ONTARIO WOOL SELLS HIGH.

Million Pounds Changed Hands at Good Prices.

Montie B. Gwinn returned from Ontario last night and says that the wool sale held there yesterday was very gratifying to the growers. Higher prices were paid than at any other sale in eastern Oregon this year and most of the clip of that section was disposed of yesterday.

"A million pounds of wool was sold at the Ontario sale and the prices ranged from 12 cents to as high as 16 1/8," said Mr. Gwinn today. "Much of the wool was from the Steen mountain and was very clean and light. This fact partly accounts for the better prices paid at Ontario."

Night Operators in Service.

The O. R. & N. company has just placed three night operators in service at Hilgard, Huron and Duncan on account of the increased business on the road. Freight business is increasing constantly and the Northern Pacific passenger trains will add to the passenger traffic and give employment to many extra crews.

Union County Pioneers.

The Union County Pioneers' association will hold its annual reunion this year at Union on Friday, June 27. A fine program has been arranged and a large attendance is expected from all parts of the county. The Grand Army reunion of Union county will be held at La Grande on July 4, when a three-days' celebration will be held.

STATE DRUGGISTS MAY COME TO PENDLETON.

Local Druggists Are Going After Next Annual Convention of Pharmacists.

An earnest effort is to be made to bring the next convention of the state druggists' association to this city and Pendleton pharmacists will go to Long Beach in July with the intention of capturing that honor for Pendleton. "No session of the druggists' association has ever been held in eastern Oregon and we think it is time this section of the state is being recognized," declared A. C. Koepfen today.

Acting upon the desire to have their fellow pharmacists come here the Koepfen brothers and other local men are planning a little campaign to that end. The session this year will be held at Long Beach on July 7, 8, 9, and 10. At that time the time and place for the next meeting will be decided upon.

While plans have not been fully perfected it is suggested by Mr. Koepfen that a portion of the convention time be passed in this city and the remainder at Wenaha springs.

In many respects the druggists' conventions are more in the nature of outings than business gatherings. While some business is transacted, those in attendance also have much time for pleasure and it is believed that the attractions of the Blue mountain resort will appeal to them. The wives and daughters of the druggists also accompany them upon their annual gatherings and the seasons are very pleasant socially. Last year the convention was held at Seaside at the same time as the O. N. G. encampment.

WANT INDEPENDENCE NOW.

Philippine Assembly Voices Sentiment of People.

Manila, June 20.—The Philippine assembly today, on the eve of adjournment, declared by a vote of 57 to 15 that independence was the aspiration of the Filipino people and that that they were ready for immediate independence.

Speaker Osemena, in addressing the house formally at the close of the session, brought up the question. He said that it was his aspiration to have independence. The people wanted it and their acts and accomplishments showed that they were capable of receiving it.

The Progressista party leaders demanded a separate vote on the question, their spokesman declaring that the people were not yet ready for complete independence. All wanted independence, he said, some day; but the time was not yet ripe for it.

HURLS BABE TO SAFETY.

Woman Cut Down by Train, Saves Her Little Child.

Tacoma, Wash., June 20.—Tearing down the curved grade on the east side of the Puyallup river bridge early this morning, the last outboard interurban train from Tacoma to Seattle passed over the prostrate form of Mrs. George Sloan, an Indian woman about 39 years old, who lay asleep on the track with her 5-month-old baby at her side.

Both of the woman's legs were severed near the hips, but the baby was not bruised or injured. It is believed the babe will die from exposure. Mrs. Sloan was hastened to the hospital, dying a few hours later from the shock and loss of blood.

As the train bore down upon the woman she was aroused from the deep fatigue and raising herself to a sitting posture, frantically grabbed the sleeping baby and tossed it from the rails. Barely had the tiny bundle been hurled away than the train passed over the woman's limbs and with a shriek she fell back unconscious.

SEATTLE RACE MEET.

Pool Selling in Grandstand Is Prohibited.

Seattle, June 20.—The summer meeting of the King county fair association starts at The Meadows this afternoon for the annual 73-day meeting. A card of 60 horses is presented. It is doubtful if ever on the coast a higher class of horses has been represented, on a daily program. The opening handicap is the feature of the afternoon.

The public choices for the race will probably be Sugarmaid and Entrenous. The abolishing of the pool sellers who formerly preyed on the women in the grandstand, is a move which meets with favor.

ARREST WHITE SLAVE TRADERS

Federal Officers Raid Three Houses and Secure 25 Men and Women.

Chicago, June 20.—Federal officers have raided three houses, arresting about 25 ladies and several men. In an attempt to break an alleged syndicate, the members of which, it is charged, have been importing women from Europe to the United States for immoral purposes.

The alleged head of the syndicate and his wife were arrested as they were preparing to leave for France. Officials claim that at least 100 women are brought into the country each year, about 50 per cent of them being sent to Chicago. The case against the prisoners will be heard June 26.

Fifty Drowned.

Guthrie, Okla., June 20.—As nearly as can be estimated, 50 persons have lost their lives in Oklahoma from drowning in the recent flood season, and as many more have been killed otherwise by storms and lightning. In the vicinity of Hoffman alone 16 persons have been drowned, the last being Newton and William Slidham, who attempted to ford a swollen stream.

Baker City, June 20.—There is a strong probability that Baker City will have a flouring mill soon. H. W. Speer of Carmi, Ill., has been here for several days and has just completed his investigation of conditions, the amount of wheat raised and the probable cost of erecting a flouring mill here. He received encouragement from the business people, for there has been a well-founded belief here that a mill would be a paying proposition.

Parties from Kentucky are also corresponding with the commercial bodies with a view to starting in the mill business here. In the last two years the acreage of wheat has increased remarkably, and since it has been demonstrated that the dry lands will produce it is likely that the acreage will double every few years for a time.
