Determined to stand by her husband at all times and to make his imprisonment as easy for him as possible, pretty, frail Mrs. Harrison, the 29-year-old girl wife of H. L. Harrison, a condemned forger of Bellingham, will move to this city soon to fight her battle for self support alone until her husband's term in the penitentiary is concluded, says a dispatch from Bellingham.

Manager Day of the Associated Charities at Bellingham has offered her a chance to go east to her relatives, but she has refused, stating that she wishes to be near her husband during his incarceration and to be the first to see him after his release. The attachment and mutual devotion of the forger and his wife is declared by officials to be touching to a point of pathos. Harrison was induced to plead guilty, his crime being such that he was certain of conviction, and when he was sentenced he begged the court to be lenient with him because his wife is an invalid and needed him to support her.—Wallia Wallia Bulletin.

Idaho Grain Not Hurt.

The reports from the grain sections show the most cheerful conditions and remove the fears entertained yesterday that damage would result from the hot winds says the Lewiston Teller. The grain companies have been in communication today with agents located in all sections of the grain belt, and without exception the information secured shows no damage has resulted. The outlook in all localities is most favorable for a bumper crop, and in the higher altitudes where the recent rains have checked the growth of the spring crops, the warm weather is most welcome.

In the Tammany section the hay harvest has commenced and present indications are regarded as most favorable. The fall grain has made an unusually heavy growth to straw, which is due to the frequent showers and cool weather. The warmer tem-

perature will check this growth and materially assist in maturing the crops.

Expensive Depot.

Estimates on the cost of the new joint passenger depot to be erected in Lewiston by the Northern Pacific and the O. R. & N. places it at over \$60,000, says the Lewiston Tribune. This estimate is by contractors who are acquainted with the plans. There will be 500,000 pressed brick enter into the structure. The building will be almost an exact duplicate in style of the Northern Pacific depot at Spokane. The lower floors will be used exclusively for passenger business, with finely arranged ticket office, waiting rooms and baggage rooms. On the upper floor will be the offices of the superintendent of the joint line and attaches.

In conferring with material men and securing estimates on the cost of materials desired for the structure, the engineering department of the Northern Pacific has advised them that all stock would be bought for immediate delivery.

Former Employee Sues Railroad.

Ezra G. Brasel of this city, through his attorneys, Lomax & Anderson of Baker City, has filed suit against the O. R. & N. Company, asking for \$25,000 damages as the result of injury sustained from a fall from the foot-board of a locomotive in January, 1907, while engaged in washing the boiler of the locomotive, says the La Grande Observer. The company was negligent and that no handrail such as is usual alongside locomotive boilers, was provided; that as a result the plaintiff sustained a fall, and that his leg was broken and had to be amputated; that ever since he has suffered great pain and mental anguish and is permanently disabled.

Brasel fell from the running board of the locomotive boiler of which he was engaged in washing, on January 22, 1907. His right leg was fractured just above the ankle, the bones sticking out through the flesh.

BACHELOR AN INCUBUS AT PANAMA

The Panama canal commission has found that the ordinary variety of bachelor is an incubus in the social economy of the zone. Suggestions have been made by the married members of the pay lists to institute a curfew ordinance to make them go to bed at a proper time. Now the commission has discovered that the West Indian variety of bachelor doesn't know how to feed himself properly and as a result has undertaken to do that for him since June 1.

The West Indian bachelor, according to the Record, "is so frugal or careless that he actually denies himself the food necessary to sustain himself at the highest point of efficiency for his arduous work. To protect him from this is the object of requiring him to get his food at the mess kitchens."

He is left no choice in the matter. Like our own boyhood experiences when mother made us eat horrid string beans or squash before we could have cherry pie, he is obliged to file up to the long counter and receive his rations. He might just as well do this as he has to pay for it anyway, so he usually does. The cost of the mess is checked against his wages.

This is one of the lamentable defects of the bachelor that has been brought to light by canal experience. According to the protests of the domestic variety of workmen, he behaves very badly on almost all occasions. He refuses to go to bed at a seemly hour. He sits out under the palms and sings, "My Bonnie Lies Over the Ocean," when self-respecting persons have put out the lights and gone to bed. Sometimes he is boisterous when taking the early morning shower and occasions have been known when he sang riotously returning from a late dinner.

There are only two effective courses to be followed, according to the experience of the commission—treat the bachelor as a belligerent boy, or marry him off.

The Fort Hall Copper District, Idaho.

A brief description of deposits of copper ore near Pocatello, Idaho. In the ceded portion of the Fort Hall Indian reservation, is given in a report by Messrs. F. B. Weeds and V. C. Heikes of the United States geological survey, contained in an advance chapter from Bulletin 340 ("Contributions to Economic Geology, 1907, Part I"). The valuable metals of the ores are copper, silver and gold. Mining has been done by several companies, with some development work on a number of prospects. The report contains a description of the geology of the district and of the character and form of the deposits, and presents facts bearing upon the question whether the ore bodies are of sufficient value to warrant the expenditure of the large amount of capital which would be required for their extraction and reduction. Local conditions affecting the cost of mining and milling should, it is suggested, be more carefully considered in connection with plans for mining the ores.
