**BLALOCK ISLAND,  
 REAL PARADISE**

MANAGER WILLIS TELLS  
 OF WONDERFUL PRODUCTS.

Water Pumped From Columbia River  
 Has Transformed Former Desert  
 Sands Into Veritable Garden of  
 Eden—Alfalfa Fields, Orchard  
 Trees and Green Pasture With Fat  
 Cattle Supplant Sagebrush and  
 Jack Rabbits.

A veritable island paradise has  
 been created on Blalock island in the  
 Columbia river, by Dr. N. G. Blalock,  
 the pioneer physician and open river  
 worker of Walla Walla.

H. C. Willis, formerly of this city,  
 but now in charge of the island prop-  
 erty for Dr. Blalock, came up last  
 evening for a few days' visit and tells  
 something of the wonderful variety  
 of products grown on the island.

At the present time there are 400  
 acres of alfalfa growing on the island,  
 200 acres in orchard, large garden  
 tracts and over 5000 acres of fine  
 pasture on which about 150 head of  
 cattle are now grazing.

The peach orchard comprises 100  
 acres and is laden with a fine crop of  
 fruit and a mixed orchard of 100  
 acres of plums, prunes, cherries, ap-  
 ricots and other varieties is all bear-  
 ing well.

The hay crop of the island amounts  
 to over 2000 tons per year the larger  
 part of this being fed to beef cattle  
 on the island. The entire farming and  
 orchard area of the island is irrigated  
 from a pumping plant consisting of a  
 100 horse-power gasoline engine  
 which pumps 6000 gallons per minute  
 and irrigates the entire tract in a 10-  
 hour shift each day.

A force of six men, experienced ir-  
 rigators, is kept at work in irrigat-  
 ing the farming land and orchard and  
 a total population of 10 people lives  
 upon the island.

A fine gasoline launch is used be-  
 tween the island and the Oregon  
 shore, the landing being near Coyote  
 station on the O. R. & N.

 Lands.

J. B. Wilson of Walla Walla, has  
 just completed a score of fine views  
 of the Furnish-Coe irrigated lands  
 near Echo and a number of the pic-  
 tures will be used by D. B. Costuma,  
 the local agent for the lands under  
 the project, as advertising illustra-  
 tions.

The views show every phase of the  
 project and give an excellent idea of  
 irrigation development in that part  
 of the county. Views of the canal at  
 different places, the growing crops,  
 the raw land and other features are  
 among the collection.

Mr. Wilson has purchased a small  
 tract of land under the Furnish-Coe  
 canal and will place it in a high state  
 of cultivation.

**FINE CHERRIES FROM ECHO.**

D. B. Costuma, local representative  
 of the Columbia Land company,  
 brought to the city last evening a  
 number of limbs of ripe cherries from  
 the orchard of J. H. Leizer, near that  
 place. The limbs were heavily load-  
 ed with the same kind. Ripe cherries  
 in the middle of May is something of  
 which but few sections of the north-  
 west can boast and is a living dem-  
 onstration of the fruit growing pos-  
 sibilities of the west end of Umatilla  
 county. Practically all of the west  
 end of the county can be made an  
 early fruit section as is proved by  
 this fine sample of early cherries.

**INDIANS GIRLS LOCATED.**

Two Indian girls from the Umatilla  
 reservation who left their homes Wed-  
 nesday were located at Dayton this  
 morning and the father of one of them  
 and Indian Agent Nolan left this  
 morning to get them. Agent Nolan  
 and the father came up from Pendle-  
 ton last night to find the two. The  
 girls, it is claimed, wanted to visit  
 some friends in Lewiston and were  
 refused permission. They simply  
 packed up a few duds, got on their  
 ponies and skipped out.—Walla Walla  
 Bulletin.
