OREGON COLLEGE MAKES PROGRESS

TOTAL ENROLLMENT FOR 1908, WAS 1156

All the College Courses Are Stronger and the Institution Is Bigger and Better in Every Way—New Y. M. C. A. Hall Costing \$20,000, Will Be Added.

The Corvallis correspondent of the Portland Oregonian, reviews the progress of Oregon Agricultural college for the past year as follows:

Commencement is on this week at the Oregon Agricultural college, and that is a reminder that in growth and perfecting it has been a neposical year in the institution. The enrollment for the year now closing reached a total of 1156, against 835 for 1907.

The increase in numbers has not, however, kept pace with the growth in studentship and collegiate progress. An air of "doing things" has pervaded every department. It has animated the student body and more than ever been present in members of the faculty.

The college passed through the year without a defeat in inter-collegiate debate, including a tri-state victory in oratory. The football team won the coast championship and the baseball team gathered in the state college championship. The track team stood high among similar aggregations in the northwest.

Courses Are Stronger.

More notable perhaps than the success attending student body enterprises is the perfected plans accomplished and to be accomplished with reference to the material strengthening of the various courses. Largely by the handicraft of the students, the equipment in the way of machines and appliances for laboratory work has been as much as doubled. Material that cost \$1500 has been converted into finished machines worth \$4000 and placed in the laboratories for future class work, all the handwork of students.

Typical of the improvements in all departments, though more marked than in some of them, has been the development of the arrangements for college women. Waikiki hall, completed during the year, is to be the seat of social life for the co-eds at the institution. The hall will become a laboratory for domestic science.

Equal as to results accomplished during the year is the development of the agricultural department, in which poultry and agronomy have been added, and the work in agricultural chemistry has been widely extended.

A sample of the deep interest in the work is the recent organization of the Agricultural club, in which the students have begun the publication of a monthly magazine, the Oregon Countryman. It has many special articles, both in students and members of the faculty, dealing with agricultural life from the scientific standpoint. The first issue comprises 45 pages and is a creditable publication.

College Does Things.

Typical also of the "doing things" air about the institution is the awarding of the contract for the new Y. M. C. A. student building. It is to cost \$20,000, and the funds were secured entirely through the efforts of the student members of the college. Y. M. C. A. Clay Shepherd, the original student promoter of the building, died as a result of the exposure and nervous strain incident to the early work for the building, and the structure is to be named Shepherd Hall, in his honor. The building will be a center of social and athletic activity and a home for the literary societies. The building will be dedicated during the opening week of college next September.

Another achievement during the year was the raising of the entrance standard and the addition of industrial of elementary character to the sub-freshman year.

SALOON FIXTURES ARE BELOW PAR

OREGON DEALERS SEEK TO UNLOAD ON IDAHO.

Hundreds of Pool and Billiard Tables, Bar Fixtures and Liquor Stocks Are Out of Commission in Oregon—Wholesale Houses Frantic to Sell.

The dire straits into which the prohibition vice in Oregon counties has thrown the saloon men and wholesale liquor dealers, is shown in many striking ways and commercially the sudden change will be ruinous to many.

Many liquor salesmen will be forced to abandon large territories which they now cover regularly, and many second-hand fixtures and stocks will go through bankruptcy and back into the hands of the wholesale houses.

The following item from Lewiston shows something of the agitated state of the liquor business in Oregon and also gives a hint of the coming storm in Idaho. The item says:

Traveling salesmen representing Portland liquor houses are invading the Lewiston territory in an effort to find a market for the billiard and pool tables and bar fixtures rendered useless in Oregon by the recent election. Lewiston dealers have been offered new fixtures or pool tables at their own price, but with a local option question before the people of Idaho none of the dealers feel like adding more equipment.

It is estimated that at least 500 billiard and pool tables and 100 first-class bar furnishings have been put out of business in Oregon and Portland dealers predict the entire state will be dry within five years.
