GOVERNORS OF 46

STATES IN CONFERENCE

Meeting Called by President Roosevelt for Purpose of Considering the Conservation of the Country's Resources, Promises to Be a Great Success—Many Leading Thinkers and Economists Will Be Present.

Washington, May 12.—Many distinguished men arrived in Washington to participate in the conference called by President Roosevelt, to begin tomorrow and continue through several days, when methods of conserving the country's natural resources will be fully threshed out.

In addition to the governors of several states, and the heads of several great industrial, commercial and civic bodies, the congress will be addressed by William J. Bryan, James J. Hill, John Mitchell and Andrew Carnegie, who were specially invited by President Roosevelt.

The members of the conference will be entertained at a dinner at the White House this evening. The sessions of the conference will begin the following morning in the historic east room of the White House, and will continue for three days. Two sessions a day will be held. President Roosevelt will deliver the opening address, and it is probable that he will preside at the sessions of the conference.

This will be the first time in the history of the country that a conference of this importance has been held in the east room, or in the White House at all. Substantially, it will be the first time that the president of the United States and the governors of important states have been called together to consider matters of extreme public importance.

The indications now are that the capacity of the famous east room will be tested, as each of the governors will be accompanied by three delegates from his state and about 40 great national organizations will be represented at the conference. To add to the numbers, cabinet officers, mem-

bers of the United States supreme court and members of congress have been invited to attend the sessions. It will be, in its personnel, one of the most notable conferences ever held in America.

MANY EXCURSIONS.

CLOWNS GALORE

WOOD OR BRICK?

Lewiston Is Still Puzzled Over Paving Question.

The Lewiston Tribune says of the contention over the relative values of wood and brick as paving materials: The merit of wood block pavement was presented to the city council last night in a statement made by Mr. Whiting, representing Thorsen, Fisher & Thorsen—Co., agents for avianium carbolineum treatment for wood, when he offered on behalf of his firm to install a pavement here and guarantee to keep the same in first class condition for the period of 10 years.

He stated that estimating on a basis of 50,000 yards of pavement to be installed here, the saving to property owners by the use of wood instead of brick would be \$20,000 to \$30,000. He said that further 80 to 85 per cent of the cost of installing the wood block would be a local outlay, thus keeping the money at home.

He said that the cost of a completed wood block street here would be \$2.10 to \$2.15 per square yard and that this would represent a saving of about 50 cents a yard over brick.

As to the guarantee of the maintenance of the street, Mr. Whiting said that a sufficient bond would be given under terms approved by the city attorney.

He said he had been informed the wood here would cost about \$13 a thousand but that he was inclined to believe the cost would reach \$16 to \$18 for the class of wood he would desire to use.

BOISE BANK TO OPEN.

June 1 Fixed by Court as Date of Resumption of Business.

President Meholin of the bank, was called and he stated to the court that June 1 would be about the earliest date possible to make all the voluminous records necessary and get ready for the bank to proceed with business.

John Eagleson was called to testify as to the amount of deposits for which extensions had been signed. He stated that they exceeded \$860,000, that the resources of the bank are figured at \$1,056,000 after deducting \$50,000 doubtful paper and eliminating the surplus fund, and that the directors would be prepared to pay all possible cash demand that would be made up on the opening of the bank and still have left over \$220,000 in cash in the vaults, with a good surplus after making the first payment of 10 per cent on extended deposits should all of them be demanded at once.

He stated that real estate resources had been figured at the amount at which they were carried on the books of the bank and took no account of increased values. He stated that the officers believed they would have no difficulty whatever in conducting a regular banking business and in paying all demands.
