### He Wanted to Sleep.

Enough dope was found on Charles West, arrested for vagrancy this morning, to keep him in peaceful dreams for a week, says the Walla Walla Bulletin. On his person was a bottle of morphine, a box of cocaine, a couple of small bottles of a solution of morphine, some Chinese dope, consisting of burned opium scraped from a pipe, and a home-made hypodermic syringe or "gun."

West was arrested about 5:15 this morning and when lined up in front of Sergeant Frank Morse at the police station, with the outfit in front of him, claimed that he had secured the dope to smuggle in to Sam Ferris, an old pal of his doing time in the penitentiary for receiving stolen property. Considering West's previous habits with the various kinds of dream drugs, the officers were inclined to think that he used some of the stuff himself. He was released today on a promise to leave town.

### Yardmaster Killed.

J. W. Leak, yardmaster at Starbuck for the O. R. & N., died last night from injuries received earlier, when he was accidentally run over by a switch engine, says the Walla Walla Bulletin. Mr. Leak is about 50 years of age and has been yardmaster at Starbuck for about two years. He has no relatives in this part of the country.

After being run over the man was put on a train and started for this city to the hospital, but died before he reached Prescott. His left leg was completely severed at the hip, and injuries about the head and body were sustained. The remains were brought to this city, and were taken charge of by the MacMartin Undertaking company.

### Girl Is Shoplifter.

Miss Mamie Sanderson, alias Fisher, alias Minnie Moore, alias a few other pet names common to the underworld, is an inmate of the city jail today, having been arrested this morning for shoplifting on complaint of the Blyth & Fargo store, from which institution she this morning "lifted" a quantity of dry goods while the busy clerks were not looking, says the Pocatello Tribune. She is to have a

hearing tomorrow morning and the evidence against her is so strong according to the arresting officer and the manager of the store, that she is likely to spend some days either in the city jail or in the strong pen of Boise. She is well known to the local police, and it is understood that the manager of the Blyth & Fargo store has been on the watch-out for her for some time, as she has long been under suspicion as a shoplifter.

### Large Cattle Sale.

One of the largest cattle sales made in this section in several years was closed at Ontario Monday when 3690 head of cattle changed owners, were loaded on the cars and started for home ranches of the purchasers, says the Baker City Democrat. Parsons and Hanley, of Harney valley, were the sellers and J. M. Holt of Miles City, Mont., and E. G. Gould of Kearney, Neb., were the purchasers. Holt bought 700 head of yearling steers, paying \$17 per head.

Gould took 400 head of 3-year-olds which he got for \$25 per head; 600 at \$32 per head; 2000 head of 2-year-old heifers at \$13 per head.

### Bad Check Man.

G. A. Roy, wanted at Blackfoot for victimizing a few business men of the Grove City on the strength of checks against mythical bank account, was arrested in this city this morning by the local police and is being held to await the arrival of an officer from the scene of his alleged crime, says the Pocatello Tribune. He is in the city jail and takes his arrest stoically and philosophically. It is asserted that he caught a well known local hotel keeper for a neat sum of money on the strength of his bad checks.

### Wasco's Fruit Crop.

From Alphonse Sandoz, an authority on fruit and vegetable culture, living on Mill creek, several miles from this city, it is learned that the apple yield this year will be medium to full crop; cherries, full yield; apricots full yield; five-year-old peach trees are too full; strawberries medium crop. Mr. Sandoz has a fine fruit and vegetable ranch on Mill creek and has helped supply Dalles market for more than 20 years.—The Dalles Chronicle.
