**AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE**

**Murphy Canal Completed.**  
At a meeting of the board of directors of the Murphy Land & Irrigation company held this afternoon, a report was made by Charles S. Childs, who has had charge of the construction of the canal and laterals of the system that all the work has been completed and that water is on the land, says the Boise News.

The members of the board of directors present at the meeting were W. F. Cross, C. S. Childs, Robert Alkman and George B. Rogers. The latter two have just returned from Murphy and report everything flourishing. In speaking of the work before the board of directors, Mr. Childs said that the canal started about a year ago has been completed. The main canal is nine miles long and has numerous tunnels aggregating 2500 feet in length. The laterals of which there are 10 miles have been completed and the settlers are using water.

One of the members of the board of directors said that it is the intention of the company to continue the work and complete the construction of the reservoir for the system as soon as possible. Mr. Childs stated that the fruit in the vicinity of Murphy has not been injured and that a big crop is expected. He also stated that strawberries are now ripe and have been ripe for over two weeks.

**Fine Sheep Ranch.**  
W. P. Carter of Caldwell, has a contract for building the laterals that will carry water over that portion of the old Marsh & Ireton farms, recently purchased by Mr. Moore, which has heretofore been unwatered. There are 30 teams working on the ditch and 15 men on leveling the remaining portion of the farm. The whole tract will be stocked with thoroughbred sheep where great numbers of these animals

will be raised for sale. There will be no animals on the farm except registered stock and as it contains about 325 acres this will be one of the finest sheep ranches in the northwest. Mr. Moore, owner of the farm, is now at the place visiting, where Mrs. Moore is taking treatment under Dr. Platt, who has an interest in the place.—Emmett Index.

**Idaho Wool Sales.**  
After a meeting of the executive committee of the Idaho Woolgrowers' association this morning Mr. Stanford, president of the association, stated that there will be a special meeting of all members of the woolgrowers' association to be held in Boise June 4, and the place of meeting will be the city hall at 10 a. m., says the Boise News.

He was not willing to state specifically the purposes of this meeting, further than to say it was one of the utmost importance to all woolgrowers, and he strongly urged that every member of the association who found it possible, should attend.

**WANT FIVE JUDGES**

ATTORNEYS FAVOR LARGER SUPREME COURT.

Umatilla County Bar Association Urges Voters to Support Measure Adding Two More Judges—Two Commissioners Now Serve on the Court But New Law Would Make Them Equal to the Regular Justices.

That the Oregon supreme court should have five instead of three judges is the almost unanimous opinion of the Oregon attorneys and last evening the Umatilla County Bar association passed the following resolution indorsing the referendum measure increasing the number of judges to five. The resolution says:

Be it resolved, by the Umatilla County Bar association, that we endorse the proposed amendment to the constitution of the state of Oregon, referred to the people by the legislative assembly, increasing the number of judges of the supreme court from three to five; and be it further

Resolved, That we endorse the act increasing the annual appropriation for the support and maintenance of the University of Oregon; and be it further

Resolved, That we urge the voters at the election to be held on June 1, 1908, to assist us in adopting both of said proposed measures.

**Indorse the Measure.**

Charles H. Carter of this city, has just received the following letter from W. C. Bristol, former United States district attorney for Oregon, indorsing the measure and urging its passage at the coming June election. Mr. Bristol says:

Portland, Ore., May 28, 1908.  
Mr. C. H. Carter,  
Pendleton, Oregon.

Dear Sir:—We are progressing toward that period in our national history where the people will be called upon shortly to again exercise their much-mooted privilege of an elective franchise, and among other things that they will be called upon to consider will be the constitutional amendment increasing the number of judges of our supreme court. There being some 19 amendments to be voted for, it naturally follows that there will be a great deal of doubt as to the amount of consideration these each will have, and it is but natural that unless something is done to bring attention to the various phases of these different affairs very little interest will be taken in them. I wish, therefore, to enlist your good offices in support of this amendment.

This proposed amendment has the following advantages:

First—It simply substitutes regular judges for the present commissioners.

Second—It adds no additional expense to the conduct of the court, there being relatively the same number of men at the same relative salaries.

Third—It will expedite the hearings of appealed cases.

Fourth—As to all re-arrangements of the inferior courts comprehended by this amendment, the matter is left to the legislature as the interests of the different localities may require.

The main proposition is to enlist interest in this constitutional amendment so that our court may be able to keep up with the progress of the state.

It is a matter that interests you and all other citizens and it would

aid very much if you could find it agreeable to your opinions to advance interest in this matter and ask those men you know or can see to vote yes on this amendment.

The affirmative vote is No. 304 on the official ballot.

Do you not think it would be a good plan to enlist the support of the Pendleton papers in behalf of this amendment, and will not their attitude, under the influence of your good self, be practically in favor of it?
