COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES AT COLUMBIA COLLEGE

Milton, May 18.—The commence-
ment exercises of Columbia college
are now on.

Sunday morning at 11 o'clock Rev.
James C. Reid, D. D., of the First
Presbyterian church at Walla Walla,
preached the baccalaureate sermon
at the M. E. church.

There are 29 graduates from the var-
ious departments.

This evening the departments of
music and elocution will give their re-
cital. One of the principal features of
this occasion will be the "Garden of
Singing Flowers." The story of the
flowers in song.

Tuesday the first year academy
students give a banquet to the gradu-
ates, the parents of the graduates,
the board of trustees and the faculty.

Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock the
graduating exercises occur. The main
address will be delivered by Rev. M.
A. Thompson, A. M., of Walla Walla,
pastor of the Christian church.

For Strawberry Day.

Committees have been appointed
to assist in the preparations for straw-
berry day, which will be held June 4
in Nichols grove. Everybody will
have strawberries on that date. A ta-
ble 100 feet long will be placed in the
grove, and nothing will be left undone
to make it the event of the entire
year in Milton.

term.

CAPTAINS OF INDUSTRY AND KINGS OF FINANCE

Manufacturers of Nation Meet in An-
nual Session in New York—Will
Discuss Tariff Commission.

New York, May 18.—Captains of
industry and kings of finance from
all over the land are among the dele-
gates to the thirteenth annual con-
vention of Manufacturers, opened in
New York today. The session will
last three days and will close Wednes-
day evening with the usual banquet
at the Waldorf Astoria. Many vital
questions, including the relations be-
tween capital and labor, currency re-
form, banking and measures, the tar-
iff and trade conditions, will occupy
the attention of the convention and
will be discussed by many able speak-
ers.

It is expected that the convention
will reach a decision on the subject
of the tariff commission, to be com-
posed of experts and practical business
men who will thoroughly examine the
existing schedules with a view to the
continuance of adequate protection of
American industry without unjust dis-
crimination.

The delegates will also probe the
subject of the recent financial crisis
and its causes and results. The "let
us alone" movement which has re-
cently spread among the country's
commercial interests has many adher-
ents among the delegates at the con-
vention.

Coming as it does on the eve of a
national campaign and following a pe-
riod of financial and commercial de-
pression, the present convention will
likely be the most important in the
history of the organization.

GOVERNOR INAUGURATED
WITH BRILLIANT CEREMONIES

Jared Y. Sanders Is Now Alabama's
Chief Executive—Booming of Can-
non Ushers in Red Letter Day.

Baton Rouge, La., May 18.—With
ceremonies more brilliant and elabo-
rate than any ever before attempted
on such an occasion in this state,
Jared Y. Sanders was today inaugu-
rated governor of Louisiana, suc-
ceeding Newton C. Blanchard. A great
crowd gathered from all sections of
the state for the gala event, and
nearly every man and woman of promi-
nence witnessed the inaugural exer-
cises.

The booming of cannon ushered in
the red letter day. Before sunrise
the crowds began to gather to do hon-
or to the brilliant young democrat who
was about to begin his career as chief
executive of the state, and hourly the
number increased until the streets
were crowded as never before.

The formal ceremonies began with
the swearing in of the lieutenant gov-
ernor at noon. Then followed the
march to the state house grounds,
headed by Governor Blanchard and
Chief Justice Breaux, followed by lo-
cal and house and senate inaugu-
ral committees and officers of the two
houses. The swearing in of Governor
Sanders by Chief Justice Breaux and
the inaugural address of the former
was followed by a grand parade, in

which the state militia, veterans' or-
ganizations and civic bodies partici-
pated. An inaugural ball and a pyrotech-
nical display will be held tonight.
