Robber Caught, Confesses.

The United States district attorney's office was notified today that the man who robbed the Marysville post-office on the night of June 2, at which time he made away with considerable booty, has been arrested, examined and held to the federal grand jury, which convenes in the southern division at Pocatello next September, says the Boise News. The prisoner, who gave his name as Joseph Griffin, confessed to the robbery and hiding of the booty when confronted with the evidence of his guilty.

The postoffice at Marysville is located in the store of Hale & Co., Alma H. Hagle being the postmaster. The prisoner entered the building, it is supposed, through a window, and robbed the office and store of considerable cash and other articles which he took away with him in bags and boxes. Marshal C. S. Drollinger set out on the fellow's trail and after shadowing him for several days, managed to effect a capture. Griffin was arraigned before Justice of the Peace J. G. Wood, and given a preliminary examination. When he found that the facts were too many against him he broke down and confessed to the crime, offering at the same time to lead the marshal and several others to the place where he secreted the stolen goods. This he did later and the court immediately bound him over to the federal grand jury.

May Add New Course.

ECHO'S GOOD SHOWING.

Finances of Hustling Little City in Good Condition.

The Echo Register says of that town's excellent financial condition: Some of the would-be loyal citizens have been making a terrific howl about the city being out of debt at the time the present city officials took their office. This is absolutely false.

At the time Mayor Esteb resigned and Mayor Scholl was appointed the city was in debt to the amount of \$1357.54 although the treasurer's book showed that the city was practically out of debt, and as a matter of fact was, these warrants were outstanding, some of them in the First National bank at Pendleton, and some in the Bank of Echo drawing interest.

From the first of October, 1907, to the first of February, 1908, the city received from all sources \$1570.86, and expended for all expenses occurring during that time \$1057.76, leaving a balance indebtedness of \$513.10 at the time the present council commenced to handle the reins.

From the first of February to the first of June the city has received from all sources \$2288.87 and expended, including all the city's indebtedness, \$2766.45, leaving an actual balance on hand of \$522.42, although at this time there is at the Bank of Echo to the credit of the city a sum of \$2297.33 in cash.

The present city council has spent \$1000 in repairs on the reservoir, pump house and pump, erected a good and substantial bell tower costing \$135 besides.

OREGON SHEEP CLEANER.

Few Cases of Scab Reported by Lytle.

Dr. W. H. Lytle, federal sheep inspector for Oregon, passed through Portland last night on a three weeks' trip of inspection up the Willamette valley, says the Oregon Daily Journal. Dr. Lytle says that Oregon sheep are in better condition now than ever before, there being but a few isolated cases of scab on the ranges.

The wool market, while weaker than usual, he expects will improve before very long, as the growers are holding their product for higher prices. None of the choice wool clips of eastern Oregon have been sold yet, as the sheep raisers are all in circumstances that enable them to hold their product until the price suits them.

He says the Oregon sheepmen are well pleased with the outcome of their recent fight with the Washington woolraisers, who were defeated in their latest attempt to grab some of the Oregon range in the Wenaha forest reserve.

Boise Gamblers "Got Him."

Deputy Sheriff W. J. Driscoll was removed from office today by Sheriff Hodgkin, acting at this time because his own resignation removes him from office next Monday and he had to act soon or not at all, says the Boise Capital News. The removal was made because of the activity of Driscoll in the prosecution of gambling cases this spring and because the demand was made by Chief of Police Francis and Mayor Haines, who feel that the interference with gambling caused them considerable unpleasantness, to say the least of it, according to Mr. Driscoll and his friends, notwithstanding the denial of Hodgkin that the gambling matter had anything to do with it.

To Reclaim 50,000 Acres More.

Another big dam will be constructed in southern Idaho by the Twin Falls Land & Water company, the proposed structure to be 125 feet high and 880 feet long at the top and to form a storage reservoir in the canyon of the Goose creek, 25 miles south of Burley with a capacity of 65,000 acre-feet of water for the Oakley project, another segregation of 50,000 acres applied for by the land board for the company which is triangular in shape and situated between Oakley, Milner and Burley, says the Boise Capital News.

Eagle Valley Construction.

At a meeting of the stockholders of the Eagle Valley railway held in this city this week the necessary papers were signed, mortgaging the property to go ahead with construction work and it is absolutely certain that work will begin inside of the next six weeks, says the Baker City Democrat.

The construction company organized in the east is ready to go ahead and its equipment will arrive here shortly.

Potatoes Yield Excellent Crop.

The results of the potato crops of many settlers are sufficient evidence that this irrigated soil is bound to be very productive, says the Hermiston Herald. For more than three weeks new potatoes have been ready for market.

F. G. Bancroft has been having excellent yields from his tract south of town, the potatoes being of fine flavor and quality. The first of the week he brought in 500 pounds, which brought 5 cents per pound.
