Portland Commercial Club in New Quarters—Business Men of Portland Going to Eugene on June 24—Secretary Marsh of Pendleton Commercial Association Writes Enthusiastically of Publicity Campaign.

(Special Correspondence.) Portland, Ore., June 15.—While cyclones and floods are visiting the south, east and middle west, and the rising waters are destroying millions of dollars worth of farm and city property, Oregon is enjoying beautiful weather, delicious fruit, and looking forward with the confidence inspired by assured crops this fall.

Excursion to Eugene. On June 24 Portland business men will be the guests of Eugene. A special train will leave for the university town at 7 o'clock in the morning and the party will participate in the opening of the new depot there, will attend the commencement exercises at the university and be entertained at a reception tendered by the Eugene Commercial club.

Portland's New Fountains. The Oregon Humane society have installed nine ornamental drinking fountains at various points throughout the city. In addition to the regular drinking cups, places are provided for dogs and horses. Eight of these fountains were presented by citizens of Portland, while the ninth is the gift of the National Humane society of New York, who are presenting similar fountains to different cities in the United States.

In New Club Quarters. The housewarming of the Portland Commercial club is in its new eight story steel home, which was held last Friday night, brought together a large and enthusiastic body of prominent citizens, and it was probably the happiest event that has occurred in this city since the Lewis & Clark exposition.

Daily Rose Show. The daily rose show in the lobby of the Chamber of Commerce draws thousands of visitors, while at the Commercial Club huge quantities of perfect blooms are furnished each day by different members of the club for the decoration of the rooms. Oregon City has occupied the center of the stage during the last week with an especially successful rose show and carnival.

AMERICAN HORSE WINS.

150,000 People See Vanderbilt's Colt, Northeast, Win Grand Prix De Paris.

Paris, June 14.—Thousands of Americans today saw W. K. Vanderbilt's bay colt, Northeast, with J. C. Hill up, win the Grand Prix De Paris, the blue ribbon event of the French turf, which this year was worth about \$72,000. Beautiful weather favored the running of this classic, and fully 150,000 persons gathered at Longchamp to witness the race, which marked the close of the Paris season.

President Fallieres was there together with the members of his cabinet and there was an unusually large attendance of foreigners from all parts of Europe. After the victory of his horse, Vanderbilt was given an ovation and was escorted to the presidential lodge, where he was warmly congratulated by Mr. Fallieres.
