OREGON TO SUPPLY EASTERN FACTORIES

The supply of dogwood and persimmon shuttles in the southern states is nearly exhausted. This statement will not appear significant to the average man when he first hears it.

But when he is told that the entire supply of shuttles, bobbins and spindles used in the cotton and woolen mills in all parts of the country is furnished by the dogwood and persimmon growing in the southern states, the seriousness of the situation is apparent. The textile mills of the country represent a capitalization of nearly a billion dollars and bobbins, shuttles and spindles are just as necessary parts of these mills as the throttle is to the locomotive.

Fortunately the shuttle manufacturers have found another source of supply in the dogwood stands in the far northwest part of the country. Two large companies manufacturing spindles, shuttles, and bobbins have erected plants in the Cascades in Oregon, where dogwood forests are the greatest in the world, the tree often attaining a height of 75 feet and a diameter of one to two feet. The southern dogwood is rarely more than 6 inches in diameter.

Extensive stands of dogwood are also found in California and Washington. Up to the present time, lumber users in the Pacific northwest have found dogwood valueless except for fuel, and its utilization for the manufacture of shuttles will bring about a considerable increase in stumpage value of this tree.

These companies, at their Oregon plants, will not only manufacture the articles named but will utilize every part of the tree by turning to account the waste wood and producing by

such by-products as pyrologneous acid, acetic acid, protacetate of iron, acetate of lime, methylated spirits, solvent naphtha, wood tar, wood pitch, and various forms of charcoal. Dogwood is indispensable in the manufacture of shuttles, bobbins, and spindles, because it is the only wood which takes a high polish and wears perfectly smooth by friction under water.

The discovery of the adaptability of the Pacific dogwood, however, has not aided the eastern manufacturers, and they have been obliged to look for substitutes nearer home. The most promising of these are mesquite and tupelo gum. The wood of the mesquite is heavy and very hard, close grained, and has a compact structure. It is probable that it would be eminently adapted for the manufacture of shuttle blocks, as it appears to have all the requisite qualities of weight, hardness, and susceptibility to a hard polish. Already it has proven well fitted for the manufacture of spools and bobbins, for which white birch is now so largely used.

The tupelo gum is medium hard and heavy, and has a compact fibrous structure. It has not yet been utilized to much extent in the textile industries, though it is quite probable it will play an important part in the future, since it combines with several necessary qualities the exacting property of wearing smooth by friction.

BAPTIST ANNIVERSARY WEEK.

Hundreds Flocking to Oklahoma from All Parts of the World.

Oklahoma City, Okla., May 19.—Oklahoma City is today the Mecca of hundreds of distinguished Baptist clergymen, laymen and missionaries, who are flocking to the metropolis of the new state from all over the world to take part in the various conventions which will mark Baptist anniversary week.

The formal program will be inaugurated tomorrow with the meeting of the National Women's Baptist Home Mission society, when well known women from all parts of the country and from foreign lands will speak. The Northern Baptist convention will assemble on Thursday, and on Friday the American Baptist Home Mission society will open its seventy-sixth annual meeting. The American Baptist Publication society, the Baptist Forward Movement for Missionary Education and other denominational organizations will also hold sessions. A special feature of these meetings will be a discussion of the missionary work of the church among the Indians of the southwest and many redskin converts will be in attendance.

Next Sunday the Baptist Young People's Union of America will have special services, at which the work of the society will be discussed by officials and members from all over the country.

Among the important matters to be considered is that of the permanent organization of the Northern Baptist convention, which provisionally organized last year at Washington, and its relation to the various missionary

organizations of the denomination. The scope and aim of the Laymen's Missionary Movement will also occupy much attention.

Charlotte, N. C., May 19.—Business managers and owners of nearly all the important daily newspapers below Mason's and Dixon's line assembled in the Hotel Selwyn today for the sixth annual convention of the Southern Newspaper Publishers' Association. ARMY LIFE FOR OREGON GUARDS

PENDLETON BOYS WILL MANEUVER WITH REGULARS

State and Government Troops Go In to Camp at American Lake, August 3—Orders Received from Washington—Military Operations on a Large Scale Projected This Year—Encampment Lasts 10 Days.

Company L, along with the other companies in the Oregon national guard, will maneuver with the regular army at American lake early in August.

The long looked for date has at last been announced official advice to this effect and orders assigning the troops which are to take part have been received from the war department by Adjutant General Finzer and transmitted by him to the officers of the local company.

The official communication is signed by Acting Secretary of War Robert Shaw Oliver, and sets out that the Third and Fourth Oregon infantry regiments and a detachment of the hospital corps are expected to go to American Lake August 3 and remain there for the maneuvers until August 12, a period of 10 days. The communication is as follows:

War Department, Washington—Sir: Referring to the fact that congress has appropriated funds for joint army and national guard maneuvers during the fiscal year 1906-7 and to previous correspondence had with you in regard thereto, the following organizations of Oregon have been invited and are expected to participate in the encampment of the troops of the regular army at American Lake, Washington, from August 3 to 12. The adjutant general, Third and Fourth regiments of infantry, detachment hospital corps. Attention is invited to the enclosed notes for the guidance of officers.

Organizations should arrive at the camp fully armed, uniformed and equipped for active duty in the field and should include in their equipment such tentage and camp equipment as is necessary for all camping purposes.

Correspondence with reference to the execution of the details of the movement of the state troops from their home rendezvous to instruction camps, their pay, accommodations, subsistence and instruction at the camps and provisions for their return trip from the camps to their home stations should be conducted by the state authorities directly with the adjutant general, Department of Columbia, Vancouver Barracks, Wash.

The maneuvers this year are to be the most active of any yet held, according to the memoranda sent out by the war department some time ago. More attention is to be given to regimental, battalion and company field work and less to the brigade and division, although several days will be given up to the larger formations. Hereafter the greater share of benefit has gone to colonels and brigadiers, but the majors, captains and lieutenants will be placed more on their own resources this year. Oregon will have about 1100 men in the field.

These will be by far the largest and most important army maneuvers ever participated in by the members of company L and the boys have been looking forward to the announcement of the date with much pleasurable anticipation. The company is also being recruited to its full strength and it is believed that Pendleton will again be able to make the best showing of any Oregon company.
