Columbia On a Tear. The river is still rising, and the Teal dock is away out in the water this morning, but the management arranged for landing so that freight and passengers could reach the boat, says The Dalles Chronicle.

The basement of the Umatilla House is receiving its share of water and necessitates the removal of goods from a portion of it to higher ground. If the water continues to rise Mr. Crofton's tomato plants will need no attention from the hose. The Capital City has to transfer its cargo and passengers at the locks, but the Gatzert can make it through the locks yet. It is a matter of regret that the gardens on the beach must suffer from the high water as they were in splendid condition. The river rose 2 feet last night. This makes it 32 feet. The river has to raise 40 feet here before it stops the boats from passing through the locks. The weather today was minimum 60; maximum, 84.

Fenced U. S. Land. Dick Reckman, a farmer living near Grass Valley, Sherman county, was fined \$50 yesterday at Portland and sentenced to spend six hours in jail by Judge Wolverton in the United States district court, having been indicted by the grand jury on a charge of illegally fencing government land, says The Dalles Chronicle.

The land which Reckman is said to have fenced is in Sherman county. He had a fence around 740 acres. Reckman's defense was that he did not know he was doing wrong and that the fence was removed as soon as the question was called to his attention.

Reckman was represented in court by counsel and a plea of guilty was charged was entered. To save Reckman the expense of a trip to Portland the court will allow him to serve his sentence in the Sherman county jail instead of Multnomah.

New Irrigation Project. Work has been begun on the Blackfoot reservation Two Medicine project in Montana, which will irrigate about 20,000 acres. Indian teams and labor will be utilized as far as possible, says the Spokane Chronicle.

THAW HEARING TODAY. Still Trying to Escape Asylum at Matteawan. Poughkeepsie, N. P., June 13.—Before Judge Morschauer at the special term today, attorneys for Harry K. Thaw will ask for the issuance of an order committing Thaw to some non-criminal institution for the insane. District Attorney Jerome will vigorously oppose such action.

James G. Graham, counsel for Thaw, has asked Mr. Jerome to consent to a commitment to one of the non-criminal state hospitals, preferably the one at Middletown, N. Y., where it is believed the surroundings would be more conducive to recovery than at Matteawan. Mr. Graham contends that Mr. Thaw is entitled to this much consideration since he was acquitted of the charge of murder, and is therefore not a criminal in the sight of the law. Mr. Jerome insists on his return to Matteawan, where there are less chances for escape.

Spokane Has Firebug. That there is a firebug in Spokane who makes a specialty of lumber mills is the belief of the majority of the members of the fire department who have assisted in the fight against fire in five big mills in the last year, says the Spokane Chronicle.

The Central Lumber company on the corner of Jefferson street and College avenue, is the latest mill to be completely destroyed. The fire was discovered Wednesday shortly after midnight by Merchant Policeman Howard who turned in the alarm. The fire spread rapidly and a general alarm was turned in, calling out all the apparatus in the city.

The fire was a hot one and threatened for a time to spread to the nearby dwellings, the wind carrying the heat and burning cinders over a wide area. The fire is believed to have started in the rear of the office building. It spread rapidly and came near catching the watchman, who slept in front of the building.

Incendiarism is the only cause to which the fire can be attributed. The plant was operated by electricity and great care was manifested in installing the wires to make certain as possible no short circuit could result. Another strong feature is the fact that the mill, as well as all others which have been burned, caught fire in the dead of night when there was the least possible danger.

The loss will run between \$15,000 and \$18,000 with insurance amounting to about \$10,000. The machinery in the mill was all destroyed and much of the valuable lumber. The lumber piled in the yard was all saved.
