GRADE DIPLOMAS ARE ISSUED

COVETED PAPERS BEING SENT OUT TO MANY.

Sixty-six Pupils in County Schools Have Successfully Passed Through Examination Tribulations and Are Ready for High Schools—Pendleton Pupils Have Also Completed Eighth Grade.

Sixty-six eighth grade diplomas have just been issued to public school pupils in this county, that number having succeeded in passing the eighth grade examinations held this spring. The diplomas are now being mailed to the successful applicants by Prof. Nordhoff, acting school superintendent.

All of the 66 pupils are outside of Pendleton, the pupils of this district not being required to take the state eighth grade examination. All those who passed the examinations as well as the Pendleton pupils finishing the eighth grade work here are now entitled to enter the high school or any of the academies of the state.

CONGRESSMAN ELLIS IS COMING HOME.

ECHO MAKES GOOD RECORD

ESTABLISHES CLAIM AS STOCK SHIPPING CENTER.

Ships More Livestock During Past Year Than Any Other Small Station Along the Line of the O. R. & N.—Cattle Feeding Industry in That Vicinity Steadily Increasing.

Echo has made a new record during the past year as a stock shipping center and now stands at the head of all the smaller stations on the O. R. & N. system.

During the past 12 months, or since the close of the 1907 stock shipping season, 421 carloads of livestock have been shipped out of Echo station by the O. R. & N. company. This immense amount of stock has been divided as follows:

- Cattle, 7125 head, 290 cars.
- Sheep, 49,875 head, 109 cars.
- Hogs, 1500 head, 12 cars.
- Horses, 200 head, 10 cars.
- Total, 421 carloads.

This is the greatest number of stock ever shipped from Echo in any one season and is the largest number shipped from any point on the system in one year, outside of Pendleton.

The cattle feeding industry of the Echo and Butter creek country is increasing each year and next year it is estimated that at least 10,000 head of fat cattle will be shipped from that place.

UMATILLA COUNTY MEN WERE ARRAIGNED.

Given Until August First to Plead—Several Return Home This Morning.

In the federal court at Portland yesterday 11 of the Umatilla county men indicted for conspiracy to defraud the government out of land were arraigned and took until August 1 to plead. Those appearing yesterday were J. H. Raley, John Crow, William Slusher, J. H. Parkes, Bailey Ross, John Vert, Charles Mathias, George Adams, William Rabe, Samuel Olmstead and O. P. Bowman.

Owing to the fact that George McDonald was in the mountains with his sheep when indicted he had not yet been served with a summons and did not appear. William Caldwell also failed to appear yesterday.

Rumors Were Unfounded.

During the afternoon yesterday various startling rumors to the effect that some of the Pendletonians had pleaded guilty and received fines and McNell's island sentences became current. However, they were all unfounded for none of the Umatilla men made their pleas yesterday.

This morning Joe H. Parkes and several others of the Pendleton colony returned home from Portland. Others have remained behind to secure further information regarding their cases or upon other business.

At present it is not known when the local people will be brought to their information regarding their cases will be done until fall.

HIGH SCHOOL ROMANCE ENDS.

Lester Cronin Leaves for Denver to Bring Back Bride.

A romance that had its origin in the Pendleton high school will be consummated June 25 when Lester B. Cronin and Miss Clara Boylen will be wedded at the home of the young lady's parents in Denver. Mr. Cronin left last evening for the Colorado city and the ceremony will occur Thursday.

Both of the young people were students at the high school and are well known and liked by the school people and others in the city. The Boylen family has been living in Denver for over a year past.

Land Contests.

Testimony is being taken today before Judge Joe Parkes in three contest cases from the Echo country. The cases are those of Frank W. Messner vs. Charles W. Reed; Arleta White vs. Cyrus L. Guessemann, and Clifton Cleaver vs. Jesse W. Shell. The land involved lies in the semi-arid section near Echo and none of the contestants are making a defense. J. T. Hinkle is attorney for the three contestants.

Engineer Hillman Reinstated.

Engineer George Hillman of the mountain division of the O. R. & N. who was in charge of eastbound passenger train No. 6 at the time of the wreck at the Pilot Rock junction switch several months ago and who was discharged at that time, has just been reinstated in his position by O. R. & N. officials.

Chandler Divorce Suit.

Suit for divorce has been started by Harry A. Chandler against Sylvia B. Chandler, the complaint being filed today by Peter West. Desertion is alleged as a cause why a decree of divorce should be granted. The Chandlers were married here August 20, 1906, and have one child.

Attachment Against Joseph Snyder.

An attachment suit to collect \$575 from Joseph Snyder was filed today by Attorney George W. Courts in behalf of the Central Meat Market, owned by Tweedy & Carney. The amount sued for represents the pooled accounts which the meat company, the Demott Grocery company and R. Alexander hold against the defendant.

CONVICTED BANKER STUNNED.

Walter J. Barnett Is On the Verge of a Collapse.

San Francisco, June 22.—Crushed and stunned by the blow of his conviction and almost certain of having to join his former business associate, J. Dalsell Brown, in prison, Walter J. Barnett, banker, attorney and politician, is today confined to his home on the verge of a collapse.

His chief counsel gives notice of his intention to take an appeal from last night's verdict, finding Barnett guilty of embezzling the Colton securities, the loss of which caused the failure of the California Safe Deposit & Trust company. Meanwhile Barnett is out on a \$200,000 bond. Sentence will be pronounced Tuesday morning.

Prosecutor Cook said he would not press the other charges against Barnett.

AMERICAN GIRL WEDS IN SPLENDOR.

Miss Jean Reid Becomes Wife of John Hubert Ward, Brother of an Earl.

London, June 23.—No wedding within a decade has approached in splendor the marriage today of Miss Jean Reid, daughter of Whitelaw Reid the American ambassador, and John Hubert Ward, brother of the Earl of Dudley. The king, queen and nearly all the members of the royal family were present, with the elite of London nobility. The diplomatic corps of all the nations were in attendance and the wedding easily surpassed the nuptials of any American girl.

At the request of the king the ceremony was performed in the Chapel Royal of St. James, which always has been sacred to nuptials of the royalty. Ward, who is 33, received a legacy of a million when he became of age.

LAND FRAUD TRIAL CAME HIGH, BUT PAYS

Hyde-Schneider Case Cost Government Two Hundred Thousand Dollars.

Washington, June 23.—Assistant General Pugh said today the verdict in the land fraud case, convicting Hyde-Schneider would prove of incalculable value to the government, though the expenses of the trial amounted to \$200,000. The government will get this back many times over because of the increased value of the lands which will be taken away from the guilty men. Nearly a hundred thousand acres fraudulently obtained will be sold by the government for from eight to \$10 an acre which were formerly worth a dollar twenty.
