ROAD DOWN SNAKE

CONSTRUCTION WORK NEAR HUNTINGTON

Work on the Seven Devils Line is Being Resumed and Great Activity is Promised in That Section This Year—Plan is to Extend Line Northward to Lewiston in Time.

The Boise Capital News says of railroad building activity in the Snake river and Huntington district: Unusual activity is being manifested in railroad circles in Huntington and the Seven Devils mining district, according to information received by mining promoters in this city.

It is announced that construction work has started on the Oregon Short Line branch out of Hunting to the Ox Bow tunnel and the Utah Construction company, which has charge of the work, started a large crew of men on the line this week.

Another railroad extension which is of interest to mining men is that of the narrow gauge track from Council to Landore, the heart of the great mining district north of this city. Promoters are behind this project and expect to have operations actively started during the coming summer.

Mainland Brothers, prominent financiers of Oskosh, Wis., are promoting the Oregon Short Line extension and have put up a large amount of capital towards making the extension from Huntington to the Ox Bow.

This road starts from the main line of the Oregon Railway & Navigation company at Huntington and follows the Snake river through a high and rugged country to the Ox Bow.

It is planned to extend it in time to Lewiston and other points in the northern part of the state, but at the present time it will only be continued to the point where the Ox Bow is located. Last fall 30 miles of the road was constructed out of Huntington by the promoters, but the financial flurry came on and operations were indefinitely suspended.

Now that the money market has again resumed its normal channels work has been started to finish the balance of the road to the Bow, a distance of about 30 miles from the point to which the road has been built.

NINE MILE CUTOFF COST \$3,500,000

With the completion of the Lane cutoff, connecting Omaha with Elkhorn on the main line of the Union Pacific, one of the greatest pieces of engineering ever attempted is brought to fruition. It has taken nearly four years to complete the work, and the difficulties to be overcome were such that as late as a couple of years ago the engineers in charge seriously considered abandoning the project.

The main object of the new line is to reduce the distance, to make a shorter line from coast to coast; to have the shortest line from the Missouri to the Pacific—to annihilate time and space, says an Omaha paper.

The cutoff is eleven and a half miles long, and reduces the mileage on the main line nine miles, to say nothing of eliminating one of the most troublesome stretches of the entire system. The new line is one of the most expensive ever built in this country, costing \$3,500,000 for the eleven and a half miles.

When the Union Pacific, with government aid, sought a line out of Omaha, it followed the valleys in order to avoid the serious grades and cuts incident to a direct line between Omaha and the Platte valley. This line has been used ever since, or for over 40 years. In the general improve-

ment campaign upon the Union Pacific lines it was determined to cut straight across the horseshoe, the semi-circle of which traversed nearly 21 miles just after leaving Omaha.

The new route furnishes an air line directly west from Omaha, cutting off nine miles of valley track and reducing the grade about 50 per cent. The cutoff runs over the original survey made by Engineer House as early as 1863. Some big cuts were made at the time the right of way was secured, but the project was abandoned in 1864. The cutoff traverses the old Griffin farm, now part of South Omaha, Neb.

The difficulties to be overcome in an engineering way was largely in the construction of the fills, some of which are fully a mile long and more than a hundred feet deep.

The soil is a yellow loam characteristic of that country, which washes and sinks without warning with the spring freshets. There are also some enormous cuts in the construction of which the same difficulties had to be overcome. It is a great piece of engineering pushed to completion.

Elfie Fay to Marry.
New York, May 22.—It is reported here that Elfie Fay, the famous vaudeville actress, will be married shortly to Lieutenant Damon Pierr, an American naval officer, who until recently was commanding officer of the Island of Guam. Miss Fay will leave the stage, at least during the shore duty of her prospective husband which will extend through three years.
