FOR FREE LOCKS AT OREGON CITY

CONGRESSMAN HAWLEY
WANTS GOVERNMENT TO BUY

Representative from Second District
Will Seek to Have an Appropriation
Added to the Rivers and Harbors
Bill at This Session Though General
Bill Will Not be Passed.

Though there will be no general
rivers and harbors bill at this session
of congress, Congressman W. C. Haw-
ley is trying to get an appropriation
for the purchase of the Oregon City
locks with funds provided by the
government and the state acting to-
gether, says the Salem Statesman.
Concerning his efforts in that direc-
tion last evening's Portland Telegram
said:

"Congressman Hawley, of the First
district has hopes of making the Ore-
gon City locks free for all river boats
and to that end is striving to have a
sufficient appropriation tacked on to
the rivers and harbor bill this session
to buy the locks from the present
owners, the Portland Railway, Light
& Power company. The appropri-
ation of \$300,000 set aside by the state
for the purpose is to be augmented,
Mr. Hawley says, by an amount in-
cluded in the river and harbor approp-
riation by congress. He has written
to Secretary Giltner of the Portland
chamber of commerce, urging that a
committee be appointed by the organ-
ization whose duty will be to collect
facts and figures relating to the
amount of tonnage now passing
through the locks for the entire year.
Mr. Giltner will bestir himself in the
matter, in order that the necessary
figures be placed before the rivers and
harbors committee as soon as possible.

"The locks at Oregon City were
built by a private corporation, over 30
years ago," Mr. Giltner says, "and it
was the understanding then that they
should become the property of the
state after a certain time, on the pay-
ment of a stipulated sum. The locks
have been offered to the state on
more than one occasion, but no legis-
lature has taken the steps necessary
for the transfer.

"Public ownership of the locks will
very likely redound to the advantage
of the producers of the Willamette
valley and to the business men of
Portland, who will be enabled to send
goods by steamer at lower rates than
now rule.

"The locks at the Cascades are op-
erated free by the general govern-
ment, but have not thus far served to
reduce freights to and from the in-
land empire, but this is because the
locks at Celilo have not been finished.
When the obstructions on the Upper
Columbia are removed and boats can
go from Portland to Umatilla without
portages, public ownership and opera-
tion of the locks at the Cascades will
begin to have the effect of reducing
freight rates as intended by the origi-
nal promoters of the locks."

GERMANY GIVES HILL
A ROYAL WELCOME.

American Ambassador Highly Received
After the Tempest.

Berlin, May 15.—Despite the tem-
pest in a teapot that raged in German
diplomatic circles following the an-
nouncement of the appointment of Dr.
David Jayne Hill as ambassador to
Germany, there is every evidence that
he will be given an enthusiastic recep-
tion when he begins his duties in Ber-
lin. Highly flattering comments on
Dr. Hill's historical works are fre-
quent in the Berlin papers, and one of
the leading journals has declared him to
be "the profoundest scholar con-
temporary America has produced." This
is high praise, coming as it does
from a semi-official newspaper that
largely reflects the opinions of the
emperor.

Pending the arrival of Dr. Hill in
June, American diplomatic affairs are
being cared for by Secretary Garrett,
who is serving in the capacity of
charge d'affaires, since First Secretary
Eddy left Berlin to begin his duties as
American minister to the Argentine
Republic.

Berlin real estate dealers cherish
the prospect that somebody will be-
come rich through the proposed pur-
chase of an American embassy build-
ing in the kaiser's capital. Since the
announcement of the project, the em-
bassy and state department have been
deluged with offers of property of
every description, ranging from palat-
ial and princely establishments to
suburban tenement houses. Ameri-
ca's fame for wealth is so thoroughly
established in Germany that each en-
terprising house agent is confident he
will have no trouble in driving a
handsome bargain for himself. If, as
reported, it is intended to divide half
a million dollars equally between the
embassies of Germany and Mexico,
not much of an establishment will be
obtainable here.

The palace Ambassador Tower has
vacated is held at half a million dol-
lars, and three or four others regard-
ed as fit for the housing of our em-
bassy are priced at \$400,000 each.

just rented Ambassador Francis'

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

More Than 2000 Delegates Expected
From Many Countries.

Louisville, Ky., May 15.—With the
International Sunday School conven-
tion to be held in Louisville from June
18 to 23, now little more than a month
distant, the committees having the de-
tails in charge are nearing the com-
pletion of their preliminary work.
Louisville will be called upon to en-
tertain 2500 delegates from all over
the United States, Canada, Mexico,
Australia and parts of Europe, and
will bring to its task all the enthu-
siasm and cordiality of true Kentucky
hospitality.

The program to be given during the
six days of the convention will be the
most elaborate in the history of the
association, and will include the most
prominent ministers and Sunday
school workers from every section of
this country and Europe. The first
meeting will be held Thursday after-
noon, June 18, when addresses of wel-
come will be made by Governor Ken-
tucky, and James F. Grinstead, the
mayor, on behalf of the city of Loui-
sville, followed by a response by the
Hon. Justice J. J. MacLaren, D. D. L.,
LL. D., of Toronto, Ontario, Canada,
president of the International Sunday
School association. All of the meet-
ings will be held in the Jefferson
county armory.

Inheritance Tax Yields Well.

Salem, May 15.—The second largest
inheritance tax ever paid into the
state treasury was received yesterday.
It was the tax on the estate of Aman-
da Reed of Multnomah county, ap-
praised at a valuation of \$1,355,919.89.
The tax was \$71,414.00. The largest
tax paid was on the estate of Henry
Weinhard, which amounted to \$15-
248.54. The appraised value of the
Weinhard estate was but \$1,381,967.22
but was left in a lump sum, while
the Reed estate was divided among a
large number of beneficiaries.

General Election in Japan.

Tokio, May 15.—Scenes of wildest
excitement, such as have never before
been witnessed in a Japanese political
contest, attend the general election to-
day. Appearances indicate a decided
victory for the liberal party, which
means that Japan will continue the
policy of military and naval expansion
which has marked the last few years.

MEXICAN EXPOSITION.

Opens Soon in Crystal Palace, London
—Ready June First.

London, May 15.—The Franco-Brit-
ish exhibition will soon have a rival
for popular favor in the Mexican ex-
position, which will soon be opened in
the Crystal Palace. Nearly all of the
exhibits for the great show of Mexi-
co's products are here or will arrive
shortly and the first of June will find
the display complete and ready for
public inspection. Great interest in
the exposition is being manifested in
London commercial circles and it will
doubtless have the result of greatly
extending the trade relations between
Great Britain and the Latin-American
republic.

The exhibition will be in two divi-
sions, departmental and industrial. In

the first will be grouped art, army,
navy, transportation, education, fore-
stry, agriculture and fisheries, mine-
ralogy and metals, chemicals and
miscellaneous. In the second the
commercial and industrial divisions
will be arranged in two sections, one
representing manufactures and the
other the numerous interesting home
industries.

Considerable space will be devoted
to showing the manufacture of Mex-
ican goods and various apparatus and
appliances peculiar to Mexico will be
on view. The weaving of straw, wool,
and other fabrics, together with wood
carving, pottery, etc., will also occu-
py a prominent place in this division,
while there will be a unique collec-
tion of the small crafts and employ-
ments, which are so different from
artistic productions of the same kind
in European countries.
