

BEST SHOW EVER IS THE VERDICT

RECORD BREAKING CROWDS WITNESS MILE LONG PARADE

Sells-Floto Show Wins Praise for Splendid Appearance—Best Circus Ever Seen Here Is Verdict of Many—Truly "A Circus Beautiful"—Everything in Connection with the Big Show Is Spick and Span.

Sells-Floto, "the circus beautiful," is in Pendleton.

The Pendleton kid, regardless of age, is in his glory today.

The whole show, just as advertised apparently, arrived bright and early.

The parade was pulled off at the appointed time and much to the delight of more than 3000 people who lined the streets. Not one word of disappointment was heard from any one. But words of praise were numerous.

The show is larger and apparently better than last year. And the same beautiful characteristics are to be seen. The animals are well fed, the wagons are clean and the performers are neatly dressed.

Several hundred witnessed the performance this afternoon, but the big crowd will be tonight.

Sells-Floto, Best of All.

The Afternoon Performance

There is a good deal more about the Sells Floto show than appears on the bills. The performance opens with Eva Goldman, the little girl who literally sings to "beat the band." Five minutes before the big show starts, she stands in the center of the multitude and with a voice that is at once strong and sweet, actually makes herself heard above the band of 40 pieces. Then follows a parade around the hippodrome track, a congress of nations being depicted by the gorgeous caparisoned elephants, camels, 300

horses and 400 people—a glittering, glowing, golden pageant, resplendent in silk and plush and bespangled beauties. Everything looked new and clean, with beautiful representing the best of every nation on earth.

The Side Show.

Don't miss the side show, above all things. It is by far the best ever brought here by a circus. There are 30 stages and no freaks. The circus is at the ball grounds and the show tonight starts at 8 o'clock.

AS TO MEASURES.

Judiciary Amendment No. 304.

This amendment is in the interest of speedy and less costly justice, both to the taxpayers and the accused. If it is adopted, a law can be made whenever it is wise to do so, combining the offices of county and circuit judge in any county. In several of the most thickly populated counties it should be done now, but the constitution should be amended first. Terms of court could be held oftener in such counties, trials would not be so long delayed and the expense would be less. Where there are only two regular terms of court a year prisoners are often kept in jail from six months to a year before they can be tried, which is a great injustice to them as well as a great expense to the county.

Peoples' Power League Measures.

On pages 29 to 104 of the book sent you by the secretary of state you will see who are members of the league and the arguments offered for its measures. You will recognize the names of many men whom you know have been working and spending their money freely for years to increase the people's power in Oregon. For the most part they are the same men who prepared and offered the Initiative and Referendum amendment in 1902, Direct Primary law in 1904, Local Initiative and Referendum and City Charter amendments in 1906. Many of them began this work with the Australian Ballot League in 1889. Every measure they have offered in the past has added greatly to the power of the people and cut down the power of the political machines and bosses, and all have been declared to be unconstitutional. These men believe the following four measures the League offers this year will complete the system of laws necessary to give the people of Oregon direct and effective methods of quickly controlling their government and its officers, and will make it impossible to ever resurrect a political boss or machine in Oregon.

Recall Amendment, on which No. 324 Votes Yes, is to give the people power to discharge any public officer.

The bill for instructing the legislature to elect the people's choice for United States senator, on which No. 326 votes Yes, will meet your approval if you believe the legislature should always elect the senator who receives the people's vote at the June election.

Proportional Representation amendment, on which No. 328 votes Yes, will allow such laws to be made that minorities can elect their fair share of the members of the legislature and other like bodies, or can require a majority of the votes to elect any officer; of the 60 representatives elected two years ago 59 were republicans, which would be fair enough if 59 of every 60 voters were republicans; but in truth there were not more than 52 republicans in every 94 voters. The amendment will also allow a simple registration law to be made requiring a voter to live and register in his precinct a reasonable time before the election at which he offers to vote. None of these things can be done until the constitution is amended.

Huntley bill, on which No. 330 votes Yes, is to make it possible for a poor man to run for office on equal terms with a rich man so far as money is concerned, by limiting the amount any candidate may spend.

Like the Direct Primary law, it is a very long bill and full of details, but could not be made shorter and do the work. Also like the Direct Primary law, the legislature would not pass it. Sincerely yours for the Peoples' Power in government.

He is the fellow above all county officers that they seek to avoid and when they fully understand after considerable persistence on the part of the treasurer that the sheriff first handles the tax money they reluctantly take leave for the new innovation.

As there are more eastern people coming to this country now than ever before this article may serve as a gentle reminder of what to expect when tax time comes around.

HOME FOR WORN-OUT HORSES.

Portland City Council Considers Humane Proposition.

That Portland may soon own a farm where city horses may be put out to pasture, where the city can raise its own supply of hay and where horses can be bred for city service, was advocated in the city council yesterday afternoon by Councilman Driscoll in the course of the debate upon Mayor Lane's veto to the ordinance authorizing the sale of an old horse, says the Oregon Daily Journal.

Driscoll's remarks were listened to with favor by the mayor and the councilmen, and something of the kind may be done in the near future.

For some time Superintendent Donaldson of the street cleaning department, has endeavored to have the city purchase a tract of land near the city where horses can be handled properly and where the city can raise its own supply of hay, his idea being to turn out all of the city horses to pasture for a certain period each year. From an economic standpoint Donaldson says the city would soon be saving money on such a venture.

In the council yesterday Driscoll said that the city now owns enough horses to warrant purchasing a place where they can pasture. He spoke for several minutes on the project, and his remarks were listened to by the other members, and from time to time Mayor Lane nodded his head in agreement to the plan.

Driscoll favors having a tract where all worn-out horses can be properly cared for until they have recovered sufficiently to be put back to work. Donaldson believes that if the place is bought a certain section can be planted with hay. He favors building a warehouse in the city where the hay can be stored, easy of access to the various city departments, thus saving a large amount of money spent each year for food for the horses.

While no definite action was taken in the matter yesterday, it is believed that the project now started will be taken up in earnest by the councilmen and carried to completion before the year is out.

BIG STRAWBERRY FESTIVAL

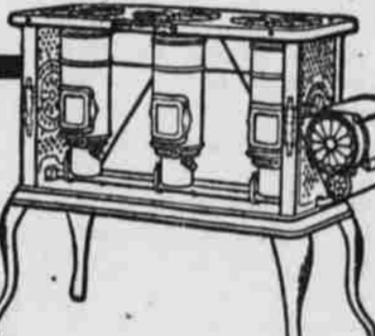
Well Known Young Lady Dead at Walla Walla.
