NEWSPAPER MAN TRIED IN KOREA

CHARGED BY JAPANESE WITH INCITING REBELLION

Alleged That He Published Seditious Articles Which Were Scattered Among the Natives--Case Attracting Much Attention--Defendant's Attorney Denied Right of Trial by Jury.

E. T. Bethel, a British subject, who has been publishing a paper in Korea, is being tried at Seoul in a British court appointed under order of the privy council.

Bethel is charged with spreading sedition by the medium of a newspaper published in the Korean vernacular and of which he is the proprietor.

The court, including Judge F. St. Bourne, and Prosecuting Attorney H. Wilkinson, both of whom were specially sent from Shanghai by the British government, at the suggestion of Ambassador McDonald at Tokio.

Paper Was Responsible.
The prosecution said that it would prove that the publications in Bethel's vernacular newspaper was largely responsible for all the disturbances in Korea. M. Miura asserted that the Korean government exists only subject to the direction of Japan. He further said that he believed that there were 20,000 troops now in Korea and that half the country was disturbed. Consequently the publications were creating a false impression regarding the real intentions of the Japanese government, increasing the difficulties of the government and causing much bloodshed.

Refused Jury Trial.
C. M. Cross, a lawyer from Kobe who is defending Bethel, asked for a jury trial, which Judge St. Bourne refused. Cross contended that no Japanese control existed over Korea, that the Korean emperor was supreme in domestic affairs and that therefore Governor Miura could not prosecute Bethel. The first day of the trial was taken up with opening statement of the case. The case is attracting much attention.

CHORUS OF 2500 MEN.

Greatest Musical Event Ever Celebrated in the United States.

Indianapolis, Ind., June 17.--A massed male chorus of 2500 will sing during the thirty-second national musical festival of the North American Saengerbund, which begins today at the Coliseum. A children's chorus of 2000 voices will also be a feature. Thousands of German singers from all over the land are in the city and the festival promises to be the most notable of its kind ever held in the United States.

The soloists engaged are Madame Rappold, Adolph Muehlmann, Madame Schumann-Helke and David Bispham; also Walter Damrosch, one of the most attractive personalities in the musical world, conducting the New York Symphony Orchestra of 100 men.

The National Saengerfest has been a part of the musical development of this country. This organization, or band, had its origin in Cincinnati in 1849, when 118 singers from five societies met and held the first German song festival in America. In June, 1893, the North American Saengerbund celebrated at its place of birth its golden jubilee. At this celebration 2750 singers appeared and received cordial congratulations from all large associations of singers of this country and likewise from the General German Saengerbund in Germany.

The president of the association is J. Hanno Deller of New Orleans, professor at the University of Louisiana, a man well known for his artistic appreciation and tremendous force. The object of the Saengerbund at present is to promote the real character of the festival of song and to obtain for the massed chorus the prominent place which it deserves.

FRIEND OF "KIDS"

GEORGE HEWITT IS A UNIQUE LOCAL CHARACTER

Bachelor Farmer of Helix Has a Way of Doing Things for Children Which Makes Him the Most Popular "Kid" Man in Pendleton--Has Befriended Many Deserving Children.

George Hewitt, the pioneer bachelor farmer of Helix, is one of the most unique figures in Umatilla county and aside from his one fault, the love of the flowing bowl, is one of the most lovable and companionable men in the county.

For this reason the East Oregonian believes that he is worth a separate and distinct story. A brief sketch of him will please his hundreds of "kid" friends and George is entitled to the publicity.

The reason the children love George Hewitt so fondly is that he is always doing something for some child. He is either giving them money or presents and takes a delight in their delight.

As an illustration of his way of doing things: A few months ago he was on the streets of Pendleton and spied a poorly clad little boy, perhaps 10 years of age, waiting at a store door for his father. The appearance of the ragged little fellow struck George Hewitt and he at once began making inquiries of the child. It was found that he was a shepherd's boy; that his mother was dead and that he lived with his father and enjoyed but few luxuries.

That was enough for George Hewitt. He took the boy into a store and bought him clothing, "from the hide out,"--suit, underclothing, boots, caps, gloves, handkerchiefs, everything complete, at a cost of about \$25.

But Hewitt was repaid for his outlay in the joy of his little friend. He did it simply because he is a tender

hearted, whole souled, liberal minded man with no family of his own. He did it because he loves to do good for others. He did it because his generous nature prompted him to do it. His reward was in the joy of the little boy over his new suit.

Since that instance he has fitted out half a dozen deserving children at his own expense and without any desire for notoriety. Consequently he is the most popular man with the "kids" in Pendleton and is known to all of them and loved by all of them.

He says that his religion is to love children and do kindnesses for them.

Mr. Hewitt is a farmer about 59 years of age and has resided in the Helix district for the past 30 years. He owns a fine ranch, in partnership with a brother, Jay, near Helix and enjoys a good income. He has no family and lives most of the time in Pendleton, although he spends some time in Baker City and La Grande each year.

His return to Pendleton is always a source of joy to a large number of children who know him and are delighted by his stories.
