The services will be held at 8 o'clock and all are cordially invited to attend.

A collection for the general missions fund will be taken during the service.

Bishop Paddock has now been over the eastern Oregon diocese thoroughly and it is hoped that he may be able while in the city on this occasion to discuss the matter of locating headquarters for the diocese. Pendleton being in the geographical center of the diocese is hopeful of securing the headquarters where an elegant cathedral may be erected as well as a home for the bishop.

BASEBALL FANS IN THEIR GLORY

BIG GAME ON TODAY;
STORES CLOSE TOMORROW

Sugar Beet Pickers Here for a Double Header—Fate of Proposed Four-Town League Will Be Determined Tonight—Seems to Be Up to Pendleton—Parkes in the Box Today.

Things are doing in baseball circles nowadays and the outlook for the remainder of the season is bright. Tonight a meeting will be held here for the purpose of perfecting a four-town league and whether or not the league will be a go rests with the people of this city.

Until lately Walla Walla was the drawback to the league, but a fund of \$1500 has now been raised in the Garden City and notice has been given by Manager Rogers of the Walla Walla nine that everything is now ready for his team to enter the league.

To finance the local team a fund of \$1500 should be raised, according to E. K. Lorimer, manager of the team, and he is now at work trying to secure that amount.

That it will take but little more to finance a league team than is needed for the team he now has is declared by Lorimer and among the fans of the city the manager's work is taken as a winning bunch of players, something that the city has not had since the old league days.

Stores Will Close. This afternoon the team is playing with La Grande at the Matlock grounds and another game will be played tomorrow. This afternoon Parkes is pitching, while McAllister, a new man, is at second.

In the game tomorrow, and it promises to be one of the best of the season, Talifero will be the twirler for Pendleton. He was formerly with The Dalles and pitched the second game at La Grande, when the team was there two weeks ago.

For the game tomorrow afternoon all the leading stores of the city have agreed to close so as to enable proprietors and clerks to attend the game. The following establishments have agreed to remain closed between 2:15 and 4:30 p. m.: Alexander department store, The Peoples Warehouse, Boston Store, Frazier's Book store, Baer's clothing store, Bond Bros., F. E. Livengood & Co., G. M. DeMott & Co. and R. H. Sawtelle.

The band will be out for the game tomorrow and it is hoped to have one of the largest baseball crowds of the season out.

Homing Pigeons on Long Flight.

Sixty-one homing pigeons will be liberated at Leland, Ore., this morning for a 200-mile flight to the lofts in Portland, this being one of the scheduled races of the Portland Homing club, says the Oregon Sunday Journal. If the weather is propitious it is expected that the birds will reach the nearest loft in less than five hours. The best time for this distance to date is 6:29 1/2. The entries are divided up as follows: H. E. Brown, 5 birds; E. Lillis, 3; J. P. Limerick, 20; W. Wilson, 3 1/2; T. H. Bechill, 7; and E. H. Bauer, 23. The following Sunday the birds will fly over the 200-mile course, starting at Leland, Cal. The next Sunday the flight will be for 400 miles, the starting point being south of Red Bluff. The last flight will be from a point 20 miles from Sacramento, the distance being 500 miles.
