Crop Outlook Good.

"The condition of the wheat and
fruit crops in this state is at present
good," said Sam Glasgow of the Cen-
tennial mills, yesterday, "and although
no man can prophesy with certainty
about the crops at this period of the
season, the chances for a good harvest
of fruit and wheat are, in my opinion,
splendid."

The effect upon growing wheat of
the somewhat cool weather recently is
rather beneficial than otherwise, pro-
vided always it does not last too long.
It is said, wheat which, emerging
from the ground encounters continued
cool weather, directs its energy of
growth downward temporarily. The
result is that the tender shoots take
a deeper and stronger root before it
begins the process of stooling and
spreading out above ground. The ef-
fect of these deeper roots is to render
the wheat plants better able to with-
stand the hot dry weather to which
they are always liable to be exposed
later in the season.—Spokesman-Re-
view.

City Park for Dufur.

Hon. P. W. Knowles, secretary of
the Dufur Commercial club, was in
The Dalles yesterday consulting an
attorney relative to the proposed
amending of the Dufur city charter
to provide for the buying of that city
of 20 acres near the city to devote to
a public park and amusement grounds.
The plat which it is proposed to buy
is situated about a half mile west of
the Dufur city limits.

Besides providing a baseball
grounds and making provisions for
planting trees, shrubs and making an
attractive place for recreation it is the
intention of the Commercial club to
grade a half-mile circular race course,
for convenience in holding celebra-
tions and picnics. It is understood
that Dufur will not have a new home
for its Commercial club as was planned
some time ago.—Chronicle.

Autos and Trout.

and other streams they could reach
more quickly by auto on Sundays,
where they enjoy fishing and an out-
door-door luncheon. Last Sunday Vic
Marden and a party of friends, with
Mr. and Mrs. M. Z. Donnell and fam-
ily, went out to Eight Mile, where
they passed a delightful day. Several
went to Upper Five Mile and to other
streams fishing. Charles Friedly
caught 50, it is said, in Mill creek;
another caught 40 in Chemowith.

While on the subject of fish it may
be stated here that it has been not-
iced by old fishermen that trout in
great numbers have been coming up
the Columbia and entering the small
streams. Never before in years have
there been so many trout caught
around The Dalles and this is in the
main, attributed to the influx of this
fish from down river streams.

the executive board consisting of the
captains of the four organizations, says
the Lewiston Teller. This board will
now arrange the schedule of games
and will soon announce the series to

been set for 6:15 o'clock, and it is
expected seven innings can be played
between that time and darkness. It
is probable the first game of the
series will be played next Monday
evening.

The mid-summer meeting of the
State Horticultural society will be held
in this city on June 30, and July 1-2,
the same date that the local cherry
fair will be here. The cherry fair
will be under the auspices of the Bus-
iness Men's association and these two
events will be one grand occasion for
the city of The Dalles. Great prepara-
tions are being made for the meet-
ings and being in the hands of the
business men there is no doubt as to
the success of the venture.—The Op-
