for the reception of the many visitors is complete and there will be no difficulty in accommodating the crowd. General headquarters were opened at the Hughes hotel today and the officers were kept busy issuing credentials and badges to the arriving delegates. Prior to the opening of the business sessions tomorrow morning the delegates will attend solemn pontifical mass in a body. Bishop Conaty will preach the sermon.

More Graft Cases.

Harrisburg, Pa., May 11.—The second of the alleged "graft" cases having to do with the building and furnishing of the state capitol was called for trial today. This is the metallic furniture case, in which the defendants are Architect Huston, Congressman Cassell, former Auditor General Snyder, former State Treasurer Mathews, former Superintendent Shumaker and Traveling Auditor Irvine. Former Governor Stope and Pennypacker are among the notables who are to be subpoenaed for the trial.
