CLEVELAND'S FORESIGHT.

One of the most remarkable traits of the late Grover Cleveland was his intuitive understanding of government problems and his keen foresight.

When the free silver issue swept the democratic party into the Bryan fold, Cleveland stood firm as a rock and declared that that issue would bring defeat to the democratic party and that if adopted would bring ruin to the country.

For these statements he brought down upon his head the combined wrath of the enthusiastic democratic leaders who endorsed the silver idea. Cleveland risked his own judgment against the combined judgment of his party and he lived to be vindicated.

The country did not adopt free silver; the democrats who made it a national issue were successively defeated, and today the country, north and south, east and west, democratic and republican, is committed to the single money standard, which Grover Cleveland declared with magnificent presence, would always be the safe and sane policy for the government to adopt.

Cleveland was one of the few leading democrats who could pierce the future of the political world and see the result of the free silver experiment and while others have wavered and quibbled on every side of this issue, he stood firmly against it and time has proved the wisdom of his views.

OREGON'S FORESTRY IDEALS.

The East Oregonian can see in the expenditure of large sums of money annually in the improvement of roads and trails in the forest reserves of Oregon, the outline and foundation of a magnificent future for the state's forest interests.

When we get away from the idea of grabbing timber land; when we give up the idea of monopolizing ranges and watering places and get on higher ground and see the really utilitarian aspect of forestry, the value of the forestry regulations of today become apparent.

The forestry rules and regulations are not made to harass stockmen, miners or settlers. They are made to preserve and protect the magnificent forests. Stringent rules are necessary and the government is not only making rules but it is spending money to improve the forests.

With roads, trails, cabins and good watering places constructed throughout all the great forest areas of Oregon, something of the really utilitarian ideal will be seen. Grover Cleveland had this ideal in mind when he created the first American forest reserve. Theodore Roosevelt had it in mind when he continued the great work, and Gifford Pinchot has it in mind in his energetic enforcement of forestry rules and regulations.

The forestry department, although causing occasional hard feeling and aggravation for many stockmen who have been accustomed to having their own way, is at the same time putting dollars and cents into the pockets of

the stockmen and settlers of Umatilla county and all of Oregon.

The state will soon have need of the forest ranges and water sources and then we will thank the officials for saving them.

CONFIDENCE IN TAFT.

President Roosevelt a few moments after the nomination of William H. Taft as the republican candidate for president, gave out a statement to the press that Mr. Taft is the most capable man for president now before the people.

The president has the utmost confidence in Taft's ability; he says Taft is fearless, shrewd, watchful, experienced, of broad gauge and widely diversified learning and that his qualifications peculiarly fit him for this high office.

Very well, if he suits Roosevelt he should suit the republican party. Roosevelt has suited the party and could have been its nominee by all odds, had he been willing to accept. So if he knows that Taft will carry out his principles, and complete the unfinished work of the Roosevelt administration, well and good. That should be, and perhaps is, sufficient guarantee that Taft is all right and will make thousands of votes for him.

Aside from Roosevelt's indorsement of Taft as a presidential candidate, there is another and stronger reason why Taft will run well. It is this: Roosevelt has set a new pace, turned over a new leaf in the history of the republican party and of the nation and republicans generally want to see these principles carried through to their culmination.

Taft promises to carry out these principles and to complete these reforms and so in order to bring fruition to the new era in republicanism, the party will vote solidly for the party candidates and Taft and Sherman, the Ohioan and New Yorker, will unite the republicans and bring success to the party.

The possibilities of compressed air and electricity have not been neglected by the inventors whose pleasure it is to fashion new methods of dealing death and destruction, but thus far they have not made great progress, the old-fashioned explosives still being the chief if not the only resource of armies and navies. A French engineer, however, announces that he has invented an electric gun which is capable of firing 1200 shots a minute without powder or other explosive. The revolution which a successful weapon of this kind would effect is appalling to contemplate. A vessel armed with a few guns firing thunderbolts at the rate of 1200 a minute would sink a fleet of modern Dreadnaughts before they could get their ponderous 12 and 13-inch guns into action. The East Oregonian would like to turn one of these guns on the Kurds now pillaging and murdering in Persia, for just four minutes.

T. L. Barnett, the chief stockholder in the Pears' soap concern, which has within the past few years spent \$15,000,000 in advertising, expresses his conviction that printer's ink is the best kind of commercial investment, in the following language: "I cannot understand how the question can be debated. Why, the fact that advertising pays is as clearly demonstrated every day as that the sea rises. Select the proper medium, advertise intelligently, and your fortune is made. You must have new ideas for the changes of fashion. I spent \$630,000 in advertising in one year and it paid well. Good goods, good advertising and plenty of it is my advice to ambitious commercial men."

Pendleton contractors should be ready to bid on every article of material to be used for the new federal building. Probably \$50,000 will be expended in material and labor on the building and this will greatly stimulate building conditions during the next year or so. Pendleton men should build this building, and it should be built of Pendleton material.

The county court is justified in retrenching on road and bridge expenditures for a few years. The county is now well supplied with permanent steel bridges and the 3700 miles of county roads in Umatilla county compare favorably with the roads of other mountain counties of the state. The court has done its work well and deserves credit for making permanent, substantial public improvements.

There is no reason in the world why the Hermiston district cannot become as far-famed as Fresno as a grape and wine center. It surpasses Fresno in many respects and is equal to that district in every respect. Grapes, alone, should make Hermiston famous, to say nothing of her berries, melons, alfalfa and peaches.
