COLLEGE COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES ARE ENDED

Successful Term at This Well Known College—Twenty-Nine Young People Graduate—Elaborate Preparations for Strawberry Day—Horse Show in Connection.

Milton, May 22.—The commencement exercises for the eighth year of Columbia college, which is the state college of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, have just come to an end. They began Saturday night with the debates, in which Harold Lamb of Freewater, won the Mosgrove medal.

The graduating sermon was preached Sunday morning by Rev. Dr. Ried, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, Walla Walla. All of the other city churches were closed. On Monday evening there was a concert by the music and elocution departments.

The pupils showed great progress along these lines as a result of a year of hard work, and reflected great credit on the teachers. Wednesday evening a banquet was given the graduates by the first year academy, the board of trustees, the faculty and the parents of the graduates.

EVEN FIG LEAF GARB MAY BE DISCARDED

La Belle Marie Flammet Threatens to Appear on the Stage in the "Altogether."

Paris, May 21.—When an English music hall favorite, impersonating Lady Godiva, appeared last year clad only in figs, all England held up its hands in holy horror.

One shudders to think of what would happen to those Puritans if they should come to Paris and see La Belle Marie Flammet in her very latest sensation, "The Dance of Eve." Even Paris has been shocked at the spectacle—so shocked that "standing room only" sign is displayed every night at the playhouse where Marie is the delight of the Parisian Johnnies.

Marie wears the historical costume of Mother Eve, a fig leaf—and a very tiny, little fig leaf—that, and nothing more. The authorities have threatened to interfere with the performance—threatened, and nothing more. And now—horror upon horrors—Marie promises to discard the fig leaf.

"And why should not a lady appear on the stage in the altogether?" inquires Marie, and all Paris has taken up the question. The press is filled with communications and interviews on this important topic, and Marie has found defenders even among the "immortals" of the academy. It is declared by some prominent writers that a condition of nudity would be even less objectional, from ethical and artistic viewpoints, than the costumes now being worn in public by certain leaders of Parisian society.

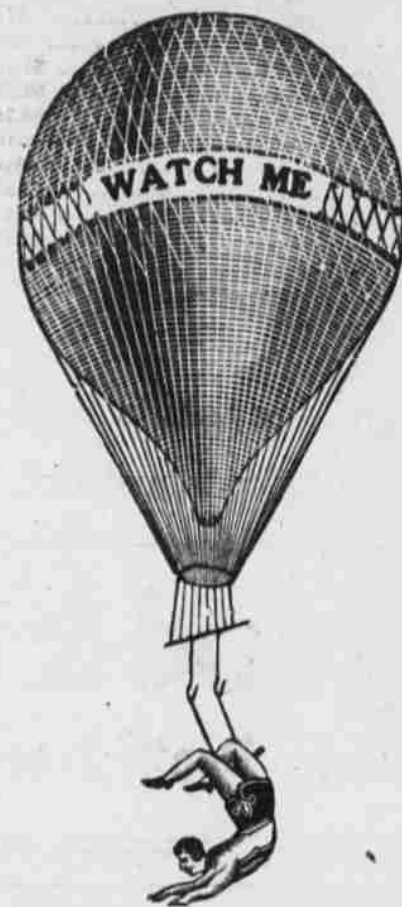
