AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE

League Team Assured.

As proof of the fact that Walla Walla baseball fans will be presented with first-class exhibitions of the national game this summer, the committee appointed Monday night to raise funds for support of a league team in Walla Walla, report that \$607 was raised by them yesterday in about two hours, says the Evening Bulletin. This is more than half of the amount needed for the support of the team, and the committee is out today securing the balance.

The committee appointed is as follows: T. S. Scally, August Bode, Jas. Dacres and Harry Kimmerly, James Dacres has been appointed treasurer of the local league. Tickets were today sent to the players signed up, and they are expected to arrive in Walla Walla tomorrow or Friday. Practice will commence immediately, and the first game will be played Sunday with Pendleton.

The grounds at the race track will be used by the league, the games all being held at that place.

Should Thin Apples on Trees.

Fruit Inspector Joe Brown calls the attention of the orchardists to the fact that now is the time to thin the fruit on the apple trees, says the Yakima Republic.

One reason why this is the best time is that the young fruit can be removed readily, leaving the stem on the fruit spur, which should be done by all means. Another reason is that the work can now be done much cheaper than later. Again, if the surplus fruit is removed at once, the growth that would go into it will go into other fruit that is expected to mature and will benefit it that much.

The old method of thinning was wrong, Mr. Brown says, and did much injury to the trees.

Spray for Moths.

Second spraying for codlin moth should be done around Milton and Freewater May 28, according to R. E. Trumble, the W. S. C. expert who is spraying the orchards in the Walla Walla valley this year, says the Statesman. This announcement gives the farmers a week's notice and they can prepare.

Mr. Trumble says that of 100 orchards sprayed this year he has failed to find a living San Jose scale and he believes that this pest is well under control.

Mr. Trumble owns an orchard on the state line and is conducting a series of experiments to determine if one spraying a year, properly done, will not be sufficient for the codlin moth.

If he is successful in this work it will result in the saving of large sums of money and considerable time to the farmer.

A bulletin on the "Codlin Moth in 1907" by A. C. Melander, assisted by R. E. Trumble, has just been issued at Pullman. It concerns the work done around Walla Walla, the data being gathered by Mr. Trumble.

Auto Races in Union.

The elements changed their tactics over Union county at the opportune moment, says the La Grande Observer. The burst of sunshine put new life into the Automobile day committee, and announced that there will be no postponement of the big buzz-buzz machine today.

Members of the committee are in Union today working up enthusiasm in that section, and telephone and personal letters will be resorted to liberally from now on with the result that many county machines will enter both parade and races.

The effort to have fast machines from out the county will be carried on without ceasing.

The committee will meet in the near future to set the races and arrange the schedule. This card will care for many various distances with various cars and will undoubtedly prove a strong drawing card.

Will Be No Flood.

The upper Columbia is rising at every point from which data is received by the weather bureau, says The Dalles Chronicle. Except at Lewiston, the Snake is also rising at the various towns. However, there have been none of those phenomenal rises and but little fear is felt of an exceptional flood this season. In fact, the best information at hand indicates that the annual rise of the Columbia will be below the average unless there should be a protracted period of warm weather. It is explained that the snow in the mountains is not sufficient to make much of a flood unless it should all be melted in the course of about two weeks.

Mr. Brooks, the local forecaster, does not believe the river will get much higher than it is at present as it is rising so slowly and the weather keeps cool.

ENGLISH RURAL ROADS.

Increased Cost of Maintenance and the Causes Thereof.

The following information concerning the increased cost of the maintenance of English roads in recent years, out of all proportion to the increase of population, etc., is furnished by Consul Frank W. Mahin, of Nottingham.

The causes of the increase in cost of maintenance of rural English roads are two: The changes in the character of vehicular traffic and the enormous increase of the traffic. On the Nottinghamshire roads, it is officially stated, there are 10 vehicles now where there was one 12 years ago. Central counties like this seem to be the worst sufferers in this regard, for they catch outside travel from every point of the compass. An official record indicates that about four-fifths of the automobiles traversing the main roads of this county are from other counties.

The average cost per mile of maintaining the Nottingham county roads was \$275 in 1891, \$276 in 1901, and \$322 in 1907. Thus, while the cost increased but \$1 in 10 years under former traffic conditions, it increased \$46, or 17 per cent, in six years under the present conditions.

Reports regarding some other counties show a much higher cost and a greater rate of increase than in Nottinghamshire during the past few years. The cost of maintaining all the roads in Hampshire is said to have risen in 10 years from \$136,000 to \$316,000. The foregoing figures are astounding, but they purport to be derived from official records. The total cost of maintaining the rural roads in this county last year was \$107,000, an increase of about 17 per cent during the past decade. The increased cost of road maintenance for all England since 1900, is stated to be about 20 per cent per mile per annum. A most vexing problem for road officials is what kind of road to make. Ordinary macadam is disrupted by the suction of automobiles and the heavy weight of traction vehicles, but is claimed by many drivers to be the best kind for horse traffic. Smooth composition roads seem durable for motor vehicles, but are objected to by many horse drivers as slippery and dangerous. At present no kind of road appears satisfactory to both elements, but experiments are being made in this county which it is hoped will eventually result in satisfying the reasonable requirements of every kind of traffic.
