INDUSTRIAL TRAGEDY OF CENTRAL OREGON

The Oregon Daily Journal publishes the following striking editorial on the "Industrial Tragedy of Central Oregon":

Up in central Oregon south of Shaniko an industrial tragedy has been going on for years, but reaching large proportions only last year. In a portion of Crook county averaging perhaps 60 miles distant from Shaniko, it is said 1,500,000 bushels of wheat were raised last year and probably more will be raised this year.

Those people went in there expecting a railroad would be built. They had the promise of Mr. Harriman, and of others. They plowed, planted and reaped, and then found that in order to market their surplus grain they would have to haul it from 40 to 120 miles, to the end of the railroad. This of course left them no profit, but they had the grain; it having been harvested, it paid to haul it away even 100 miles or more.

With a railroad, or railroads, the production of that region would be multiplied. There's a vast area up there of vacant, unused, arable land, that will yield good or fair crops of hardy grains almost every year, millions of bushels. And still large quantities of stock for export can be raised, too.

And in the region that a railroad would traverse are also great bodies of good timber. It is a land of plentiful natural resources, if not the most inviting in the country, and it

ought ere this to have had 10 times its present products. But King Harriman would neither build a railroad nor permit any one else to do so.

Now it is reported that the people between Shaniko and Bend, are organizing to build a railroad themselves. They believe that by raising a comparatively small sum and actually beginning operations, capital to finance the project can be obtained and very likely they are right—unless Harriman has his grip on all the routes and doesn't buy, or scare off whomsoever attempts to build the road. But it is to be presumed that these people know pretty well what they are about. It is to be hoped so, and that they can succeed.

An appeal is made to Portland and Portland capitalists to help this project, and it certainly would be greatly beneficial to this city, as well as to that neglected and suffering region, if they could do so. There is capital enough in Portland to build or finance this 100 miles of railroad, and that it would pay there seems to be no room to doubt.

It is difficult to fathom Harriman's motives or policy in "bottling up" two-thirds of Oregon year after year. One would think from his actions that he had some malevolent spite at Oregon, or that just for his own sardonic pleasure he desired to keep that great region railroadless as a temptation to others to try to build through it, only to prevent them and so show his power.

ALL MEXICO TAKES BATH.
Public at Large Attain Condition Next to Godliness.

City of Mexico, June 24.—All Mexico joined today in the observance of the birthday of St. John the Baptist by taking a bath, and as a result this city and the republic at large has attained to that condition which is next to Godliness. The municipal fathers have taken expedient measures to provide a sufficient quantity of water for the ablutions of the faithful. It is estimated that about 5,000,000 gallons of the cleansing element was used today by the inhabitants of the federal district in honoring St. John.

In addition to those who took theirs in bath tubs and bathing houses, thousands of the less fastidious have repaired to the rivers, creeks and canals, which today are swarming with bathers, clad in more or less decolette costumes. The more pious are spending the entire day in the water, such being considered in Mexico a special means of grace.

St. John's Day is perhaps more universally observed in Mexico than in any other Catholic country, and for many of the populace its observance provides the only thorough bath of the year. Even that class of Mexicans corresponding to the wandering and weary Willies of the United States overcome their aversion to water on this day and date only and participate in the all-pervading wetness.

NODINE CASE IN COURT.
Famous Contest of Union County Will Not Down.

Sheriff Childers has for service the summons and copies of the complaint in a new action entitled Fred N. Nodine, administrator, and Eliza Nodine, vs. F. L. Richmond, W. T. Wright, F. A. E. Starr, W. J. Townley and others, says the La Grande Star. The suit is new in title only and is in fact a resurrection of an old case which involves some of the transactions of over 20 years ago. This was at a time when Fred Nodine was supposed to be a man of wealth and when he had placed his property in a trusteeship for the purpose of straightening up his affairs. In the end he lost his property and the great bulk of his indebtedness remained unpaid. The case has gone to the supreme court two or three times.

Fred Nodine, the original plaintiff, died in poverty several months ago. The complaint in the case reviews in detail transactions covering a long period of time and is without question the largest document of the kind ever filed in the circuit court in this district. It covers 234 typewritten pages. Lomax & Anderson of Baker City are the attorneys for the plaintiffs.

Much Hay Destroyed.
Fire, believed to have been caused by tramps smoking and throwing matches about carelessly, destroyed a stack of 375 tons of alfalfa hay stored near the warehouse of Caster & Thrush, to whom it belonged, at Wapato early Sunday morning, says the Yakima Republic.

The hay was stacked underneath a roof supported on a light framework. Smoke was first observed coming from the roof at 7:30 o'clock and three hoboos were seen to leave the stack at the same time. It is supposed that these men passed that night on or near the haystack and smoking or cooking. Several bales of the hay are said to have fallen from the stack and to have been utilized for some time past by hoboos who built themselves a comfortable sleeping apartment with the loose bales.

Sheriff Edwards and Deputy Grant went to Wapato yesterday to investigate, but the hoboos said to be responsible for the fire have not yet been located. The hay was insured for \$2500.

Rushing Work on O. R. & N. Line.
La Grande, June 24.—The bridge over the Looking Glass on the Wallowa extension about 16 miles below Elgin, was completed yesterday. The reconstruction of the track, a large portion of which was washed away during the high water of last spring, will now proceed. Within a few days the end of the track will be at the bridge over the Grande Ronde. From reports received at the O. R. & N. offices in La Grande the work on the Wallowa extension is proceeding with all possible dispatch. There are 50 carloads of track material assembled at La Grande and Elgin and at other points between La Grande and the front. This material includes rails, ties, and fastenings and such other supplies as are required in track construction.
