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OREGON IS ON FRENCH MAPS

DR. SMITH MEETS MARQUIS
WHO VISITED IN PORTLAND.

Pleasant Incident of Recent European Tour Demonstrates Smallness of Earth—French Nobleman Acts as Guide—Descendant of La Fayette and Relative of Americans—Member of the House of Deputies.

While in France on his recent European tour, Dr. C. J. Smith had an experience which he recalls with pleasure. The incident was also one of interest because of its historical feature and because it shows that though the world is large, a man may nowadays go to distant lands and still find those who know his home state.

While in Paris Dr. Smith decided to visit the house of deputies, the French congress, and in order to be admitted he first secured of the American ambassador credentials that would entitle him to that courtesy.

But when he reached the legislative chamber the house had adjourned, though the doctor did not know it and the explanatory language which the French doorkeeper used was all lost on the Umatilla county man.

While the post-woman was on another gentleman, a somewhat distinguished looking Frenchman, arrived, and seeing the trouble, explained in English to the doctor that the house had adjourned.

"However," said he, "I am a member of the house of deputies and if you wish I will show you through the chambers, though they are ordinarily denied to visitors when the house is not in session."

The invitation was thankfully accepted by Dr. Smith and he was then shown through the place by the

Frenchman. During the conversation Dr. Smith said that he was from Oregon and was pleased to learn that his entertainer had also been in the west and had visited in Portland.

He was the Marquis de Chambrun, member of the house of deputies, and his wife is a sister of Bellamy Storer, the American diplomat. Through his wife the Frenchman is related to Congressman Nicholas Longworth, and he is also a direct descendant of Marquis de La Fayette, hero of the revolutionary war.

ARRESTED FOR ROBBERY A CAR

Ralph McCumber Lodged in County Jail by Umatilla Marshal.

A PLEA FOR WOMEN

MRS. S. A. LOWELL ASKS FOR THE RIGHT TO VOTE

President of Umatilla County Equal Suffrage Association Makes an Eloquent Plea for Her Sex—Women Are Equally Intelligent With Men and Are Equally Interested in Good Government.

Mrs. Stephen A. Lowell, president of the Umatilla County Equal Suffrage association, has just issued the following circular letter to the voters of Umatilla county, urging them to remember the equal suffrage amendment to the constitution which is to be voted upon at the coming state election.

Two years ago Umatilla county voted in favor of this amendment, a majority of about 80 having been cast for it and the noble women who are urging it again this year hope to see the county again in the equal suffrage rank with a larger vote than before.

The letter is as follows:

To the Electorate of Oregon: On June first the men of Oregon will be called upon to cast their ballots for or against equality of suffrage. Casting aside all prejudice and all inherited predilection, can any voter give a single reason why the women are not entitled to a voice in the affairs of state and nation?

Are they not equally intelligent with men? Have they not the same interest in good government? If this is a government of the people, why should half the people be excluded from the ballot?

Let me appeal to the manhood, the justice and the intelligence of the men of Umatilla county to vote "yes" for the equal suffrage amendment on election day.

Yours for equality of privilege in a government of the people for the people.

Each of the three candidates has strong supporters among the leaders of Pennsylvania's democracy and the warfare for supremacy will undoubtedly be bitterly contested. The Bryan league adherents are working like beavers to secure an instructed delegation for Bryan and the adoption of a platform in line with the progressive political views of the Nebraskan.

South Carolina Doubtful.

Columbus, S. C., May 19.—Whether South Carolina will climb into the band wagon of William Jennings Bryan and support his candidacy in the Denver convention will be decided tomorrow, when the democratic state convention will convene in this city. While the rank and file of voters have not manifested a great deal of interest in the matter, a fierce newspaper controversy has been waged over the Bryan endorsement question. Both the Nebraskan's supporters and the anti-Bryan men are claiming victory in tomorrow's convention.

Florida Primaries.

Jacksonville, Fla., May 19.—Florida's 10 delegates in the Denver convention will be selected by the voters in the democratic primaries which are being held throughout the state today. Candidates will be nominated today for United States senator, presidential electors, congressmen from the three districts and county and state officers. There has been much rivalry for places on the Florida delegation to the national convention, but it is likely that the state's representation will be found in the Bryan ranks.
