ON THE LOOKOUT FOR COUNTERFEIT BILLS.

From press dispatches received here Colorado and Wyoming are being flooded with \$10 counterfeit bills and the men who are passing them are headed for the west.

Rowland K. Goodard of the government secret service has sent out circulars to every officer and every banker in his district, comprising five states, and every effort is being made to warn the public and capture the gang.

The note so extensively counterfeited is on the First National bank of New York city. The description as furnished by secret service men follows:

"Check letter M; Lyons, register; Roberts, treasurer; charter number, E29; treasury number K54695; bank number varies; portrait McKinley; lithograph, composed of two thin tissue sheets pasted on sheet of white paper, silk fiber between the sheets. Quarter inch shorter than genuine note, and is a lighter shade of green than genuine. Charter number, seal and red letter E on face of note are pink instead of carmine."

HERMISTON NOTES

DAM OF BIG PROJECT IS ABOUT COMPLETE

Whistler in Portland to Open Civil Service Engineer's Office—Garfield Will Be Here About Middle of July—Settlers Will Receive Much Information—Cutting Alfalfa.

Hermiston, June 16.—The dam of the Umatilla project is practically complete, and the distribution system is nearing completion as rapidly as men and teams can do the work. In a few weeks time nearly all the men who have been employed on the project will have left, and one of the biggest irrigation schemes in the northwest will be in shape to irrigate 20,000 acres of arid land. J. T. Whistler, chief engineer on the project, has already left for Portland, where he will open an office for civil engineering, having resigned his position with the U. S. reclamation service since June 1.

D. C. Heney, supervising engineer of the U. S. reclamation service, has stated that he expects Secretary James R. Garfield here to visit the project some time between the 10th and 15th of July. He will make a tour of inspection of the various projects, and his visit will doubtless result in helpful suggestions to the settlers. He will be the guest of the board of directors of the Water Users' association while here.

Engineer B. N. Bartlett and wife have gone to Sunnyside, having been transferred to the project there by the reclamation service. He was accompanied by Mrs. Bartlett.

Cutting Alfalfa.

Alfalfa cutting is now going on in many of the fields, and the first crop promises to be one of the best ever cut here. Alfalfa will be raised here on a large scale another year. During the past week forces of men have been kept busy cutting and stacking the hay.

WALLOWA WOOL COMING IN.

Elgin Warehouses Are Being Filled With Big Clip.

The first load of wool to arrive in Elgin this season from Wallowa county was received at the warehouse of the Elgin Forwarding Co., last Saturday and came from the shearing pens of J. J. Doherty, says the Elgin Recorder. Since Saturday loads have been arriving regularly and up to the present time 125,000 pounds have been received at the warehouse.

From E. W. Rumble we learn that there will be in the neighborhood of 1,750,000 pounds of Wallowa county wool shipped from Elgin this season. The hauling, storing and loading on the cars of this enormous clip will require a young army of men and teams and the warehouse of the Elgin Forwarding company will be a scene of unusual activity until the season closes.

Wallowa county wool growers will not enjoy the same prosperity this year they did last owing to the fact that they will receive from 8 to 12 cents per pound less for their wool. This season the growers will do well if they succeed in getting 12 cents for their clips, whereas last year they received all the way from 16 to 22 cents.

Notwithstanding the low price it is thought that all the growers will sell, but this will be determined on June 25, the date of the first wool sale. At that time buyers from all over the country will be present. Another sales day will be held on July 9th.

Wool growers had hoped to ship their wool from Wallowa county this season, but owing to the delay of construction work on the extension they were again forced to haul it to this city. This will be the last year, however, that Wallowa county wool will be shipped from this point, as the new road will be completed before another wool season arrives.

Yakima Has Y. M. C. A.

North Yakima's new \$70,000 Young Men's Christian association building is in the hands of Secretary N. F. Turner, says the Republic. Excepting a few minor details the building is completed. Accompanied by a representative of the Republic, the building committee, with Contractor J. H. Corbett and Superintendent H. W. Hughes spent two hours this morning on a tour of inspection through the building. Every nook and corner was thoroughly inspected and when the committee finished its task and its members halted in the spacious association room on the first floor, expressions of pleasure and satisfaction were forthcoming for the contracting firm, Corbett & Raymond, who have finished the job on time and according to every detail of the agreement.

Secretary Turner will move his office into the new building this afternoon. By the first of July it is hoped that the doors will be swung open to the hundreds of North Yakima men and boys who have been anxiously waiting the completion of the work. All that remains to be done is the installation of a few locks and other pieces of hardware and the furnishing of the building.

Tracklaying Machine Through.

The O. R. & N. tracklaying machine, one of the most unique and practical inventions now in use on railroads, passed through the city today on the way to the Wallowa branch, where it will be employed in laying track on that line. The machine weighs about 25 tons and is self propelling and lays with an ordinary crew, about two miles of track per day where conditions are favorable.
