**GUARDSMEN MAY
 HAVE TWO WEEKS**

**MONEY AVAILABLE FOR
 LONGER ENCAMPMENT**

Adjutant Generals Say Extra Four Days Asked for Will Be of More Benefit Than First Ten Days—Present Orders Are for Men to Go Into Camp at American Lake August 3.

If the recommendations of the adjutant generals of Oregon and Washington are carried out, Pendleton guardsmen will have two full weeks at American Lake this summer instead of the 10 days' encampment that has been ordered.

There is sufficient money this year for a two weeks' encampment and believing that the additional four days will be highly beneficial to the men the head officers of the guards have asked that the time be extended. Whether or not the request will be granted remains to be seen.

STARTS LAUNCH SERVICE.
 Small Craft to Ply Between Lewiston, Clarkston and Asotin.
 Lewiston, Idaho, June, 9.—Captain Ralph Baughman, master of the steamer Mountain Gem, plying between Kennewick and Priest Rapids, on the Columbia, arrived in the city last evening in a gasoline launch which he will use for passenger service on the Snake river, between Lewiston-Clarkston and Asotin. The boat was built for Captain Baughman in Seattle. It is 45 feet long, has a 25-horse power engine and is licensed to carry 25 passengers. Its speed in still water is 25 miles per hour. The boat started on the Asotin run this morning and Captain Baughman says he expects to make the six-mile trip in 35 minutes. Three round-trips per day will be made, the boat's schedule being arranged to connect with Northern Pacific trains at Lewiston.

SPECTACULAR FIRE

FLAMES DESTROY HOME OF WILLIAM REIMAN

Defective Flue Probably Responsible for Early Morning Blaze Which Reduced South Hill Residence to Ashes—No One at Home and Nothing Saved—Loss of \$2500 Mostly Covered by Insurance.

In one of the most spectacular fires ever seen in this city the residence of William Reiman, on Jane street, burned to the ground between 1 and 2 o'clock this morning.

The house and all its contents were completely destroyed, but the loss will be nearly covered by insurance. The house itself was insured for \$1500 with Clifton & Co., while the furniture was insured with J. M. Bentley for \$800.

At the time of the fire the Reiman family, excepting Mr. Reiman, was in Portland. Mr. Reiman is a night man for the O. R. & N. company and he had left the place but a short time before the blaze was discovered. Before leaving home he ate a midnight supper.

While the exact cause of the fire is not known it is attributed to a defective flue.

Not until the house was ablaze was the fire discovered. Noticing the glare, one of the night officers rushed to the fire bell and gave the alarm for the central companies. Meanwhile Chief of Police Gurdane, who lives near the place, had been aroused and tried to phone in an alarm, but could not arouse "central."

Aside from the central companies hose companies No. 4 and No. 5 also responded, but the carts had to be taken to the scene by hand and the steep hill was too much for the firemen. By the time a line of hose could be gotten to the place the fire was so advanced that nothing could be done aside from protecting adjoining property.

Owing to its high location on the south hill, it was the third house from the top on the south end of Jane street, the Reiman house made a fire that could be plainly seen from all parts of the city. Hundreds of people, aroused by the fire alarms, rushed to the scene or watched the blaze from their homes.

**PUBLICITY MOVE
 ON IN EARNEST**

BUREAU COMMITTEE IS SOLICITING FUNDS

Preliminary Work Has All Been Completed and Actual Advertising Business Is Now the Order of the Day—Fund of \$8000 or \$10,000 Must Be Raised—Payments to Be Made Monthly—Meeting Held Last Evening.

To raise a fund with which to advertise the opportunities of Umatilla county to the end that the population of the county may be increased and Pendleton strengthened in its position as the metropolis of eastern Oregon, the publicity bureau has started forth this afternoon.

Up to today the work in behalf of the publicity bureau has all been of a preliminary nature. True the contract was entered into with the Sunset company and a considerable amount of money has been pledged for the bureau. But the main task of raising the amount needed was not really undertaken until this afternoon.

At a meeting of the committee held last night it was decided that everything was for the forward movement in behalf of the bureau. Accordingly it was planned to commence the heavy soliciting work today. Owing to the wool sale on during the forenoon the committee did not go out this morning, but instead a meeting was set for the early afternoon.

In order to finance a publicity bureau such as is desired here it will be necessary to raise a fund of \$5000 or \$10,000, the subscription payments to be paid monthly. This sum the committee hopes to raise and will secure provided business men and property owners will give the amounts which will be requested of them.

RIVER RISING RAPIDLY.

Predicted That Portland Will Have Greatest Flood in Years.

Captain E. W. Spencer looks for higher water at Portland this month than during any other period since the flood of 1894, when a big part of the business district as far as Third street, was inundated, says the Portland Telegram. He says he does not expect another flood of that kind, but he does believe that backwater will get over front street.

"For 28 days in May it rained more or less," explains Captain Spencer, "and while it was raining here it was snowing in the mountains. But little of that snow has melted so far and consequently the fall must have been enormous. For that reason I am confident the annual rise this year will be greater than it has been for a long period. Of course I realize that the height of the flood will depend upon the weather conditions. If there should be a week of hot weather in succession there will be a phenomenal rise."

The lower floors of the Ash street and Alaska docks are covered with about a foot of water today. At 5 o'clock this morning the river at Portland stood at a stage of 15.5 feet. Acting District Forecaster Lodholz predicts that it will reach a stage of 15.9 feet by tomorrow morning and 16.2 feet Wednesday. Beyond that he refrains from making a prophecy.

A hot wave was experienced throughout the Rocky mountain country yesterday and the temperature today promises to be even higher. From the melting snow the upper tributaries of the Columbia are near bankful and pouring great volumes of water into the parent stream. At Lewiston and Riparia yesterday the Snake fell slightly, but as yet the effects of the warm weather have not been felt at these points and will not before tomorrow. The upper Columbia is still rising at the various stations from which the weather bureau receives reports. Forecaster Lodholz is inclined to believe that the rise will not be particularly alarming, unless unforeseen conditions take place, such as a protracted season of unusually hot weather.

DESTROYERS WILL CROSS THE PACIFIC OCEAN

Terrors of the Sea Will Be Towed by Cruisers—Experiment to Determine Efficiency.

Bound for San Francisco, the destroyers Preble and Perry and the torpedo boat Farragut left at noon, but the Fox and Davis will remain at Portland until after the Fourth of July. Then they will go to Eureka to remain a few days, before proceeding to the Mare Island naval station. On reaching the Bay City, the Preble, Perry and Farragut will be towed to Magdalena Bay, Pennsylvania and West Virginia. Then they will be taken over to Honolulu in the same manner. This proceeding is wholly in the line of an experiment. If it proves successful, the torpedo boats will be towed altogether when it is necessary for them to go out on a long cruise. Taken in charge by such powerful cruisers as have been assigned for the purpose, naval officers are of the opinion that the 2200-mile voyage from San Francisco to Honolulu can be completed in five or six days. It takes the average commercial steamer about seven days to complete the trip. Owing to their limited bunker space, it is impracticable to send torpedo boats out on long cruises without being accompanied by colliers. In case of trouble, quick action is an important factor and it is explained that no col-

liers may be picked up at once. Hence if it has been demonstrated that the craft can be towed to advantage, this mode of procedure will be generally adopted.

The cruiser Charleston and gunboat Yorktown left down yesterday morning at 11 o'clock, and arrived at Astoria early in the evening. They crossed out over the Columbia river bar at 10 o'clock this morning, headed for Bremerton. Though she was drawing 25 feet of water, the Charleston had no trouble during her week's stay in the river. Large crowds lined the banks of the river to witness the departure of the machines and bluejackets. Handkerchiefs were waved at them until they had disappeared around a bend. On reaching the Bremerton navy yard, the crew of the Charleston will be transferred to the cruiser St. Louis, a sister ship which will be dispatched to Honolulu. On July 1 Captain Beatty, the commander, will leave for the east.
