**TRACTION FREIGHT TRAIN.**

Steam Road Engines May Be Used to Haul Freight Into Interior.

P. E. Weston, an expert sent to this place by the Holt Manufacturing Co. of Stockton, Calif. to pass upon the practicability of the traction freight ing project between this place and Shaniko, returned to Stockton the last of the week, says the Madras Pioneer.

While here he made a thorough examination of the roads between Shaniko and Madras, and before leaving stated that within a week the company would definitely announce their decision on making a second trial trip out of Shaniko with a big freight train.

Mr. L. B. Lafollette of Prineville, one of the promoters of the enterprise, accompanied Mr. Weston on his trips over the road, and it is generally believed here that a favorable report will be made by him.

Should the traction freight project be revived Mr. Lafollette will have charge of the enterprise, with the backing of the Holt Manufacturing company. They are anxious to make a success of the big road train because of the prestige it will give the machinery of their manufacture, and for the further reason that if the enterprise can once be successfully launched, Central Oregon contains wonderful possibilities for the extension of their business.

**POISONOUS CAMAS**

STATE SHEEP INSPECTOR RECOMMENDS ANTIDOTE

Dr. W. H. Lytle Returns from Malheur Bringing Samples of Root That Causes Hayoc Among Flocks—Grows Only in High Altitudes—Cannot be Effectively Checked and Has Driven Stockmen from Certain Sections of Range.

Returning from Malheur county, Dr. W. H. Lytle, state sheep inspector, brought with him several specimens of the poisonous camas root that has been raising hayoc among Malheur county sheep. The weed is very similar in form to an onion, but it has a yellowish hue. It grows in high altitudes, never being found at a height of less than 4000 feet and it has been spreading to a considerable extent in Malheur county.

According to Dr. Lytle, it is impossible to make any effective fight against the weed, but there is an antidote which he has advised stockmen to use in cases where sheep, cattle or horses have been poisoned by eating camas. For sheep the antidote consists of from five to seven grains of potassium permanganate dissolved in four ounces of water.

In a certain section of Wyoming the poison camas has become so prevalent that sheepraisers have been forced to abandon the ranges of that particular section.
